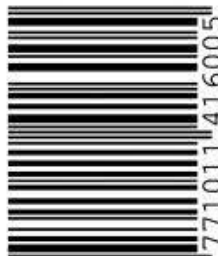

Tell the health practitioner about your child's allergies. Don't hide anything from them regarding your child's health.

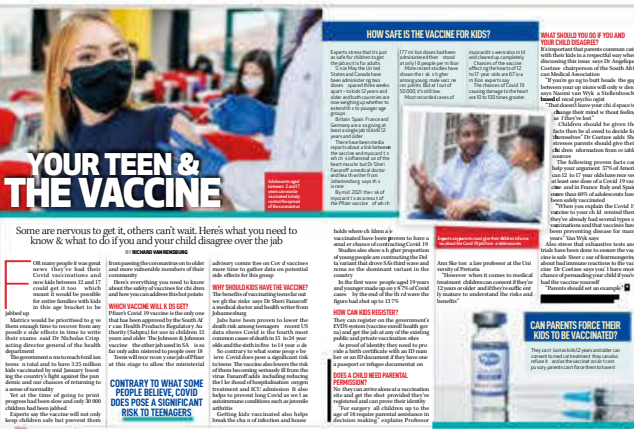

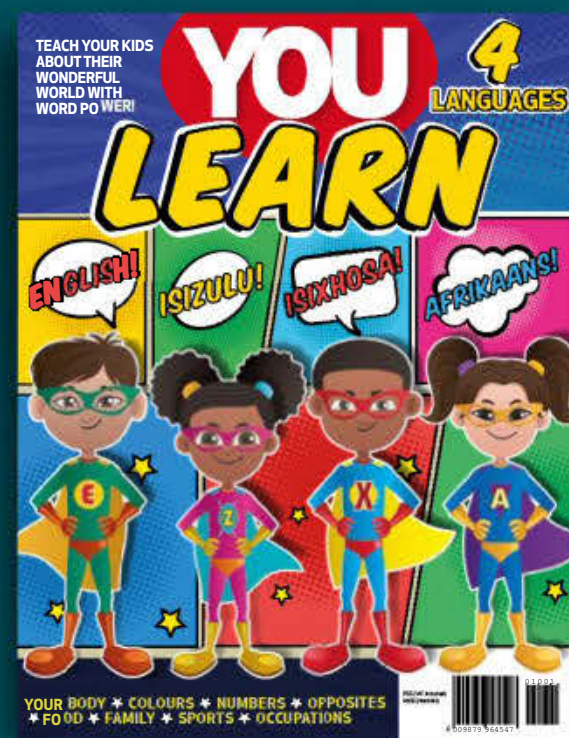

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THEY used to be the best-travelled family on the planet, making their way through airports across the world, clutching toys and dragging suitcases as they jetted from one country to the next.

Then came the Brangelina implosion, and all the legal complications clipped Angelina's wings somewhat. And when the pandemic stamped in, international travel ground to a halt along with glitzy international movie premieres.

But the world is opening up again – and that means we're once again being treated to red-carpet sightings of Angelina Jolie and her brood in locations around the world.

And what a treat it's been. In recent weeks the 46-year-old mom and five of her six kids have graced three premieres of *Eternals*, the new Marvel superhero film Angie stars in.

Maddox (20), Zahara (16), Shiloh (15) and 13-year-old twins Vivienne and Knox have been at their mother's side, beaming and beautiful, and showing just how grown up they're becoming.

But it's Shiloh who's been creating the most stir. The teen seems to have abandoned her androgynous tomboy look, eschewing trousers, jackets and cropped hairdos for dresses, a hint of makeup and cute updos.

At the Los Angeles event, Shi, as her family calls her, wore a stylish hanky-hem dress, an upcycled version of a Gabriela Hearst slipdress Angelina wore on a trip to Paris in July.

She wasn't the only one to rock her sustainability-conscious mom's haute hand-me-downs though: Zahara also followed the theme, donning a dazzling Elie Saab dress Angie wore to the Oscars in 2014.

"My kids are all mixed up with vintage and in my old Oscars dress," Angie said at the event. "We all did vintage and up-cycled my old stuff."

A few days later the superstar family

was at the Rome Film Festival – and this time Shiloh's wild sneakers stole the show, with Angie making the sustainability statement in a strapless Versace gown crafted from reclaimed metal mesh.

Days later at the London premiere, Shiloh was chic in an altered version of the black and white dress her mother wore for a *Maleficent: Mistress of Evil* press conference in 2019, while Zahara added a pop of colour in her yellow mini-dress.

As for the twins – it may be a cliché to say "my, how they've grown" but my, haven't they grown? Angie is soon going to be dwarfed by her babies at this rate.

Those in the know say it was "powerful" to see Maddox standing proudly

alongside his mom and siblings.

"Angelina and Maddox have always been close but things have been difficult for him after the split from Brad," a source close to the star says.

Maddox and Brad have been estranged since the breakdown of the marriage and he has steadfastly refused to see his father.

And Pax? Where was he while his mom, brothers and sisters posed for the cameras?

The 17-year-old appeared to be missing from all the events and the reason, insiders say, is because he's very shy and hates cameras and publicity.

"He didn't even go to his own high-school graduation ceremony in June as

latest instalment in the Marvel Cinematic Universe – is all about female empowerment.

“A lot of times as an actress you’re that individual strong woman, or you have one sister – you don’t often have this family where you really get to know women and see all the different strengths,” she says.

The movie is directed by Chloé Zhao, the Oscar-winning director of 2020’s *Nomadland*, and also stars Gemma Chan, Salma Hayek and Lauren Ridloff.

Angie has nothing but praise for her co-stars. “Gemma’s grace and elegance and the way she walks through the world. Salma’s motherhood and power ➤

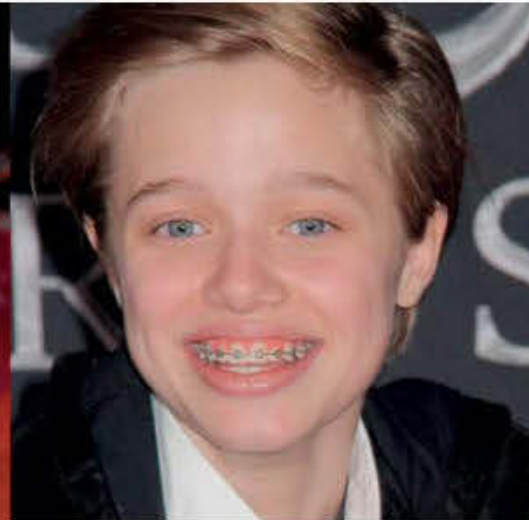

he didn’t want to create a circus,” one source says. “He has a lot of friends though.”

After the London premiere Angelina was spotted out doing some high-street shopping, first with Vivienne then with Shiloh, Zahara and Knox. Masks were in place but there was a definite sense of a return to normal – because if Angie is out and about with the kids, all must be improving in the world.

ANGIE was her luscious pillow-lipped self on the press tour, radiant and confident as she worked the cameras and charmed the media.

For her, *Eternals* – the

hero film was the last thing she'd planned to do.

"I don't usually lean towards superhero or sci-fi films. It's not usually what I'm looking to do. It felt like something else was happening in this film though."

It was Zhao's character-driven approach that persuaded Angie to sign on for the film after passing on superhero

roles in the past.

"It's not one of us in front and other characters behind. It's this really equal family. And I wanted to be a part of this family."

Still, even though Angie relished the opportunity to play Thena, she says her kids weren't particularly excited about the prospect of watching her run around on screen in a unitard for two hours.

"Would you wanna see your mother wearing that?" she jokes. "Your mom walks in with a gold spandex outfit and gold hair and they're like, 'What do you do for a living? What are you? Get back in your robe.'"

ANGELINA says her children are all very different people. "I'm so excited about all the different stages and feelings and curiosities they go through," she tells *People*.

"[Parents] are supposed to help them figure out who they are. And you can't figure out who they are if you don't enthusiastically develop with them."

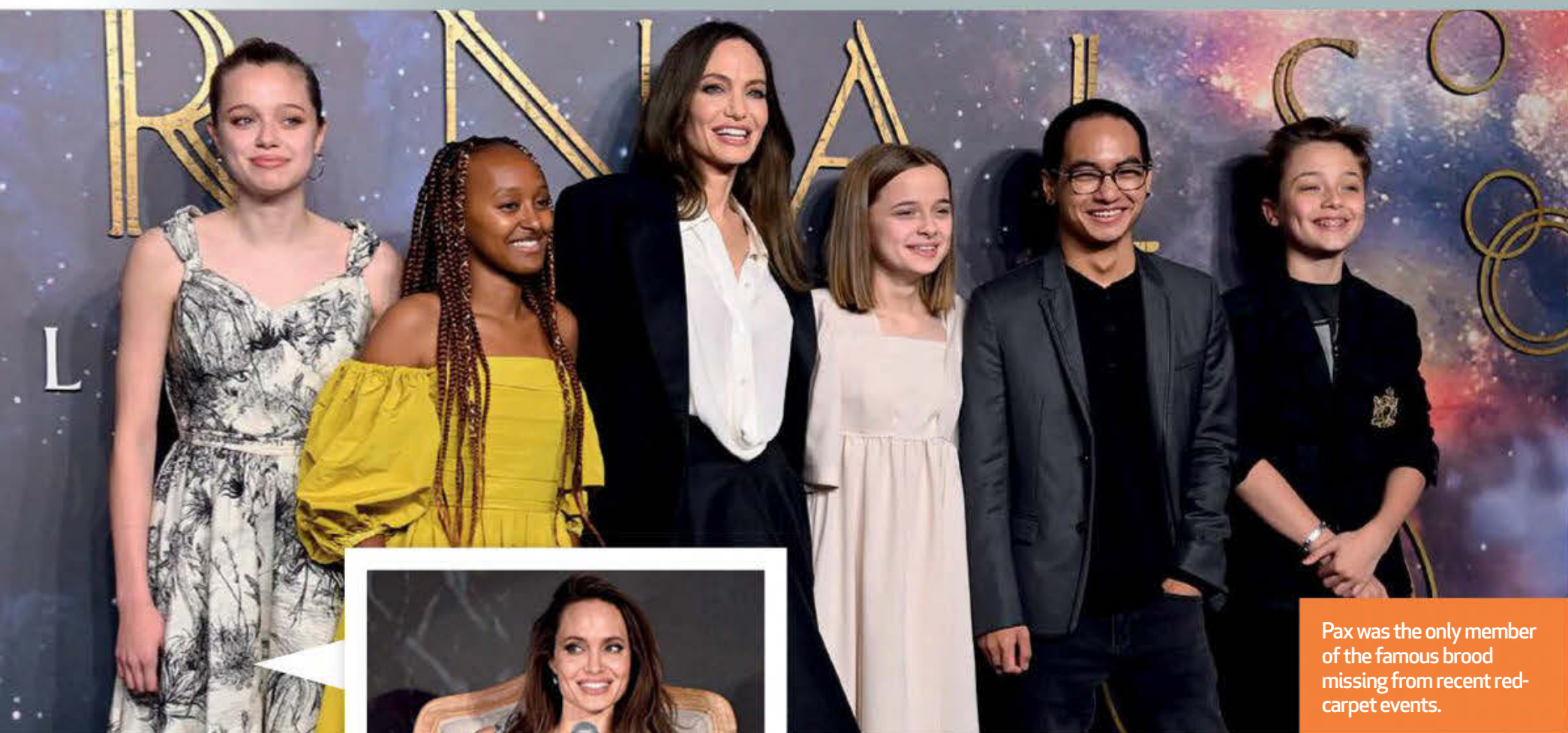
But she adds she isn't a perfect parent "by any means". "Every day I feel like I'm more aware of everything I don't do right. And I'm pretty tough on myself because I feel often, 'Am I doing the right thing? Did I say the right thing?'"

Yet the family she has is the family she has always dreamt of. "I feel so blessed to be a mother to children from different parts of the world and to learn about their cultures through them."

"I've always seen diversity as strength. I felt if I raised a family in the world, that I wouldn't have to say that to my kids – they would just see it."

The kids have been putting on a united family front as their parents' years-long custody battle faces new challenges.

In September, Angie told *The Guardian*

she and her children suffered trauma at the hands of Brad and indicated she feared for their safety during their marriage, which ended in 2016.

And now, after years of duking it out in court, the former couple seem no closer to settling on a child-custody agreement, especially after the California supreme court recently rejected Brad's latest legal bid for 50/50 custody of the kids.

The court gave no reason for rejecting Brad's appeal other than to say, "Petition for review and application for stay denied."

This means the case may have to go back to square one, with the court hear-

ing from both sides all over again.

Angie's lawyer, Robert Olson, welcomed the decision. "Ms Jolie is focused on her family and pleased that her children's wellbeing will not be guided by unethical behaviour," he said in a statement.

Insiders in Angie's camp say she's ready to put the pain of her split in the past and is even keen to dip her toe back in the dating pool.

Speculation swirled recently after she was seen hanging out with ex-husband, Jonny Lee Miller (48), and singer The Weeknd (31), and a friend says the star is "having so much fun right now".

"She wants to make up for lost time. She wasn't interested in dating anyone for years after the split from Brad because she was so busy being a mom and staying on top of her career.

"There's no pressure or expectation at this point, just a lot of fun, and Angelina's really enjoying it. Her friends haven't seen her this up and energised in forever."

Her children, however, remain her top focus. "They're pretty great people," she says. "I'm very honest with my kids. I'm very human with them. And so when they see me standing up there being a superhero, they don't see someone who's got it all together. They see the person they've known go through many different things – try her best, fail, be this, be that and then stand up.

"My children have done many, many loving things and their kindness has been very healing to me." □

BRING-YOUR-DAUGHTER-TO-WORK DAY

Angelina Jolie wasn't the only *Eternals* star to bring her children along to the London premiere of the movie.

Salma Hayek (55), who plays Ajak in the movie, was accompanied by her 14-year-old daughter, Valentina Paloma Pinault. The actress keeps her family mostly out of the spotlight and this marks the first time the teenager has joined her mother on

the red carpet since 2015, when they attended a screening of the animated film *The Prophet*.

Valentina – whose father is French businessman François-Henri Pinault (59) – has clearly inherited her mom's sense of style: she stepped out in a ruffled black and white polka-dot mini-dress by Saint Laurent, while Salma stunned in a plunging black and gold Gucci gown.

Valentina is impressed with her mom's role as the superhero. "She's cool, she's cool," she told *Entertainment Tonight*.

Salma describes her involvement in the movie as "humbling".

A Mexican woman in her fifties doesn't traditionally fit the image of a superhero, she says.

"I'm short with big boobs," she says. "I'm not muscly, I don't look like that. But this is real!"

SHE WAS SO KIND

Freinds tell how pastor Liesel and her family moved to KZN for a fresh start. Now she has been murdered in mysterious circumstances and her husband is in hospital **BY JOHANÉ SCOTT**

SHE had so much going for her – a congregation enchanted by her open style and outgoing personality, two little girls she adored, many friends, a full life.

So when Dutch Reformed minister Liesel de Jager (38) was found slain in the driveway of her home in Amanzimtoti, Kwa-Zulu-Natal, the community was in shock. An autopsy confirmed she'd died by strangulation. Nothing had been stolen – her keys, cellphone and handbag were all found at the scene.

There were so many unanswered questions – and the mystery deepened when her widower, Werner de Jager (43), went missing 10 days after her murder.

For four days authorities searched for him until he was eventually found in a serious condition in his car in a sugar plantation near Illovo, south of

Amanzimtoti.

Kyle van Reenen, national spokesperson for private medical emergency service Emer-G-Med, was on the scene when Werner was found and told YOU it appeared he'd been there for about four days.

The plantation is about 11 km from the manse where Werner's wife was murdered. He was admitted to an Amanzimtoti hospital and at the time of going to print was still being kept there.

In the aftermath of the tragedy, those close to Liesel say she put on a brave face to the world and always considered others before herself.

They also tell of Werner's long-term battle with depression and of previous incidents when he went missing and attempted suicide.

There were also regular trips from Upington – where Liesel had been a minister in the Dutch Reformed Church

Kanoneiland for eight years before moving to KZN – to Bloemfontein for counselling, they say.

But two members of Werner's family paint a different picture. They say he's spontaneous, kind and friendly and they've never seen any signs of depression in him.

They're also fed up with all the speculation and "finger-pointing" and want the matter to be left up to the authorities.

"Werner isn't a violent man," one relative says. "Family is very important to him."

Shortly before going to print, local police told YOU that the murder was still being investigated and they declined to confirm or deny whether they had a suspect.

He left the couple's two young daughters in the care of his in-laws, who'd travelled from the Free State after the tragedy to stay in the Dutch Reformed South Coast manse.

Then Werner went missing on 23 October – and a source close to the investigation told YOU he'd been scheduled for a lie-detector test the following Tuesday to give his side of the events.

Emer-G-Med's Van Reenen gave YOU details of what paramedics found four days later in a sugar plantation drenched with dew and heavy with humidity.

Werner was in his car and had sustained a broken collarbone and cracked ribs. His skin was puckered from moisture, Kyle says, adding that his own uniform rapidly became soaked as he made his way to the car through the sugarcane.

There was mud on the floor of the car, which indicates Werner could have got out at one point. He was dehydrated, freezing cold and disoriented, telling paramedics he was there with family.

There was no food or water in the car but two containers filled with petrol were found.

The paramedics administered fluids via an intravenous drip to stabilise Werner on the scene before he was taken to a helicopter in the paramedics' 4x4 vehicle and flown to hospital.

Insiders from the Kanoneiland congregation say Werner's troubled past had put a lot of strain on Liezel.

In 2015, he's alleged to have been found in a minibus, bloodied after having cut himself on a church outing.

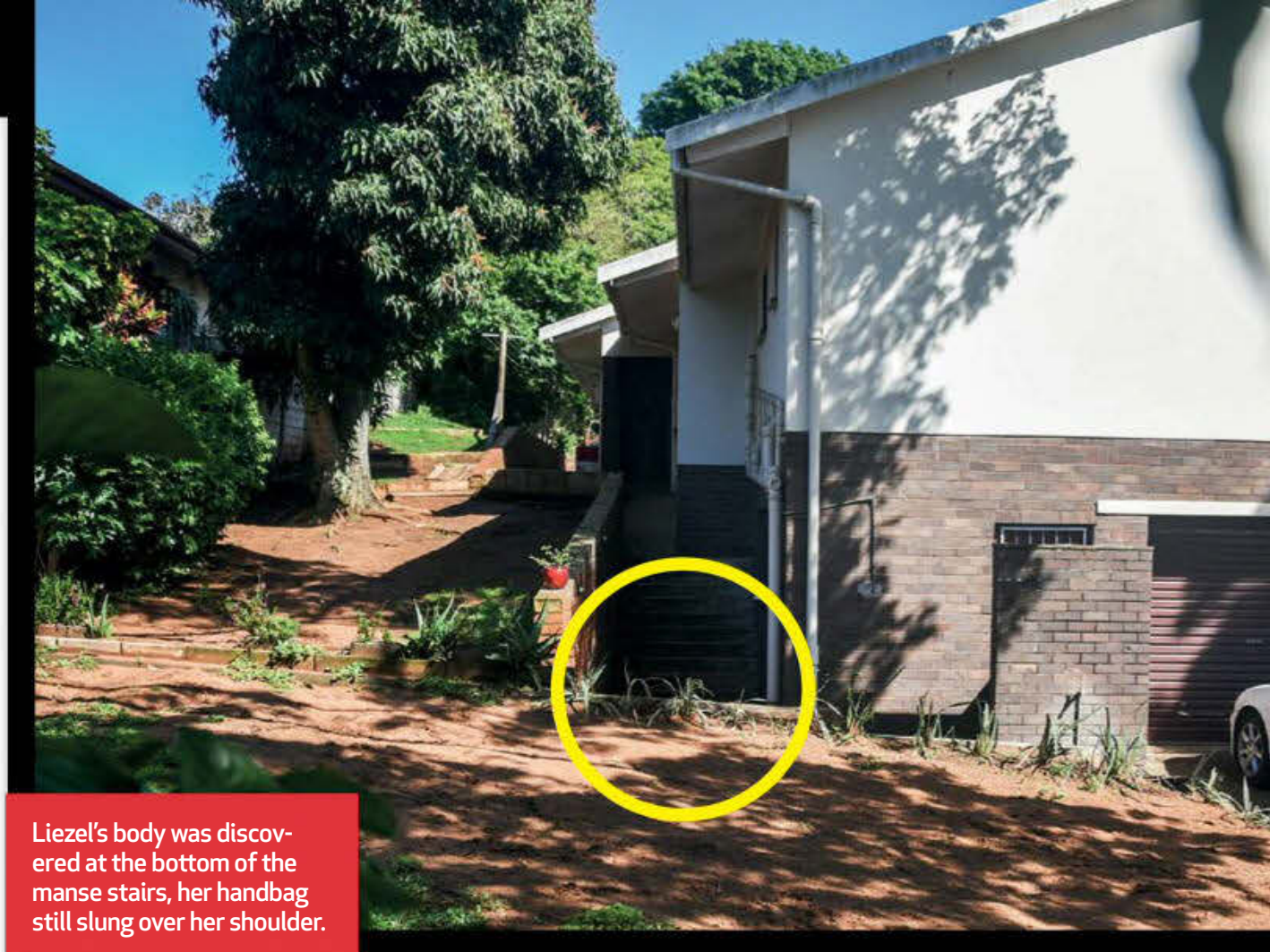
"My son found him and called us," the owner of the resort where the incident allegedly occurred tells YOU. "We drove him to Upington Mediclinic, which had dispatched an ambulance to meet us along the way."

In 2018, Werner disappeared again. After a day-long search he was found in Augrabies National Park with an open gas bottle in his car.

Liezel's friends say she was especially shaken after a bloodied Werner told her he'd been attacked by two men who'd tried to rape him.

She was so terrified she started self-defence training, but Werner later confessed in church that he'd lied about the incident and had cut himself.

"We were all deeply shocked," one of

Liezel's Upington friends says. "But the community forgave him and tried approaching him with empathy rather than rejection."

Everyone thought it showed "a lot of guts" that Werner and Liezel went for counselling together, the friend says.

'IT DIDN'T MATTER IF YOU WERE RICH OR POOR, SHE TREATED EVERYONE AS EQUALS'

Then, three years before her death, Liezel was called to serve the Amanzimtoti church. "We were very sad," the friend says. "But she and her family moved so they could make a fresh start."

THE circumstances of Liezel's death are still shrouded in mystery.

On the morning of 13 October she went out with her running group as she did most mornings.

Alan Payne, chair of the Amanzimtoti Athletics Club and organiser of the Trot Along running group the minister belonged to, says after their run Liezel left the group's meeting place, Synergy Café, in her car at about 5.40am.

The manse is a five-minute drive from the coffee shop. A source close to the in-

vestigation confirms that no suspicious people or vehicles were recorded during that time on neighbourhood security cameras.

The panic button at the manse was activated at around 6am. When the security firm called the home, Werner answered and told them the alarm had been triggered by mistake and that all was well.

But an hour later the panic button was activated again – and this time Werner was hysterical. He told them he'd found his wife's body in the driveway.

When security staff and police arrived at the scene, they found Liezel lying on her back on the ground with blood on her neck.

A source says she was possibly choked with a toy spade that was found next to her head, but that the force of it had bent the metal, cutting her neck. DNA samples were taken from under her fingernails, but at the time of going to print forensic results hadn't been released yet.

Liezel's friends are shattered at the loss of a woman they describe as exceptional. "It didn't matter if you were the richest of the rich or the poorest of the poor, she treated everyone as equals," one says.

She was a salt of the earth type too and enjoyed a good raunchy joke, the friends say.

"We all depended on her for advice," the Upington friend says. "This makes me want to scream and weep for her. I find it extremely upsetting that she moved from Upington to start a new life – only to be murdered there." □

'I DON'T WANT MY FAMILY TO FORGET ME

IF IT weren't for photographs, it would be hard to believe the woman lying in the bed is the same girl who danced on stage, beamed radiantly on her wedding day and joyfully cuddled her baby boy.

At just 26 years old, Carli van Aswegen is unrecognisable as the young woman she once was – full of energy with her whole life stretching ahead of her.

She has accepted that her days on Earth are numbered after receiving a devastating diagnosis just over a year ago. She has cancer of the brainstem and in December doctors told her there was little more that they could do for her.

"I'm not exactly afraid of dying but I do feel a little scared," Carli says, her eyes welling with tears. "I'm afraid that

heaven won't look the way I imagined it."

She wipes her tears with a hand swollen by medication. The young mom is being cared for by her husband, Daniel (27), who's keeping a constant vigil at her bedside in the garden cottage of his parents' home in Bloemfontein.

Little Micah, their three-year-old son, is at daycare but Carli's mom, Hester Potgieter, and her mom-in-law, Lulu van Aswegen, are here, slipping in and out of the room to check in on her.

Carli had her makeup done especially for YOU's photoshoot. She's had false lashes attached and there are blonde highlights in her hair. But, as a result of cortisone to counteract the side-effects of radiation, there's no sign of the willowy, healthy young woman who smiles from the pictures Lulu shows us.

"I miss being healthy, being able to pick up my son, to exercise, to play," Carli says.

She misses her career too – cancer forced her to quit her job as software developer in June last year.

She's battling a lot today, she tells us.

"I have a terrible headache and my body is sore. I don't want to die, but the way I feel today I actually want to. I know it's unfair to my little boy. He deserves a mom and my husband deserves a wife.

"But I also don't want them to move on and forget about me."

CARLI was an accomplished dancer at school. "I did modern, tap and hip-hop. It was liberating. I loved the spotlight," she says.

In one picture, she's wearing stiletto heels and a green off-the-shoulder top. "I swear I wouldn't even get that top over my thigh now," she says, a glimmer of her sense of humour shining through.

Daniel sits next to her, tenderly holding her hand. Since losing his job as a

salesman in January this year, he and Lulu have been Carli's full-time caregivers.

When he talks about meeting Carli 12 years ago, his face lights up.

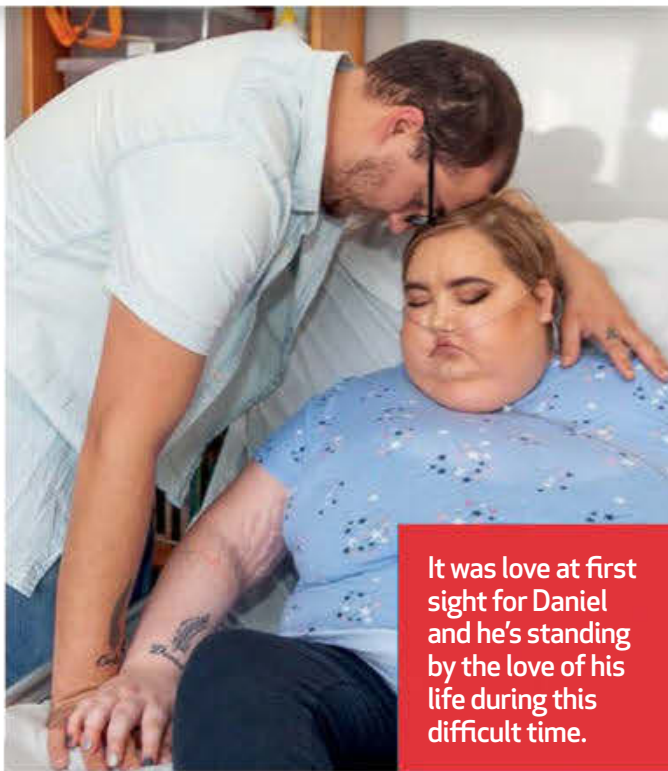
"It was at a youth camp and I turned to my friends and told them, 'That's the girl I'm going to marry'."

Life took them on different paths for a while but they did indeed end up getting married in an intimate beach ceremony at Scottburgh on the KwaZulu-Natal South Coast in September 2015.

The pictures fill Carli with melancholy. "It's terribly, terribly sad for me. It's incredible to think that I once looked like that."

Her problems started in January 2020, when she started having vision problems. She went to an optometrist and started wearing glasses but they didn't help for long. Then the fatigue started.

"I'd be sitting somewhere and fall

asleep right there," she recalls.

Still, she didn't think it was anything serious. "We were even discussing that we might be ready for another baby," she says.

When she started experiencing intense headaches and nausea in March last year, she initially thought she might be pregnant. She tested herself several times but each time the results came back negative.

"And every time we were disappointed."

Carli saw her GP three times about the nausea and she recommended the couple start a healthier lifestyle plan. They followed her orders but the nausea persisted.

"We went to see seven different doctors," Daniel says. "No one could pinpoint

what was wrong with Carli."

It got to the point where she couldn't continue working and in September last year she suddenly became so ill she had to go to the emergency room.

After a week-long battery of tests and an MRI, she was given the shocking diagnosis. She had a rare tumour, known as an ependymoma, growing in her brain-stem.

"I was so shocked that the doctor had to ask me if I understood what he was saying. I have brain cancer," she recalls.

The tumour was inoperable because it extended too deep into her brain tissue. Radiation was the only treatment option.

Carli started radiation in October last year in an attempt to shrink the tumour but in the end it could only limit its growth, not reduce it.

ER condition has deteriorated steadily since then. Now she can't even make herself a cup of coffee.

A full-time nurse has been helping since May and the local hospice is assisting with palliative care.

It's hard seeing her daughter suffer like this, Hester says. "It's a very emotional time. I try to visit her every day, so that it's not such a terrible shock to see her like this every time.

"I could ask God, 'Why my child?' But if it's not my child, then it'd be someone else's child. So instead, I'm asking the Lord, 'Why must my child suffer so much?'"

Carli recently started planning her funeral.

"I want a colourful memorial with lots of flowers," she says. "My ashes must be used to plant a tree. There must be a bench with my name on it. And very bright balloons."

Daniel shakes his head. "She's the best gift ever," he says, looking at his wife. "She's like getting a birthday present every day.

"Now it feels like she's planning the final party for us to throw her." □

MORE ABOUT CARLI'S CANCER

An ependymoma is a rare brain tumour that starts in the brain or spinal cord and mostly occurs in children, says Professor Michael Herbst, health specialist at the Cancer Association of South Africa.

It can, however, occur in young adults too, he adds.

The symptoms include headaches, convulsions, nausea and vomiting as well as erratic eye movements, neck pain and issues with balance.

"Treatment for a newly diagnosed ependymoma usually includes surgery, with or without radiation therapy, and sometimes also chemotherapy to destroy any remaining cancer cells."

Generally, 84% of patients live

longer than five years after an ependymoma is discovered, but that depends on the type and stage of development.

"The age and general health of the patient also determines the survival rate," he says.

CRICKET SA DROPS

The sport's governing body is in the headlines for all the wrong reasons after its bumbling of the Quinton de Kock row **BY NASIFA SULAIMAN**



SPORT has always been about more than the game. There are the colourful characters; the inspiring stories; the personal struggles; and, every now and then, enough behind-the-scenes drama to spin into an international furore.

Which is exactly what happened when Proteas star batsman Quinton De Kock defied an 11th-hour instruction from Cricket South Africa (CSA) that all players take the knee, a globally recognised gesture, before the start of their games in the T20 World Cup in Dubai in support of the fight against racism.

De Kock's stand divided the nation. He's racist, some cried. Shame on you, CSA, for forcing them just before a match, others said.

The incident once again shone the spotlight on CSA's handling of race-related matters. And again, it's the action of taking the knee that's landed the organisation in trouble.

In July last year fast bowler Lungi Ngidi said he'd support taking the knee and urged his teammates to do the same. His gesture opened a can of worms when several black players, including Makhaya Ntini and Paul Adams, shared their experiences of racism in cricket.

CSA then instituted the Social Justice and Nation-building (SJN) hearings, instigated to air

grievances and forge unity among the Proteas.

The cricket body has said it will wait until after the hearings, which are still ongoing, before saying or doing anything. But now it faces fresh criticism of bungling matters of race – we take a closer look.

A TEAM ON ITS KNEES

Before the T20 World Cup, the International Cricket Council (ICC) asked all teams to take a knee in support of the ICC's zero-tolerance approach to racism.

At the Proteas' first match against Australia, some players stood with raised fists, some took a knee and some stood with their hands behind their backs – a fragmented stance that raised many eyebrows.

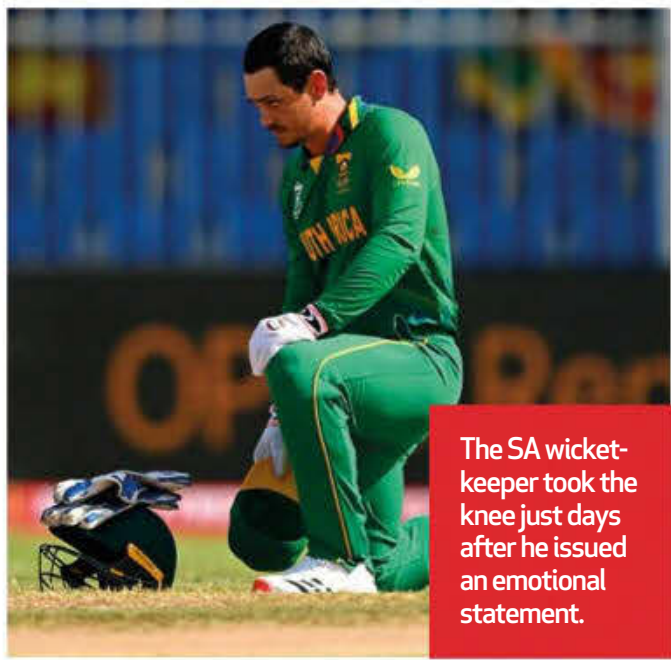
Three days later – just a few hours before South Africa was to play the West Indies – CSA ordered all players “to adopt a consistent and united stance against racism by taking the knee”.

“The board felt it was imperative for the team to be seen taking a united and consistent stand against racism, especially given SA's history,” it said in a statement.

Before the start of the match, De Kock announced he was withdrawing from the game. A two-day furore ensued as fans, pundits and politicians had their say on De Kock's withdrawal and CSA's instruction.

The drama could've been avoided, says Andrew Breetzke, CEO of the SA

Cricketers' Association. "Putting aside the merits of the CSA directive, the issuing of the directive to the team a few hours prior to match was unacceptable.

"The team had been preparing for this event for months, and their entire focus would have been on match-day preparations. The board disrupted the team and undermined the captain."

"CSA should have discussed the issue prior to the team's departure for Dubai because they had a situation last year where [some] players took the knee," Hugh Page, a former SA cricketer and national selector, tells YOU.

Breetzke adds the team underwent extensive culture and diversity training and their stance on taking the knee was in place for nearly a year. "The board should have engaged the team on this issue before the event as there was ample opportunity to do so."

Proteas captain Temba Bavuma earned praise for the way he handled the matter. "Quinton is an adult," he said. "We respect his decision, we respect his convictions."

De Kock initially said he'd keep his reasons to himself but two days later issued an emotional statement explaining

his circumstances.

"For those who don't know, I come from a mixed-race family. My half-sisters are coloured and my stepmom is black. For me, black lives have mattered since I was born. Not just because there was an international movement. I didn't understand why I had to prove it with a gesture, when I live and learn and love people from all walks of life every day. When you are told what to do, with no discussion, I felt like it takes away the meaning."

If taking a knee helped educate others, he'd happily do so, he said. Which he did at the start of the Proteas' next game against Sri Lanka.

POOR TIMING

Lawson Naidoo, chairman of the CSA board, acknowledged the timing was wrong but said the directive had to be sent. "The desire of players to express themselves as individuals was carefully weighed against the collective need to put an end to racism through words, deeds and action. Any notions of powers being abused, or rights being trampled, are fallacious," he said.

"Taking the knee is now the accepted global gesture against racism adopted by

sportspeople across sporting codes because they recognise the power sport has to bring people together."

RACISM IN SA CRICKET

CSA doesn't seem to have a handle on dealing with race issues, critics say. Earlier this year former CSA president Ray Mali called on Graeme Smith, CSA's director of cricket, and Proteas coach Mark Boucher to step down in the interests of "peace". Smith's appointment was considered "irregular".

Boucher's position came into question after Paul Adams testified in the SJN hearings, which is being overseen by transformation ombudsman advocate Dumisa Ntsebeza.

He said when they'd played together, Boucher and other players had adapted Boney M's song Brown Girl in the Ring to Brown S*** in the Ring, Adams revealed. "It's blatant racism," he added.

Boucher submitted an affidavit apologising for "any real and perceived inappropriate behaviour".

Around the same time former Proteas fast bowler Makhaya Ntini also spoke out about feeling isolated throughout his international career and how he'd chosen not to travel with the team as it heightened his feelings of being ostracised.

"I was forever lonely," he said. "The first thing that comes to mind when I think of loneliness, is to not have someone knocking on your door and saying, 'Let's go for dinner'. That's loneliness."

Smith's and Boucher's appointments were questioned by Omphile Ramela, a former CSA interim board member; Eugenia Kula-Ameyaw, a former independent board member; and Thabang Moroe, the former CEO of CSA.

"The damage has been done, and it won't help one bit if they remain in their positions," Mali said. "Our cricket won't come right while they're still in charge."

Smith and Boucher both remain in their positions. ■

IS IT LEGAL TO FORCE THE KNEE?

An employee has a duty to follow instructions that are lawful and reasonable, says Yvette Basson, senior lecturer in mercantile and labour law at the University of the Western Cape.

"In this case, the instruction to take a knee is clearly lawful

– however, the reasonableness of the instruction is questionable."

To be considered reasonable, the instruction must be within the ambit of the job and in this case the instruction was not reasonable as the directive was fraught with ques-

tionable elements.

"CSA run the risk of making the gesture performative in nature by compelling players to comply," she says. "In addition, a player's refusal to comply immediately creates a negative impression in the court of public opinion."

THE ROBOT SURGEON WILL SEE YOU NOW

Groote Schuur Hospital in Cape Town has become the first public hospital in Africa to offer robot-assisted surgery

IMAGINE it: you're wheeled into the operating theatre for surgery and discover that it won't be a surgeon who'll wield the scalpel but rather a huge robot with four arms.

Sounds like the stuff of science fiction, yet this is exactly what's on the cards at Groote Schuur Hospital in Cape Town.

Other hospitals around the world have been using robots to perform surgery for years and, with the arrival of a state-of-the-art R38-million Da Vinci Xi robot, which was developed in the US, Groote Schuur has become the first public hospital in Africa to offer robot-assisted surgery.

"It's really an amazing piece of equip-

ment," says Dr Samkele Salukazana, a urologist who's the hospital's robotic surgery coordinator.

The new acquisition can be used to perform an array of procedures – from cardiothoracic surgery to prostate ops and general surgery such as hernia repairs. The incisions it makes are much smaller than those that surgeons can make in traditional "open" surgery, so it's far less invasive with less pain and scarring and fewer complications, he says.

The arrival of the robot will augment the work of hospital surgeons. Although Da Vinci Xi – or Robbie the Robot, as staff at Groote Schuur have nicknamed the machine – will now take centre stage in the theatre, a surgeon will sit nearby at a console, looking into the viewfinder and using remote controls to guide the robot's arms.

Dr Salukazana says it's important to understand that the robot doesn't perform the operation. It's still the surgeon who calls the shots.

"We do the operation. It's just much

HOW THE DA VINCI XI ROBOT WORKS

The robot consists of three components:

1 THE TOWER This is the robot, which has four arms: three to wield instruments such as forceps, hooks, scalpels and needle-drivers and a fourth that holds cameras capable of 15 x magnification.

2 THE CONSOLE The surgeon sits here in the operating theatre, not far from the patient. He uses controls to operate the robot's arms while watching through a 3D stereoscopic monitor.

3 A VISION CART This makes communication between the two other components possible. It's equipped with a 3D high-definition vision system. Assistant surgeons stand here to monitor proceedings and can step in to help when needed.

easier and more comfortable. There are fewer complications and there's a better outcome for the doctor and the patient," he explains.

Doctors won't have to stand for four to six hours at a stretch, and for patients it means a much less invasive form of surgery. Dr Salukazana predicts that robotic surgery will be a game-changer for surgeons.

One of the robot's arms is equipped with hi-tech cameras, including an endoscopic camera with 3D digital optics, so the doctor has a perfect view of what's happening throughout the procedure.

"It offers a much wider range, as opposed to conventional laparoscopic surgery, which offers a two-dimensional view and limited range of movement."

The instruments Robbie uses also have 360-degree reach so it can access areas surgeons previously couldn't get to with equal accuracy.

The robot was designed to help operate in areas of the body that are difficult to access, Dr Salukazana says.

"This includes deep in the pelvis, where operating can become quite challenging. And it's used in other disciplines as well such as colorectal surgery, for malignancy and in urogynaecology for prolapse surgery."

WHILE the arrival of the robot marks the start of a new era at Groote Schuur, other local hospitals in the private sector have made use of robotic technology since 2013. The Da Vinci Xi is just a more advanced level of it.

Dr Salukazana looks visibly excited as he lists all the ways in which Robbie will shake things up.

Currently, for example, an assistant surgeon has to hold the camera throughout the procedure when a surgeon performs conventional laparoscopic surgery.

But that no longer will be necessary, thanks to Robbie, Dr Salukazana says. Although the assistant and nursing staff will still be present, the robot will do the camera work.

And Robbie can wield the surgical instruments with such precision, making the smaller incisions that cause far less tissue damage and speed up recovery.



Surgery to remove the prostate gland, for example, results in the patient needing a catheter for three weeks. But if it's done robotically the catheter can be removed within five days.

Using the robot also reduces the duration of surgical procedures, Dr Salukazana says.

For instance, doing a radical prostatectomy with open surgery takes three to four hours, which could be cut down to two to three hours with extensive training and experience using the robot.

Groote Schuur's surgeons are eager to get going but still need training so the first robotic surgery at the hospital will take place only in February next year.

"We're so excited," Dr Salukazana says. "But I think it's quite obvious that the people who are really going to benefit from this are our patients." □

DA VINCI SUCCESS STORIES

- This robot is the preferred option in the UK for removing prostate tumours, which are difficult to cut out using traditional keyhole surgery. "We can see the anatomy of the prostate like we've never seen it before," says Professor Freddie Hamdy, Nuffield professor of surgery and urology at the University of Oxford.

- Remarkable online footage shows a grape inside a long-necked bottle as a surgeon uses a robot to reach in to reattach part of its severed skin. The robot is so precise it allows the surgeon to perform this intricate procedure on delicate grape skin in a confined space.

- Last year a team of 14 surgeons

at Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital in the UK used a Da Vinci robot to perform a first-of-its-kind operation on a man with rectal cancer.

For this kind of operation usually a surgeon specialising in the bowel starts the operation, followed by a prostate specialist and finally a plastic surgeon who re-

pairs external damage, all working in shifts. But with the help of the robot and its three arms they were able to do all three stages simultaneously, shortening the op from 12 hours to 10.

And instead of needing three weeks in hospital to recuperate, the patient could be discharged within seven days.

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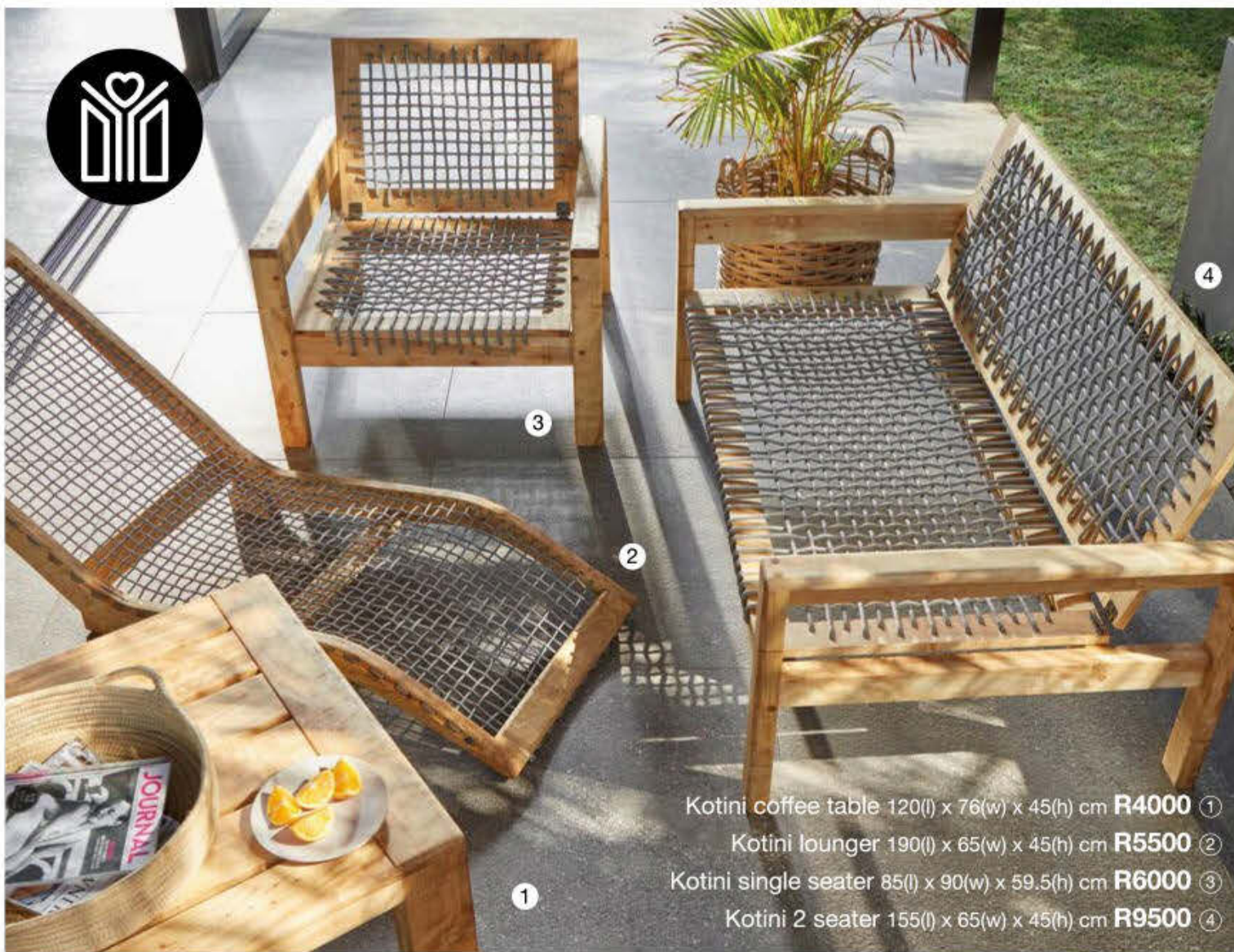

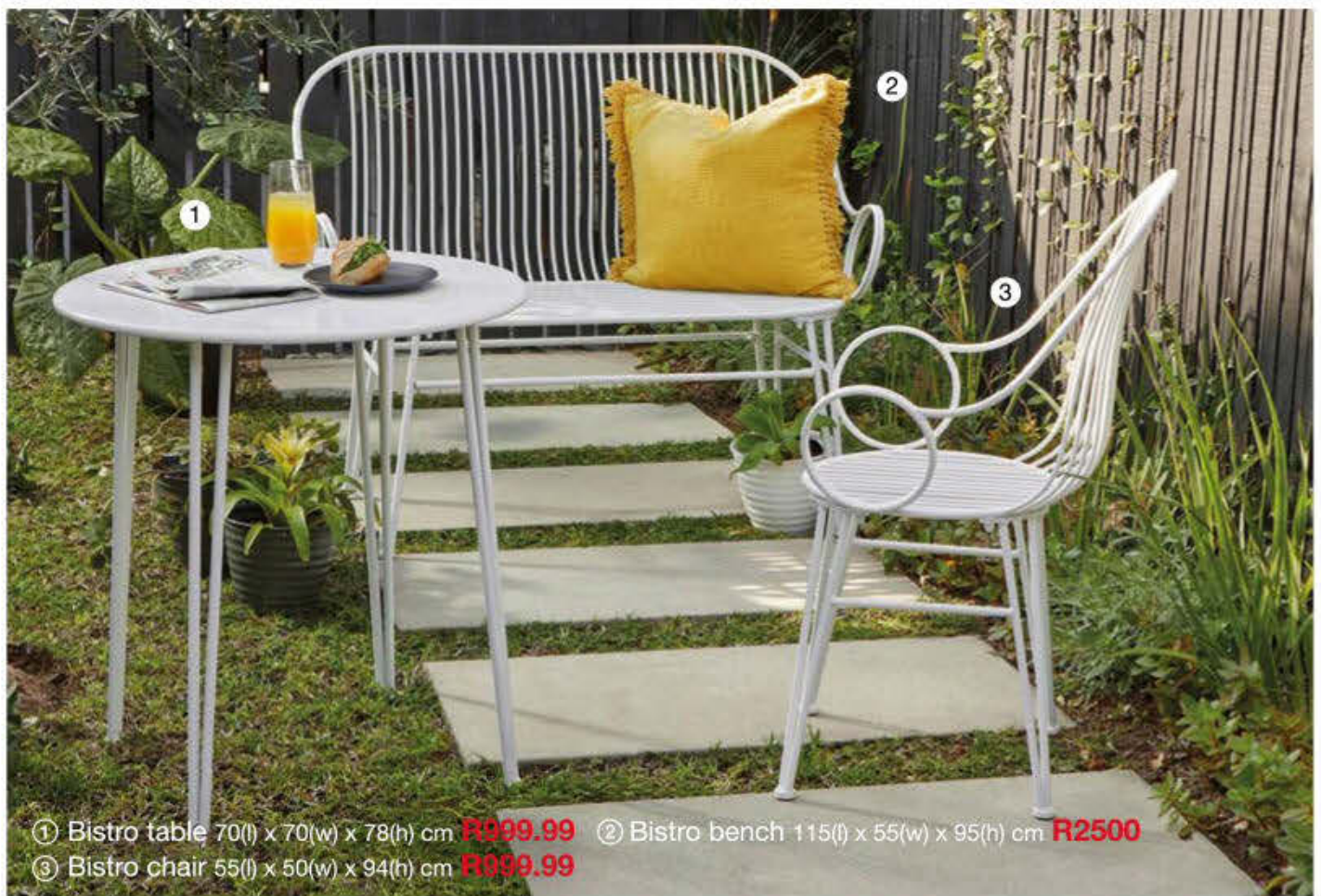

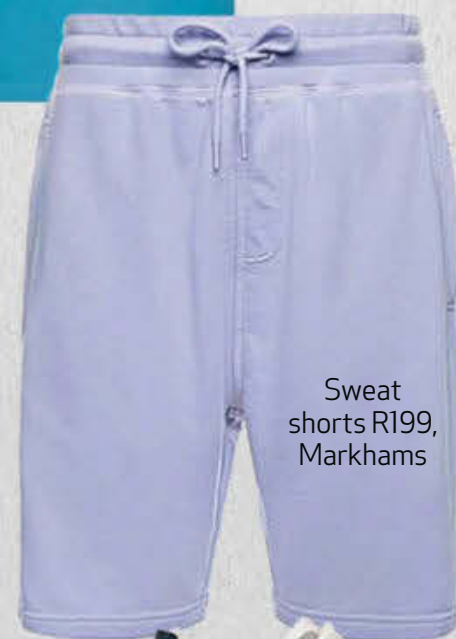

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YOGA FOR YOUR FACE

Downward dog and cobra may be great for the body, but there are also moves you can do to tone your face. Firm up and improve its appearance with this easy guide **BY NTHABISENG MAKHOKHA**

EXERCISE helps keep your body firm, youthful and healthy. But did you know there are exercises you can do with your face that will alleviate stress and may make you look younger?

As we age, a few things happen to our skin that contribute to ageing. These include:

- Less sebum production, which leads to drier skin. When skin is dry it's prone to wrinkles and uneven tone and texture.
- Loss of collagen, which leads to loss of volume in the skin.
- Loss of elasticity, which means sagging skin because of stretched muscles.

"Because facial ageing is due in part

to muscle loss, if you can commit to a routine, exercise may strengthen those muscles, making the entire face look [firmer and more] youthful," Beauty Lab senior chemist Sabina Wizemann told Good Housekeeping.

Consistency is key. If you commit to daily facial exercises, results can be seen in a month to five months, Wizemann says.

"If you like a challenge and can stick to a 30-minute daily beauty routine for at least five months, you could possibly look a couple of years younger," she says.

But not just any facial exercise will work. You need to find ones that are in line with your needs. Each person is

different and will react differently to exercises.

Some techniques include massaging certain points of the face while others involve stretching the face in different ways using facial expressions.

These can improve wrinkles and tone the skin around the eyes; reduce the appearance of frown, stress and smile lines; improve jowls; firm up sagging areas such as cheeks and neck; and firm up your pout.

Facial yoga also stimulates the lymphatic system.

We rounded up a selection of popular facial exercises for you to try – but feel free to explore online, where you'll find a host of other moves.

CHIN MASSAGE

Good for firming the skin around the jawline.

- Begin lightly pinching along your jawline using the tips of your fingers and your thumbs. Do this for 20-30 seconds.
- Put your thumbs right below your jawline under your chin. Press them upwards behind the jawline. Do this for 20-30 seconds.
- Put one hand under your chin and slide it along the jawline towards your ear. Repeat on the other side. Do it for 15-20 seconds.



THE V

Good for drooping eyelids, crow's feet and eye bags.

- Apply pressure along your eyebrows using your three middle fingers, with your index fingers on the outer corners and ring fingers on the inner corners, making V shapes.
- Look up and make a forceful squint with your eyes, then relax. Repeat six times, then close your eyes tightly for 10 seconds.



LIFTED CHEEKS

Good for giving cheeks a lifted, plumped look.

- Smile as wide as you can, without opening your lips or showing your teeth. Hold the pose for 5 seconds.
- Next, stretch the corners of your mouth laterally (to the sides) while keeping your lips together and hold for 10 seconds.
- Expand the lateral stretch and part your lips to expose the edge of your teeth; hold for 10 seconds. Smile as wide as you can, with your teeth showing; hold for 10 seconds. Repeat 4-6 times.



SMILE SMOOTHER

Good for cheek lines and sagging skin.

- Make an "O" shape with your mouth, hiding your teeth with your lips.
- Next, smile widely while keeping the teeth hidden. Repeat this six times. Hold the smile shape with your index fingers.
- Then, as the head tilts back slightly, begin to move the jaw up and down. Relax and repeat twice more.



UPPER LIP

This exercise may help with vertical wrinkles above the upper lip, especially those caused by ageing and smoking.

- Place your index fingers, tucked up and close together, along your upper lip beneath the nose so the fingers meet.
- Push your lip forward with your fingers while trying to push against your fingers with your upper lip. Hold this for 10 seconds. Repeat 5-10 times.



JAW LIFT

Good for strengthening muscles around the jaw.

- Open your mouth and stick out your tongue.
- Next, circle the tongue around the mouth, making a full circle clockwise then anticlockwise.
- Bring tongue back into your mouth and relax your face and mouth. Repeat this four times.
- When done, say A-E-I-O-U, exaggerating your mouth movement with each letter. Hold each letter for a count of three. Repeat four times.

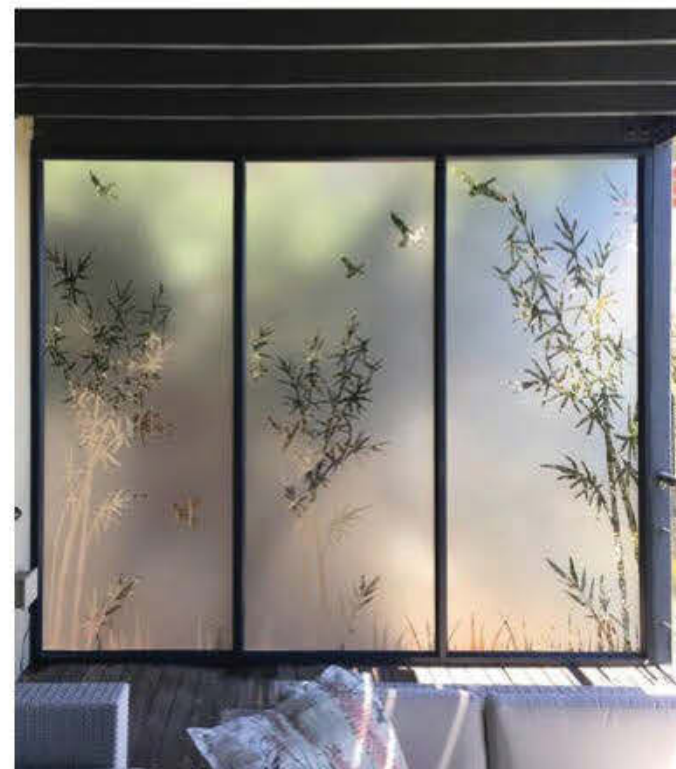

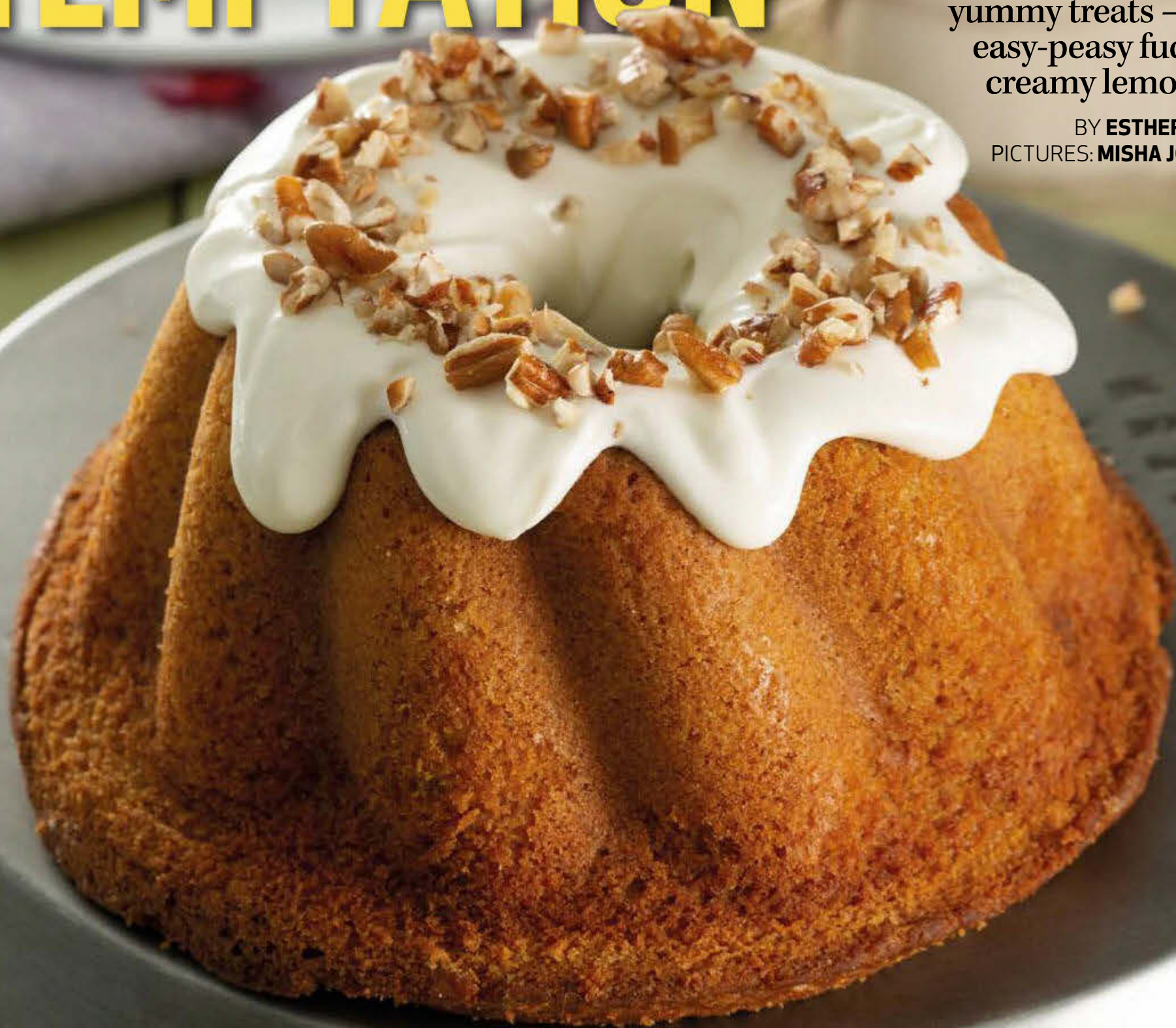

SWEET TEMPTATION

There's no end to what you can do with a can of condensed milk! Try these yummy treats – from easy-peasy fudge to creamy lemon tart

PECAN CONDENSED MILK CAKE

We use condensed milk to sweeten the cake and the topping. The condensed milk in the batter ensures the cake turns a deep golden brown when it's baked.

MAKES 1 MEDIUM RING CAKE

**PREPARATION: 15 MIN
+ COOLING
BAKING: 40-45 MIN**

CAKE

- 250g soft margarine
- 125ml (½c) light brown sugar
- 125ml (½c) condensed milk
- 5ml (1t) vanilla essence
- 4 eggs
- 500ml (2c) self-raising flour
- 5ml (1t) ground cinnamon
- 5ml (1t) ground ginger

- 2,5ml (½t) salt
 - 125ml (½c) milk
- TOPPING**
- 250ml (1c) cream
 - 125ml (½c) condensed milk
 - 100g pecan nuts, finely chopped

Preheat the oven to 180°C. Grease a 20cm ring baking tin well with margarine or butter and dust with a little cake flour.

1 Cake Beat the margarine

and sugar until pale and creamy. Add the condensed milk and vanilla essence and beat until smooth. Beat in the eggs one by one.

2 Sift the flour, cinnamon, ginger and salt together and add to the egg mixture. Mix lightly and add the milk. Mix to a smooth batter and spoon into the prepared baking tin.

3 Bake the cake for 40-45

minutes or until a skewer inserted in the middle comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes in the tin, turn out carefully and cool completely on a wire rack.

4 Topping Whisk the cream until stiff. Whisk the condensed milk into the cream and spoon over the cooled cake. Generously sprinkle the nuts on top and serve.

RAINBOW CONDENSED MILK CUSTARD BISCUITS

The condensed milk makes these biscuits extra delicious. You can even freeze half the dough and bake a second batch later – simply defrost in the fridge overnight and bake according to the recipe.

MAKES ABOUT 48 BISCUITS

**PREPARATION: 20 MIN
+ COOLING
CHILLING: 1 HOUR
BAKING: 12-14 MIN A BATCH**

- ▮ 250g butter at room temperature
- ▮ 10ml (2t) vanilla essence
- ▮ 1 can (385g) condensed milk
- ▮ 625ml (2½c) self-raising flour
- ▮ 125ml (½c) custard powder
- ▮ 2,5ml (½t) salt

TO FINISH

- ▮ 250ml (1c) “hundreds and thousands” cake sprinkles

Preheat the oven to 170°C. Line 2 large baking sheets with baking paper and grease well with nonstick spray.

- 1** Beat the butter and vanilla essence together until smooth and creamy. Add the condensed milk and beat until well combined.
- 2** Sift the flour, custard powder and salt over the butter mixture and mix with a wooden spoon

until a soft dough forms.

- 3** Spoon onto a sheet of clingfilm, cover well and chill in the fridge for at least 1 hour.
- 4 To finish** Roll the dough into walnut-sized balls then roll in the cake sprinkles to coat. Arrange batches on the baking sheets (the biscuits will spread slightly

while baking) and press with a fork to flatten a little bit.

- 5** Bake the biscuits for 12-14 minutes a batch or until lightly risen. Cool for 10 minutes on the baking sheets, then allow to cool completely on wire racks.
- 6** Store biscuits in an airtight container. ➤



PEANUT BUTTER BISCUIT FUDGE

This cheat's version of fudge gives the real thing a run for its money. And it's so easy to make that even kids can whip up a batch.

MAKES 32-36 SQUARES (DEPENDING ON SIZE)

PREPARATION: 10 MIN

COOKING: 5 MIN

SETTING: 3 HOURS OR OVERNIGHT

- 250ml (1c) peanut butter
- 250g butter
- 125ml (½c) condensed milk

- 750ml (3c) icing sugar, sifted
- 100g ginger or spice biscuits, finely crushed
- a pinch of sea salt (optional)

Line a 25cm dish with non-stick baking paper.

1 Put the peanut butter and butter in a heavy-based saucepan. Heat

over medium heat, stirring continuously until melted.

2 Add the condensed milk, remove from the heat and sift in the icing sugar. Mix well. Add the crushed biscuits, mix well and spoon into the lined dish.

3 Smooth the top and allow to set in the fridge for at least 3 hours or overnight.

4 Carefully turn out the fudge. Cut into squares and sprinkle the salt over (if using). Store in an airtight container in the fridge.





STRAWBERRY AND CONDENSED MILK ICE CREAM BARS

Ice cream bars make an ideal summer dessert or sweet treat. Vary the flavour by using other fruit or berries instead of the strawberries.

MAKES ABOUT 16 BARS
PREPARATION: 15 MIN

FREEZING: 4 HOURS OR OVERNIGHT

CRUST

- 1 packet (200g) Tennis or Marie biscuits, crushed
- finely grated zest of 1 lemon
- 100g butter, melted

ICE CREAM LAYER

- 500g fresh strawberries, hulled and halved
- 1 can (385g) condensed milk
- 1 can (380g) evaporated milk, chilled overnight

- 250ml (1c) plain double-cream yoghurt

TO SERVE

- freeze-dried strawberries (optional)

Line a 25cm rectangular ovenproof dish or baking tin with baking paper and grease with nonstick spray.

1 Crust Mix the biscuits, lemon zest and butter well and press onto the base of the prepared

dish or baking tin.

2 Ice cream layer Put the strawberries and condensed milk in the bowl of a food processor and pulse until smooth and well combined.

3 Pour the chilled evaporated milk into a large mixing bowl and beat with an electric hand beater or balloon whisk until thick and creamy.

4 Beat in half the straw-

berry mixture. Fold in the rest of the strawberry mixture and the yoghurt and pour over the biscuit crumb crust. Freeze for at least 4 hours or overnight until well set.

5 To serve Cut into bars and crumble freeze-dried strawberries over (if using). ➤

CONDENSED MILK CHOCOLATE BROWNIES

MAKES 12-18 BROWNIES

PREPARATION: 15 MIN

COOKING: 40 MIN

- ▶ 1 can (385g) condensed milk
- ▶ 250g butter

- ▶ 125ml (½c) light brown sugar
- ▶ 15ml (1T) vanilla essence
- ▶ 80ml (⅓c) cocoa powder
- ▶ 375ml (1½c) cake flour
- ▶ 5ml (1t) baking powder
- ▶ 2,5ml (½t) salt
- ▶ 100g white chocolate, coarsely chopped (optional)

Preheat the oven to 160°C. Line a 20cm brownie tin or deep roasting pan with baking paper and grease with nonstick spray.

1 Heat the condensed milk and butter in a saucepan until melted, then remove from the heat.

2 Add the sugar and vanilla

essence and mix well. Sift the cocoa powder, flour, baking powder and salt together and add to the condensed milk mixture. Mix until a smooth batter forms then spoon into the prepared baking tin or roasting pan. Sprinkle the chocolate

over (if using).

3 Bake for 30-35 minutes or until done but still a little moist in the middle. Cool in the tin or pan then slice as desired.





LEMON TART

We replace the traditional meringue topping with a smooth yoghurt and cream mixture in this heavenly tart.

MAKES 1 MEDIUM TART

PREPARATION: 20 MIN

COOKING: 15 MIN

+ CHILLING

COOLING: ABOUT 2 HOURS

CRUST

- ▶ 1 packet (200g) Tennis or Marie biscuits, crushed
- ▶ 100g butter, melted

FILLING

- ▶ 2 cans (385g each) condensed milk

- ▶ 250ml (1c) lemon juice

- ▶ 6 egg yolks

TOPPING

- ▶ 60ml (¼c) condensed milk
- ▶ 125ml (½c) plain double-cream yoghurt
- ▶ 125ml (½c) cream
- ▶ finely grated zest of 1 orange

Preheat the oven to 180°C. Grease a 25cm loose-based tart tin well with nonstick spray.

1 Crust Mix the biscuit crumbs and butter well and press firmly onto the base of the tart tin. Chill in the fridge until needed.

2 Filling Beat the condensed milk and lemon juice together until pale

and thick.

Beat in the egg yolks and spoon the filling over the crust. Smooth the top and bake for 15 minutes. Remove from the oven and allow to cool completely.

3 Chill the tart in the fridge for at least 1 hour.

4 Topping Mix the condensed milk and yoghurt well. Whisk the cream in another bowl until stiff and fold into the yoghurt mixture.

5 Spread the yoghurt mixture over the tart and sprinkle the orange zest over. Slice and serve. □

AFFECTING OUR HEALTH?

Life today may be convenient but it seems to be threatening our wellbeing **BY RACHEL SMITH**

TAKEAWAYS

WE'RE PAYING A HIGH HEALTH PRICE FOR EASY MEALS

Dinner after a busy work day can be as easy as picking up the phone or grabbing a pizza or ready meal on the way home. But while the convenience of easy meals saves us time and effort, there's a price to pay in terms of nutrition and our health.

Fast food tends to be high in fat and sodium (salt) and low in fibre and nutrients, so eating it more than just occasionally could be putting you at a greater risk of heart disease, some cancers and type 2 diabetes.

Reduce your risk ...

By choosing wisely. The nutritional value of fast food varies widely – you can get salads or vegetable dishes that are better choices from a nutritional perspective.

“Be cautious about ready meals – some may be just as high in fat and salt as fast food options such as burgers,” says Marissa Olsen, a dietician at the School of Dentistry and Health Sciences at Charles Sturt University in Bathurst, Australia. “Look for a meal that has less than 10g fat per 100g and less than 120mg sodium per 100g and that's more than 8% fibre. A good target for fibre is 25 to 30g a day.”

POPPING PILLS

ARE YOU TAKING MEDICATION INSTEAD OF MAKING CRUCIAL LIFESTYLE CHANGES?

You've got a headache. Period pain.



A sore knee. The flu. Before you can say Grey's Anatomy, out comes the painkiller, a decongestant or a prescription antibiotic. Medication use has

risen steeply over the past three decades, with millions of pills being popped daily.

How much of that medication could be ditched if we made healthy lifestyle changes instead?

A lot, predicts Dr Leon Massage of the Body Metabolism Institute in St Kilda,

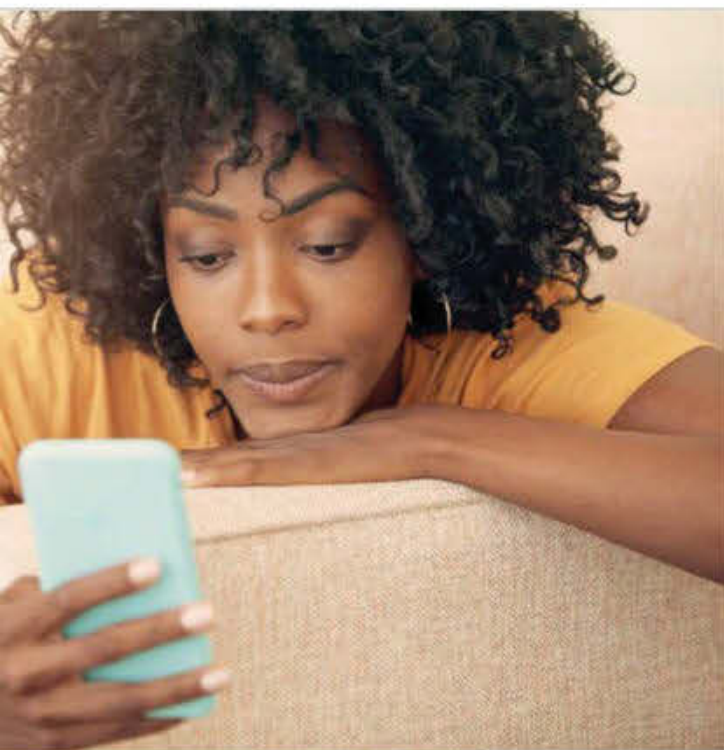

Australia. “Many medications only treat the symptoms and unless you absolutely have to soldier on, there might be better techniques to try first, like getting more rest, drinking more fluids, eating more healthily or taking the day off if you're battling a cold or flu.”

Reduce your risk ...

By treating health issues with lifestyle changes rather than just masking the symptoms with medication. Aim to take medication only when you absolutely need to – and this includes antibiotics, which are abused by far too many people, Massage says.

“Many GPs are put under pressure to prescribe antibiotics when patients don't need them, which is causing a higher rate of antibiotic resistance. We're reaching a stage where many antibiotics are becoming totally ineffective against the diseases they're supposed to treat. If you can avoid taking antibiotics, you should.”



CELLPHONE ADDICTION

IT'S A HARD HABIT TO BREAK

How many times a day do you reach for your phone? Do you feel anxious without it? If so, you're not alone. Diana James of Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane, Australia, has studied problematic cellphone use for many years and says although we depend on our phones, constant connectivity is a big burden.

"I call it emotional tethering – you're tethered to the phone and tethered to the technology and there's no escape, which is both emotionally and physically draining."

There are more cellphones in South Africa than people, and when we start to rely on our phones as "adult pacifiers", as one expert puts it, the health risks can be

serious. Cellphone users in James' survey reported everything from dips in productivity to sleep deprivation (which is also linked to weight gain). The jury is still out on whether cellphones cause brain tumours, but some researchers insist children are more at risk.

Reduce your risk ...

By setting boundaries. "Establish a rule to switch your phone off at a certain time each night so you're forced to have some wind-down time, instead of your brain always being on call," Australian psychologist Jacqui Manning says.

"And aim to switch it off or check it only once or twice over weekends, until that reduced usage becomes a habit."

More than 80% of high school children in South Africa own cellphones. If you're a parent, consider limiting your child's mobile phone usage, Manning says.

MP3 PLAYERS

WHY IT'S NOT COOL TO CRANK UP THE VOLUME

If you're often turning up the dial on your earphones, you could be damaging your hearing, warns Dr Peter Friedland of the Ear Science Institute Australia.

"We grade sound on decibels, so 30 decibels is a whisper and 50 to 60 decibels is a normal conversation," he explains. "Anything above 80 to 85 decibels is damaging. With earphones or headphones, the music is often very loud and because the speaker is in close proximity to the ears, that's problematic."

He also warns that "hearing loss manifests only after 10 to 15 years of accumulated noise exposure and by then it's often too late".

"Eventually, like warnings on cigarette packets, there'll be warnings on iPods and MP3 players to let us know they can endanger our hearing."



Reduce your risk ...

By giving your ears a break and not listening to your iPod for hours at a time. If you're going to a music concert or exercise class, you can minimise your exposure to loud noise with over-the-counter earplugs, Friedland says.

"People think earplugs will alter the sound and interrupt the quality of their enjoyment, but like putting on a pair of sunglasses in bright light enhances your vision, earplugs can filter out damaging noise levels and enhance the quality of sound you're hearing, as well as protect your ears."

BOTTLED WATER

SHOULD WE STEER CLEAR OF IT?

Plastic isn't only problematic because of what it's doing to the planet – it can also be harmful to our health due to Bisphenol-A (BPA), a chemical used in the manufacture of certain plastics, including those used in bottled water, babies' bottles, cans and food containers.

BPA is an endocrine disruptor, and reports have suggested it may migrate into the contents of the plastic containers – and be passed on to us.

The jury's still out, but studies indicate low levels of BPA may have an effect on fertility.

Reduce your risk ...

By using a glass or BPA-free water bottle instead of buying a bottle of water whenever you need one, Massage says. □

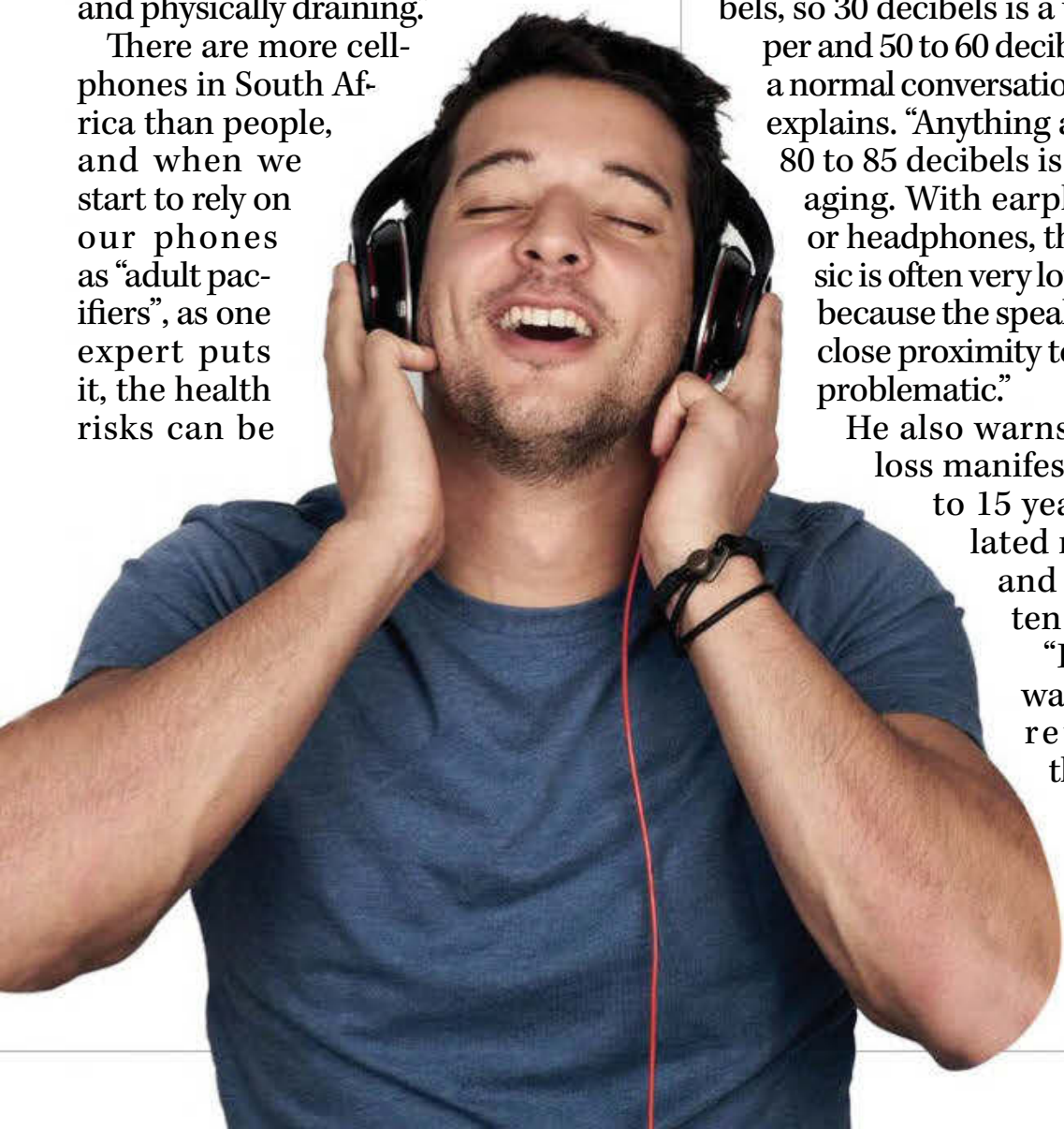
OTHER THINGS TO RECONSIDER

Scented candles

Beware of those cheap candles from discount stores – they're often made of paraffin, which is believed to release carcinogens, as well as triggering allergies or asthma. Instead, buy beeswax or soy candles and ventilate the room well.

Air fresheners

They're a quick and convenient way to mask cooking smells or musty odours, but a US study published in the journal *Environmental Health* reports that synthetic air fresheners contain potentially carcinogenic chemicals known as phthalates, and they've also been linked to headaches. Swop for natural aromatherapy sprays instead.

I'm 78 now and 25kg overweight. About three years ago I was diagnosed with type 2 diabetes and was advised to lose weight, but I've found it impossible to do.

I've tried a low-carb high-protein diet and am now on a whole-food plant diet, but it feels as if it's all just been one step forward and two steps back. I stick to the overall plan so I've realised it must be because I simply eat too much of whatever is permitted.

Try as I might, I just can't seem to manage limiting the amount I eat. I don't understand this as I'm not a stupid woman. I have every intention of doing it but I always end up eating more. Why do I sabotage myself? How can I curb the need to eat so much?

A Human beings don't only eat to sustain themselves. We eat for emotional reasons as well, which is precisely why losing weight is such a challenge for many people.

It could be that your subconscious mind associates food with nurturing, and that your apparent inability to stop eating is addressing a need for nurturing, soothing and comfort. If this is the case you need to consult a psychologist who can help you figure out how to nurture yourself in other ways so you don't constantly reach for food.

It could also be a way to deal with anxiety, and a psychologist can help you learn to deal with this better too.

Research has also shown that being sexually abused in childhood can lead to self-destructive overeating. If some kind of trauma may be the reason, it's important to speak to a psychologist, possibly one trained in hypnotherapy so that the problem can be resolved in hypnoanalysis.

The reason could also be more straightforward – perhaps the type of food you're eating isn't the right diet for you, in which case it's not about the amount of food you're eating but rather the type of food you're consuming.

Consider consulting a dietician who can determine if this is the case and then work out an eating plan for you.

I NEED TO RETIRE BUT I CAN'T LET GO

Q I'm on the verge of retiring and have appointed a wonderful person to manage the business I built. The problem is I don't seem to be able to let go. I'm still with the company and can't stop myself from interfering in the appointed manager's job and in a way sabotaging her work.

I don't understand why I'm doing this as it would be wonderful for my wife and I to retire to the seaside and just relax and have more time for each other. My wife and I started with nothing and I built up my company from scratch and now have a thriving and high-income business.

Surely we deserve to take it easy and reap the benefits of our hard work over the years? Unfortunately we don't have children who can take over and run the business.

A It's understandable that you'd feel protective of your business and find it difficult to trust your new manager fully – even though your mind tells you that she's competent and will be able to do a good job. Your business was your "baby" after all.

For this to have happened you would've trusted yourself over the years to make the right decisions. So trust is the keyword here. Trust that you've made the right decision with this new manager and ride off into the sunset with your wife.

However, instead of leaving the company all of a sudden, phase out your involvement. Start spending less time at the office, perhaps just two or three days a week, and then gradually lessen the time. Perhaps cut it down to once a week and then once every two weeks, until you get to the stage where you're only attending board meetings once every two to three months.

Why do I find it so difficult to listen to the responsible part of myself and ignore the part that just wants to be in the arms of a man?

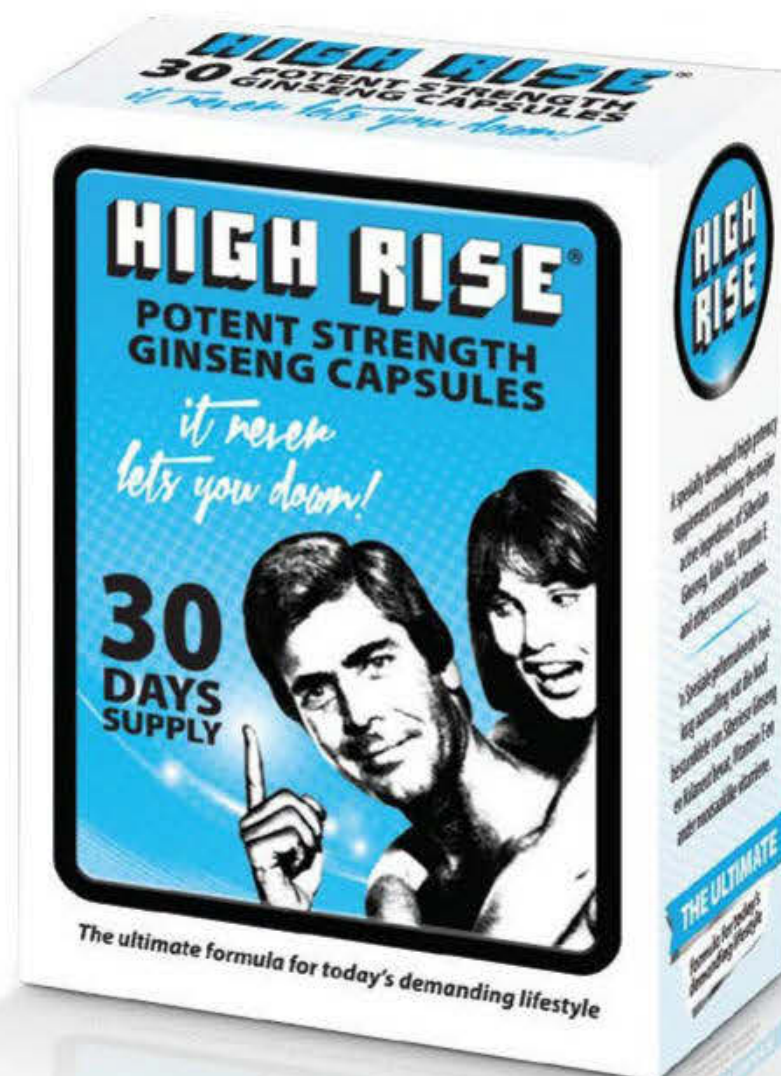

YOU'RE about to buy something online when you're given a choice: buy now, pay later (BNPL), interest-free over three months. It sounds too

good to be true but BNPL options are increasingly popular, both in SA and internationally. Research on BNPL in SA shows an annual growth of nearly 70% a year in this market.



WHAT IS IT?

BNPL lets you stagger the payment of your purchase over for example three payments, without interest and fees (provided you make the payments on time). The money is automatically deducted from your chosen debit or credit card. It differs from lay-by in that you immediately receive the goods and don't have to wait until you've paid the full amount.

In SA the big BNPL providers are Payflex, PayJustNow, Mobicred and MoreTyme. These providers have agreements with retailers so that customers can use their payment methods with the retailer. Transactions can be done in-store, online on the provider's app or using QR codes, says Tauriq Keraan, CEO of TymeBank.

Depending on the provider, your purchase can be spread over three or four payments. The repayment period isn't very long and is usually about two months. Often it means you pay half the purchase price immediately, and the rest

in equal parts, or the entire payment is divided into equal parts. For example, you buy clothing for R2 000. You pay R1 000 immediately, then R500 a month over the next two months. Or you buy trainers for R2 700 and pay it off in three instalments of R900 each. You'll receive email or text reminders to ensure there's enough money in your bank account so you don't miss a payment.



HOW DO YOU APPLY?

You can apply on BNPL providers' websites or by choosing BNPL as a payment method when you pay on the retailer's site. You simply provide your ID number, and your application is speedily assessed online and without the need for paperwork. The provider will check your credit status and this will determine your purchasing limit. Once your application has been approved, you can complete the transaction within minutes, Keraan says.

The requirements are usually that:

- You're a legal South African

resident aged 18 or older.

- You have a valid debit or credit card.
- You have a valid email address and cellphone number.
- You're permanently employed or are self-sufficient.
- You don't have too much debt and you're not in debt counselling, debt review or administration and have not been sequestered.



WHAT IF YOU WANT TO RETURN AN ITEM?

It will depend on the retailer's terms and conditions. You'll get your money back once the retailer has notified the BNPL provider to pay it into your account. If the retailer refunds you directly – for example with cash, credit or vouchers – you still have to pay the BNPL instalments.



CAN YOU PAY THE AMOUNT OFF SOONER?

It depends on the BNPL provider, but you should be able to make earlier payments. Check the provider's website.



IS IT BETTER THAN USING A CREDIT CARD?

It's usually much quicker and easier than applying for a credit card. If you keep up with your instalments, it's a truly interest-free way of buying and there are no fees. You won't pay a cent more for the item than the original price, Keraan says.

Credit cards, on the other

hand, only offer 55 interest-free days and only if you repay the specific amount in full within that period. If not, the interest on credit cards is high. Credit cards also usually come with monthly administration and credit facility fees.

Because BNPL only covers a short period, you shouldn't be able to amass a large amount of debt with this payment method. With credit cards you have more flexibility when it comes to repayments and there's usually interest involved, so the chance of getting into a debt trap is greater.



WHAT ARE THE DOWNSIDES?

You don't earn points or rewards with purchases. Your purchases are also limited to the retailers who have agreements with BNPL providers. But as BNPL becomes more popular, more retailers are making use of it. However, you can't make international purchases this way.



WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU MISS A PAYMENT?

There's a penalty fee and interest will be charged. MoreTyme, for example, has a late-payment penalty fee of R65 and charges 2% interest if payments are missed. Some providers charge fees of more than R100 for each unsuccessful attempt to debit your account. It's best to find out beforehand what will happen if you miss a payment. □

TIP

If your bank details change, inform your BNPL provider immediately. If you don't, a repayment might not be able to go off your account and you'll end up having to pay a penalty fee and interest.

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5 HIDDEN GERM HAZARDS

Protect yourself and your furry friend from falling ill by following these tips

THERE are plenty of secret nasties living in everything from your dogs' water bowl to their poop, some of which can cause disease in humans. Let's take a look.

1 GERMY LICKS

While many owners allow their dogs to lick them, it's really not a good idea. "Simply put, humans aren't meant to tolerate some of the bacteria dogs carry in their saliva," says Kelly Reynolds, associate professor of environmental health at the University of Arizona in the US.

While dogs have evolved to compensate for not having dental care, older dogs are prone to gum disease, tooth decay and foul breath, she points out. "These carry bacteria, not to mention the nasty germs they pick up from the environment."

As we know, dogs love getting into the gross stuff, whether it's the rubbish, another animal's poop, a dead bird, a dirty puddle – the list goes on.

● **What to do** "You don't need to stop your dog licking you entirely but you should try to keep your face and any wounds off-limits."

Washing your face afterwards is also recommended.

2 GRIMY PET BOWLS

Food and water bowls can be a breeding ground for a host of germs and bacteria with salmonella and E.coli being two of the worst culprits.

BON APPETIT Stainless steel food and water bowls are the best option. Remember to wash well daily.

SWEET DREAMS Keeping your dog in tip-top condition will prevent him passing on parasites and allergens to you. Brush, deflea and deworm him regularly.

"It's very important to wash and disinfect them regularly," says Dr Jessica Vogelsang, veterinarian and author of iHeartDogs. "These bacteria can cause illness in pets and people. The young, elderly, and immune-compromised are especially at risk."

Even dry foods leave residue that can result in harmful bacteria.

A recent study compared the bacterial content found in plastic, ceramic and stainless steel water bowls and found the plastic ones contained the highest bacterial count and stainless steel carried the least.

● **What to do** Wash food and water bowls daily, either in a dishwasher or with soap and hot water. You should also soak them in water and a half-teaspoon of bleach for 10 minutes every now and again.

Also consider investing in stainless steel or ceramic bowls as plastic ones can crack easily, giving germs an easy place to breed.

3 INFECTED BEDDING

While we know about cleaning our own bedding, our pets' bedding is often ignored. These blankets, mattresses, towels and more can harbour myriad bacteria as well as ticks, mites and fleas that carry disease.

A dog's kennel can also become dirty and unhygienic.

● **What to do** Regularly wash your pets' bedding either in the washing machine or in the bath. In between you can vacuum it or spray with pet bed cleaner (available at most pet shops).

When it comes to kennels it's best to disinfect them. Don't use ammonia cleaners though as the smell is similar to

urine and can cause your dog to urinate in his kennel. Also make sure you rinse it off completely because if any residue gets on your dogs' paws it can make them sick when they lick it off.

4 TOXIC POOP

Dog poop unfortunately is an ideal environment for bacterial growth and should never be left, whether you're out walking in a public place or at home. One of the most contagious and aggressive illnesses that a dog can get is parvovirus, which is commonly spread through infected poop.

Other bacteria such as E.coli, giardia and salmonella can cause severe diarrhoea, vomiting and dehydration in humans and pets. Parasites such as hookworm are another risk.

Stools that are left also attract flies, gnats and mosquitoes, which are renowned disease-spreaders.

● **What to do** Pick up your dog's poop daily, whether at home or out on a walk.

5 ITCHY BEDMATES

Many pet owners let their dogs or cats sleep in their beds, but there are health risks attached.

Parasites such as worms, bacteria and fungi can pass more easily from the animal to you due to the closer proximity. Fleas can carry diseases such as typhus and plague while cat-scratch disease can be transmitted if you're licked – or scratched – by an infected cat.

Pets can also carry allergens such as dust and pollen into your bed, which can aggravate allergies and asthma.

● **What to do** Regularly brush, deflea and deworm your pets. Also make sure they are up to date with their vaccinations. □

Gal Gadot

The actress plays the world's greatest thief in *Red Notice*

Boldly billed as “Netflix’s biggest movie ever”, action-comedy *Red Notice* stars Gal Gadot as Sarah Black, the world’s greatest thief, and Dwayne Johnson as top FBI profiler John Hartley, who’s forced to work with the world’s best con artist, Nolan Booth (Ryan Reynolds) to capture her.

The movie is directed by Rawson Marshall Thurber, who also helmed *Sky-Scraper*, and it reteams Johnson and Reynolds, who worked together, albeit briefly, in *Fast & Furious Presents: Hobbs & Shaw*.

WORKING WITH PALS

Gal (36), who was born in Israel and is best known for playing Wonder Woman, has been sharing her excitement about *Red Notice*. Her character frequently faces off with Ryan and Dwayne’s characters and it was a blast, she says.

“Let me just put this here... I can’t wait for you to see this one. @Netflix’s biggest movie RED NOTICE premiering Nov 12th on any screen near you! Thank you @rawsonthurber for bringing me onto this project. Being able to work with my friends @vancityreynolds and @therock was the icing on the cake,” she captioned an Instagram post.

Her friends and co-stars gushed about working with her too, with Ryan tweeting, “I’d wear a tux and do karate with @TheRock and @GalGadot every day if I could.”

SUPERPOWERS

Gal has long been vocal about the depiction of female superheroes on-screen. She says it’s important for her to be a strong example to kids of all ages, including the three daughters she shares with husband Yaron Varsano.

“It is so important for girls and boys to have a female, strong superhero to look up to. And I’m very

happy to be a part of it,” she says.

The actress and former model, who grew up in the small Israeli city Rosh HaAyin, starred in the *Fast & Furious* series before becoming Wonder Woman in *Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice*.

But she very nearly quit acting before landing the Wonder Woman part.

“I came to Los Angeles for 30 hours [for a *Batman v Superman* camera test] while shooting a movie in Tel Aviv. But I wanted the role of Wonder Woman so much that it was worth the trip,” she wrote on Instagram.

“I’ll forever be grateful to [director] Zack [Snyder] for casting me and believing that I could bring Diana [Prince, Wonder Woman’s alter ego] to life. I was on the verge of giving up acting... and then this happened”.

SUPER SEQUELS

Wonder Woman director Patty Jenkins has at least two more stories planned for the next WW movies, she told EW.com. They’ll complete her run on the series, with Gal reprising her role as the super-powered warrior princess.

And, after the surprising return from the dead of Han (Sung Kang) in the *Fast & Furious* movies, fans have been wondering if Gal’s character, Gisele, could also be resurrected for upcoming sequels.

“I’m an advocate of that,” said Kang while promoting the release of the director’s cut of *F9* recently.

“I think we need Gisele back... in every way. I think the fans want that. We need to make that happen somehow.” □

Free Guy

Film studios have long tried to tap into a readymade audience of gamers with movies based on popular videogames, but few have been successful.

A much better proposition seems to be setting a film inside a game, which allows filmmakers to recreate the feeling of being a player as well as commenting on gaming subculture.

Following in the footsteps of *Tron* (1982), *Wreck-It Ralph* (2012) and the *Jumanji* films, *Free Guy* is set inside a game, the *Grand Theft Auto*-like *Free City*, in which most gamers give in to their baser

instincts, playing criminals who wreak havoc by destroying buildings and killing innocent non-playable characters (NPCs).

Guy (Reynolds) is one of these NPCs, a super-perky bank teller who happily goes through his repetitive days wearing the same clothes, buying the same coffee and lying on the floor chatting to his security guard friend Buddy (Get Out's Howery), while their bank is robbed by one of the players.

But Guy's routine is disrupted when he notices kick-ass player Molotovgirl (Comer from *Killing Eve*), and he starts to deviate from his programming in the hope of meeting her again. This leads him on a journey that will shake the foundations of his world.

To say more would ruin the exhilaration of seeing where the smart and playful script

leads, but if you've watched *The Truman Show* (1998) or *The Lego Movie* (2014) you should have an idea.

Non-gamers might not get all the in-jokes and references, but the metanarrative about characters becoming self-aware explores surprisingly weighty themes such as existential angst and free will.

Reynolds and Howery are so endearing you can't help but root for them, while Comer and Joe Keery (*Stranger Things*) provide likeable support and Taika Waititi (*Jojo Rabbit*) chews the scenery in hilarious fashion as the villain.

The action set pieces are funny and thrilling, and the spectacular special effects immerse you in the virtual world.

Free Guy is a warm, witty and exuberant film that should leave you with a big grin on your face.

Crime documentary. This is one of the most moving non-fiction programmes on Netflix and should leave you utterly devastated. The mini-series takes viewers through the short life of eight-year-old **Gabriel Fernandez**, who was tortured and abused by his mother and stepfather until he died in 2013.

In the documentary, Los Angeles deputy district attorney Jon Hatami shines a spotlight on America's broken welfare system and the unseen abuse of young children. Viewers get the chance to hear what Gabriel's family have to say and during the court case you see first-hand the distressing revelations about what happened to the little boy.

The most pertinent question Hatami asks is, "Why did no one intervene to save this young child's life?"

Viewers should be warned that the doccic contains footage not appropriate for sensitive viewers.

The horrific details will shock you to your core, but unfortunately South Africans can relate all too well to the situation depicted.

DREAM HORSE ★★★★★

True-life sport drama. Set in a small valley town in South Wales, *Dream Horse* tells the true story of a group of down-and-out neighbours brought together by an unlikely ambition.

Between cleaning the local store by day and pulling pints in the village pub at night, Jan Vokes (**Toni Collette**) is caught in a monotonous cycle leading nowhere.

As she remembers her glory days breeding racing pigeons, it becomes clear that Jan longs for



a break from this humdrum routine. When she hears accountant Howard Davies (*Billions*' Damian Lewis) reminisce about his heyday as part of a horseracing syndicate, Jan becomes determined to buy a mare and breed a racehorse.

Lacking experience and funds,

she turns to her neighbours for help. With a less than 1% chance of making any money out of such a pursuit, the group rely on their desire for *hwyl* – a Welsh term denoting a feeling of emotional motivation and energy – and an alliance is formed. Their investment pays off as their thoroughbred, *Dream Alliance*, rises through the ranks to compete with the racing elite.

As a typical feel-good underdog story, *Dream Horse* is predictable, but this doesn't detract from the

edge-of-your-seat moments during the thrilling race sequences where spot-on cinematography and editing place the viewer right in the action.

Collette gives an outstanding performance that anchors the emotional gravity of the film.

Jan and her motley crew should win viewers' hearts and inspire you in this tale about rising above challenges and keeping dreams alive. - NATALI VARNEY

Jeremy Loops

The Postcards singer chats to us about his latest release

SA'S favourite folk-rock star has released an EP that includes his smash hit Postcards. We caught up with Jeremy to chat about it and his epic collaboration with Ladysmith Black Mambazo.

How would you describe Souvenirs?

It's just this little collection of unique songs I love and am proud of. I think people are going to enjoy it for its differences from a traditional album.

Why did you pick that title?

Some people collect trinkets as souvenirs, but they're ultimately just capsules, physical manifestations of memories of an important time or interesting experience. These songs are that for me.

How did the EP come about?

While we were in lockdown I asked myself, since I was stuck indoors, "If I could make any songs I wanted without any pressures, what would they be?" And that's how Souvenirs came to be.

Is a full-length album on the way?

Yes there is, but it's not quite ready yet. It'll come out in 2022.

What's your favourite track on the album?

I would have to say This Town. It's just

the most joyous, most healing, most hopeful song, but it's also set against this backdrop where "This Town" is a metaphor for present-day South Africa with all its difficulties.

I think that's Ladysmith Black Mambazo's superpower – their ability to emanate healing through their music, and this collaboration really takes the best of what I do with my songs and what they do with theirs. It's something special.

How did the collab with Ladysmith come about?

I've dreamt of collaborating with them my whole career. I've been listening to them since I was a child. It's like I said, with this EP, I asked myself, "If I could do anything, reach out to anyone, make

anything, what would that be?" And they were top of the list. So I just reached out and they received me so graciously and so warmly.

I flew to Durban to practise and write and record the song with them and then we flew them to Cape Town to come make the music video with me, which was equally epic. Definitely a career highlight for me.

You were just in the UK to record. Tell us about that?

I literally go into the studio and write and record songs until like 2am, and then repeat! It's like athletes who hit training camp before a big competition. It just puts you in the zone and by the end of it you've got so many brilliant ideas flowing. I could write and record in Cape Town, but there are way too many distractions, especially with the weather warming up.

If you look at legendary SA bands like the Springbok Nude Girls and Juluka, who have lasted decades, do they inspire you?

For sure. Any artist who has that kind of longevity is an inspiration. The staying power and focus it takes to remain creative, ignore the bluster and remain

true to your purpose is admirable. So my hat off to anyone who makes it even 10 years in this game.

What advice would you give your younger self?

Don't get older and wiser? Ha. To be honest, I would tell my teenage self to not take myself so seriously. Young people are ridiculous in their broodiness sometimes – no judgment, I was like that too – and that self-seriousness gets in the way of your development and insights.

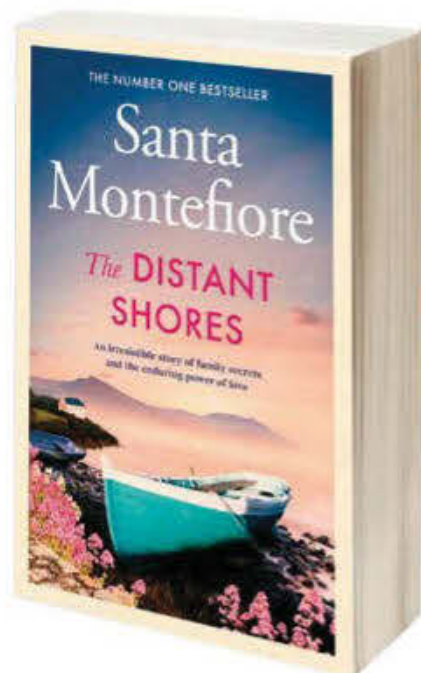

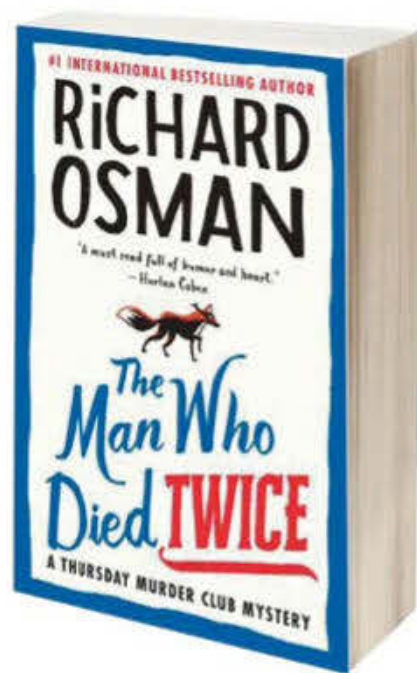
Lord Deverill's son Colm, the local vet, isn't happy about Margot delving into the family history but his father is adamant the story needs to be told.

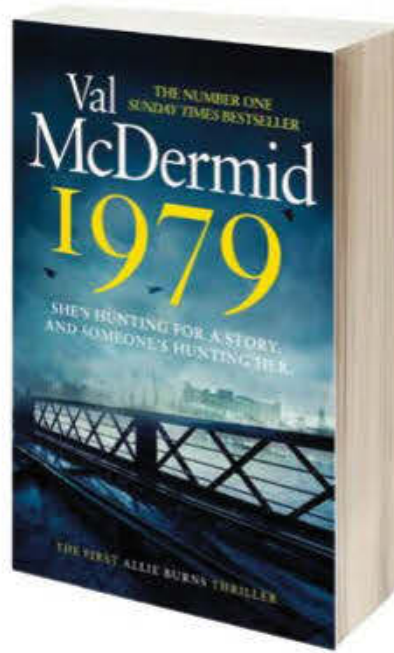

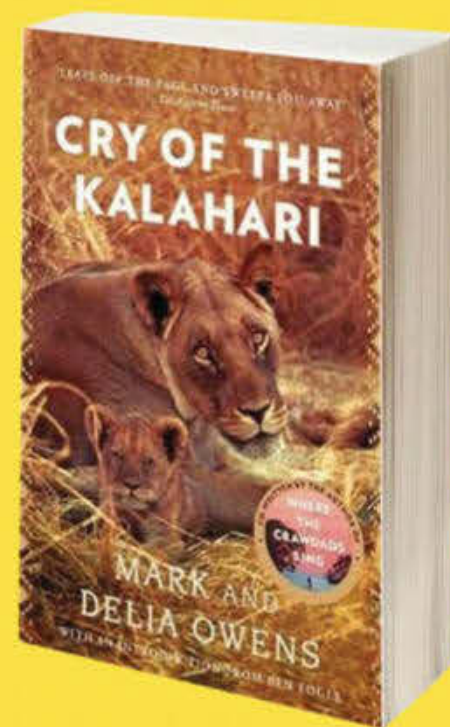

Back then the area wasn't the tourist hub it is now but really was one of the remotest spots on Earth – yet somehow, through a combination of naivety, pluck and sheer luck, Delia and Mark managed to overcome all kinds of challenges – from fire to bouts of malaria – and at the end of it all they had an incredible story to tell.

Rockets

How is it possible for these massive machines to travel into space?

HAVE you ever blown up a balloon and then let it go without tying off the end? Seen how it shoots away as the air rushes out? This is the basic principles of what enables rockets to fly into space. Of course, the effect in a rocket is on a much grander scale – after all, it's an enormous machine carrying tons of fuel, equipment and sometimes crew into space. But the basic principle is the same. Let's find out more about rockets.



NEWTON'S LAWS

To explain how and why everything on Earth moves, we have **Newton's laws of motion**, which were first worked out by English mathematician Isaac Newton (1643-1727). In simple terms, the three main laws are:

- An object at rest will stay at **rest** and an object that's **moving** will keep moving unless a **force** acts upon it (the law of inertia).
- The **heavier** an object (its mass), the **more force** is needed for it to move.
- For every **action**, there is an equal and opposite **reaction**.

It's the third law of motion that helps us to understand why a balloon shoots away when you suddenly let the air out, as well as why a

rocket will leave the planet's surface if enough fuel is burnt. The **combustion (burning) of fuel** inside the rocket causes huge amounts of by-products to be **expelled (forced out) at great speed** from the nozzles mounted at the bottom of the rocket.

The earth beneath the rocket reacts by **pushing back with the same amount of force**, making it possible for the rocket to lift off.



MAIN PARTS

Before learning how rockets get to space, let's look at the **four main sections of a rocket**: the structural system, payload, guidance system and propulsion system.

■ The **structural system** is the **frame** of the rocket and is similar to the fuselage of an aircraft. It's in the shape of a **cylinder** with a pointed aerodynamic nose and fins that help **minimise drag** (air resistance or friction) and **provide stability** so the rocket keeps pointing in the right direction without wobbling.

The frame is made of **light, durable material** such as **aluminium** or **titanium**. It needs to be resistant to **high speeds** during the launch, as well as **intense heat** caused by drag as it hurtles towards space.

The frame is coated in a **thermal protection system** to keep out the intense heat caused by drag during flight and to keep in the cold temperature needed for the fuel to stay in liquid form.

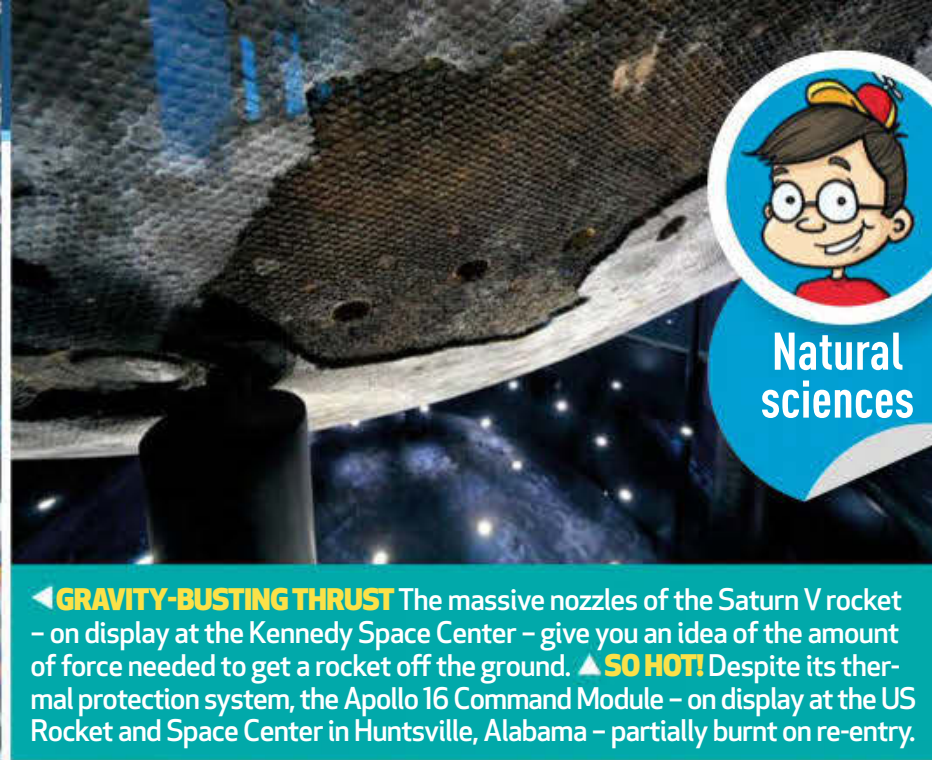
■ The **payload** is the **object the rocket is carrying into space**. It can be anything from a satellite or space probe to a spacecraft with astronauts, animals or supplies. For example, the 111m-tall Saturn V rocket, which Nasa used between 1967 and 1973, could launch a 118-ton payload into orbit around Earth, or 43,5 tons all the way to the moon. With full fuel tanks, Saturn V weighed an incredible 2 800 tons.

■ The guidance system in a rocket ensures that it stays on its planned course to its destination. The guid-

DID YOU KNOW?

The first rocket was invented around the year 1100 in China. It was made of bamboo shoots filled with gunpowder and was used both as weapons and as fireworks. The Chinese first successfully used these "rocket arrows" in 1232 against the Mongols during the battle of Kai-Keng.

ance system includes computers, sensors, radar and communications systems. ■ Rockets need to do more than just get off the ground. Loaded with heavy equipment, rockets must break free from Earth's atmosphere, get into orbit and have the ability to cover immense distances – sometimes as far as the moon or other planets.

This is where the propulsion system comes in. This part takes up most of the rocket's length. The propulsion system is made up of components that help launch the rocket and propel (push) it in a particular direction. It's also in this section that you'll find vast amounts of fuel.

Rocket fuel, the propellant, can be solid matter or liquid and is stored in the rocket's fuel chamber(s). The fuel is ignited (burns) by mixing it with oxygen gas. This causes a controlled but powerful explosion beneath the rocket, pushing it into the sky. The momentum (movement) caused in this way is called jet propulsion.

Remember Newton's second law of movement? The heavier the object, the more force is needed for it to move. Certain heavy rockets need solid propellant boosters. These boosters are fixed to the rocket parallel to the main engine to provide extra thrust and achieve a speed of about 28 000km/h for the first two minutes of flight. This helps the rocket escape Earth's gravitational pull. As soon as the boosters run out of fuel, they disconnect from the rocket and the main engine takes over. The boosters fall into the sea and are recovered for reuse.

As soon as the rocket is in orbit, it disconnects from the payload because the rocket is no longer needed for the mission. The rocket segments are discarded and either burn up in Earth's atmosphere or land in the ocean.



CHANGING TRAJECTORY

A rocket is always launched vertically (straight up). But after about a minute, it starts turning into a lateral (sideways) position by moving the nozzles so they point more to the left or right. This is called a gravity turn or zero lift turn, because it uses Earth's gravity to steer the rocket onto the desired trajectory (path), which saves fuel. This also minimises drag on the rocket.



VISIONARIES

Though we might think of rockets as modern inventions, the idea of space travel using rockets isn't new. In the 1880s Russian teacher Konstantin E Tsiolkovsky (1857-1935) suggested rockets could be used this way.

His ideas helped American engineer Robert H Goddard (1882-1945) build the first liquid-fuelled rocket in 1925-26. Though this rocket only reached a height of 12,4m in a flight that lasted 2,5 seconds, it wasn't long before scientists started making progress in the new field of rocket science.

Unfortunately, this progress wasn't always motivated by good intentions. During World War 2, the Nazis developed the V2 rocket as a weapon. Many people in Britain were killed by these ballistic missiles that used liquid-propellant rocket engines. After the war the Russians and Americans competed in the Space Race to

see who could land on the moon first. This led to the development of space stations that orbit Earth and space probes sent into space.

Other countries such as China and the European Union have also started sending rockets into space. Lately, private space-travel companies have been responsible for the most important progress in rocket technology. One of the most significant is SpaceX, situated in Hawthorne, California in the US. SA-born billionaire Elon Musk founded this aerospace manufacturer and space-transportation company.

SpaceX's Falcon 9 is the first orbital-type partially reusable rocket and was designed to take payloads and astronauts into orbit or further. In the past 11 years, there have been 129 launches of Falcon 9-type rockets. The most expensive parts of this type of rocket are reusable, which makes space travel more affordable.

The Inspiration4 mission, SpaceX's most recent launch, took place between 15 and 18 September. It was the first orbital space flight in which all the astronauts were civilians.

Other billionaires who've launched their own rockets are Richard Branson, who owns Virgin Galactic, a commercial space-flight carrier, and Jeff Bezos, owner of Amazon, who's launched his rocket, New Shepard, five times and like Musk, wants to colonise Mars. □



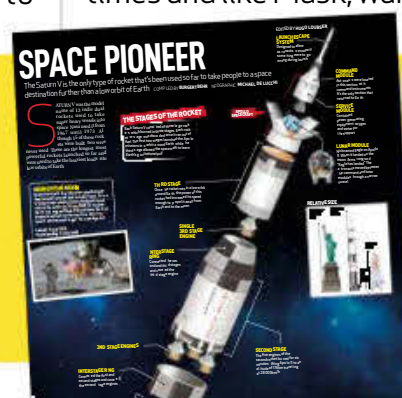
SMALL BEGINNINGS Robert H Goddard built the first liquid-fuelled rocket.

The pandemic slowed down global supply chains and shipments, affecting consumer patterns.



WE TALK ABOUT

What is a supply chain crisis?

THE CEO of one of the world's largest shipping companies has called on governments across the world to assist with the global supply chain crisis. This crisis means there are shortages in all sorts of products around the world – and experts believe it could continue until the end of next year.

Many local shops have been running low on items on their shelves or if you've tried to buy something online, they might have had to put your order on hold.

The problem isn't just affecting South Africa. In countries around the world there are product shortages across all sectors of the economy – from toys, pencils and bags to more elaborate items such as fridges and electronic chips for cars and computers.

The situation is escalating, or getting worse, because products

are in short supply and can't be transported efficiently to the places where they are needed.

Jeremy Nixon, CEO of shipping company Ocean Network Express, says governments need to spend more money to improve their ports, railways, warehouses and roads. This is expected to help increase capacity for goods that are entering countries and to help cope with the ongoing demand.

"There needs to be some government support to maybe switch people out of some parts of the economy where demand is not so strong to more critical parts of the economy where the demand is very strong and important for global supply chains," Nixon says.

HOW DID THIS HAPPEN?

Before the Covid-19 pandemic, the world's supply chain worked well. Companies that ordered items

from different parts of the world knew they wouldn't need to wait too long before receiving the supplies they needed.

Trouble began when the coronavirus forced factories to shut down. As countries were sent into lockdown, the demand for goods decreased.

China, which produces around

30% of all the world's products, was first hit by the virus.

Later in 2020, businesses slowly started opening up and people began shopping again. The massive demand caused manufacturers to over order items. This, in turn, caused traffic jams and delays at shipping ports around the world.

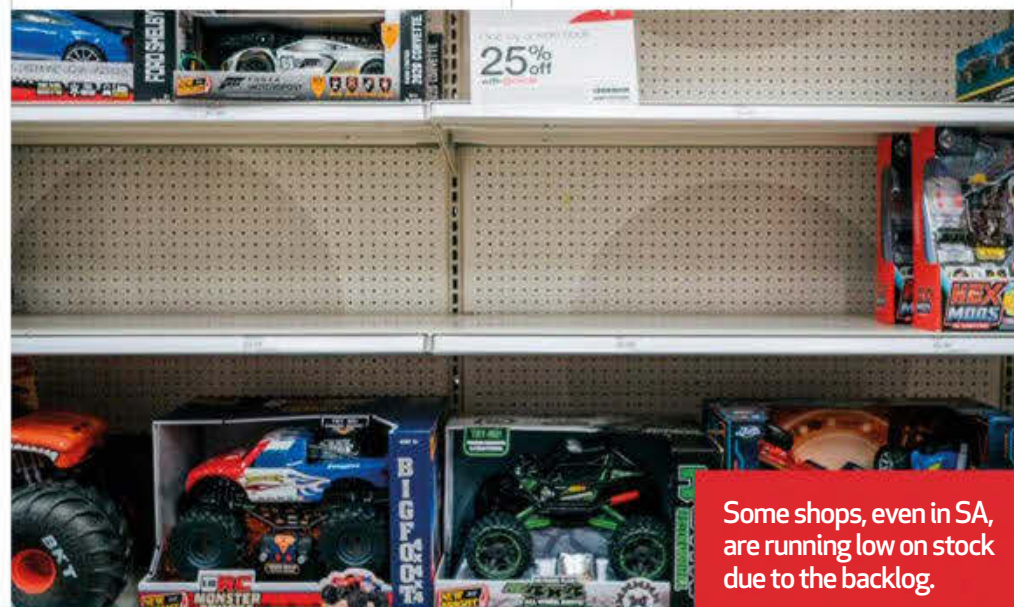
Many containers carrying items that travel by ship from country to country have been backed up at ports with too few workers and truck drivers to offload and transport the influx of items.

WHAT'S THE SOLUTION?

Countries around the world are co-operating to resolve the situation. Ports in the USA have announced plans to change shifts for their workers so they can reduce the backlog.

Other countries will hire more truck drivers and are endeavouring to produce more fuel.

In the meantime, consumers will be hit the hardest. Because it's costing companies more money to transport and manage the backlog of products, certain items will be a lot harder or more expensive to get.

AROUND THE WORLD



SPAIN

CUMBRE VIEJA VOLCANO CAUSES CHAOS

Residents on the Spanish island of La Palma have been on high alert since lava has been spewing out of the Cumbre Vieja volcano.

For the past few weeks thousands of people have been evacuated to safety as rivers of boiling lava destroyed buildings, farmland and homes. It's also caused the surface area of La Palma, which is one of the group of eight Canary Islands, to expand.

Since the volcano erupted on 19 September, lava has been flowing into the Atlantic Ocean, solidifying as it hits the water. Scientists using satellites have found that the molten rock has now extended the island's shoreline.



ISRAEL

900-YEAR-OLD SWORD DISCOVERED

Scuba diver Shlomi Katzin has discovered artefacts, including a sword, anchors and pottery, while exploring the waters near Haifa, off the coast of Israel.

The ancient sword, now covered in seashells and coral from the Mediterranean's seabed, is believed to have belonged to a knight during the Crusades in 1095. The Crusades were a period of religious wars in medieval times when Chris-



tians from Europe fought Muslims for control of Jerusalem and other holy places.

Researcher **KOBI SHARVIT** from the Israel Antiquities Authority, who conducts research on historic findings, says the sword will be cleaned and put on display for the public.

A HAIRY BUSINESS

Bearded gentlemen from across the globe recently made their way to Germany to compete in the annual Beard Olympics and German Beard Championships.

This year 100 participants, including Austrian competitor **NORBERT DOPF**, and others from Switzerland, the Netherlands and Italy, all arrived in the town Eging am See for the face-off.

Several barbers and hairdressers judged the bearded blokes in various categories, including the length and density of their moustaches and beards.

While it's known as a friendly competition, the gentlemen all take their grooming very seriously.

FIRST RHINO CT SCAN IN SOUTH AFRICA IS A SUCCESS

A white rhino named Oz, who was rescued after poachers killed his parents, recently became the first live adult rhino to undergo a CT scan.

The rhino had an unusual swelling on his face and experts at the Care for Wild Rhino Sanctuary and veterinary specialists from the University of Pretoria stepped in to help the animal weighing over a ton.

Using special X-rays and computers, the CT scan showed Oz had a tooth abscess. Thanks to the scan, he was treated and nursed back to health.

SOUTH KOREA'S NURI ROCKET FAILS

South Korea has launched its first homegrown space rocket at the Naro Space Center in what officials described as an important step in the country's pursuit of a satellite launch programme.

However, the rocket, named Nuri, burnt out sooner than planned at 700 km above Earth.

"Unfortunately, we haven't been able to reach our goal perfectly, but it was a wonderful achievement for a first trial," said South Korea's president, Moon Jae-in.

As part of its plans to develop a space launch vehicle that can carry a one-ton satellite, South Korea now intends making another test flight in May using the same rocket hardware.

SUNKEN WW2 SHIPS RESURFACE

Volcanic tremors in Japan have caused 24 ghost ships, or ships with no crew members, to resurface in the Pacific Ocean.

The vessels were spotted off the coast of Iwo Jima, a volcanic island and the site of one of the bloodiest battles of World War 2.

The battleships were used by the Japanese while fighting US troops. They were sunk by Japanese soldiers towards the end of the war in 1945. The ships were last visible more than 35 years ago as a result of seismic activity – the frequency and size of earthquakes – in the area.

PIMPED-UP pooches had a dog-gone day when they strutted their stuff at the 31st Tompkins Square Halloween Dog Parade in New York recently. Dog owners and their fur babies

THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

📌 5 NOVEMBER 1605 – GUY FAWKES & THE GUNPOWDER PLOT

The Gunpowder Plot was planned by a group of men in England who attempted to kill King James I and other leaders running the country at the time.

The group's leader, Robert Catesby, was unhappy that the king – who was crowned in 1603 – was not Catholic.

He came up with the idea to try to blow up the houses of Parliament with gunpowder while the royal family was inside.

The group of 13 rebels included a man named Guy Fawkes whose responsibility included guarding 36 barrels of gunpowder that were stored underneath the House of Lords building.

The conspirators (see Word of the Week) failed when an anonymous letter was sent to the noblemen warning them of the murderous plot.

It's believed that Guy Fawkes was arrested in the basement as



he was about to set the gunpowder alight. He and the rest of the group were jailed and later sentenced to death for their plot.

King James I then decided to make 5 November a day to celebrate the failure of the Gunpowder

Plot, and many Londoners celebrated by making fires.

Today the tradition continues as people light fireworks, bonfires, and sometimes burn a doll that looks like Guy Fawkes on 5 November.

LAUNCH ESCAPE SYSTEM

Designed to allow astronauts to escape if something were to go wrong during launch.

The Saturn V is the only type of rocket that's been used so far to take people to a space destination further than a low orbit of Earth

SATURN V was the model name of 13 individual rockets used to take super-heavy vessels into space. NASA used it from 1967 until 1973. Although 15 of these rockets were built, two were never used. These are the longest, most powerful rockets launched so far and were used to take the heaviest loads into low orbits of Earth.

THE STAGES OF THE ROCKET

Each Saturn V consisted of three large rockets, which burned in three stages. Each rocket, or stage, was discarded once it ran out of fuel. The first two stages launched the Apollo missions into orbit around Earth, while the third stage allowed the spacecraft to leave Earth's gravitational pull.

APOLLO SPACECRAFT

COMMAND MODULE

Astronauts were located in this section, with command instruments. It's the only section that returned to Earth.

SERVICE MODULE

Contained power-generating equipment, oxygen and water for life support.

LUNAR MODULE

Nicknamed Eagle on Apollo 11. When it landed on the moon, Armstrong said, "Eagle has landed." The astronauts moved between the command and lunar modules through a narrow tunnel.

MAN ON THE MOON

Apart from Earth, the only other celestial body that humans have set foot on is the moon. Saturn V rockets were used to launch the Apollo spacecraft to the moon. On 20 July 1969, astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin became the first people to set foot on the moon's surface. The spacecraft they used to get there was Apollo 11.

Launch: 16 July 1969
Ocean landing: 24 July 1969



THIRD STAGE

Once the rocket was in a low orbit around Earth, the power of this rocket had increased its speed enough to propel it away from Earth and to the moon.

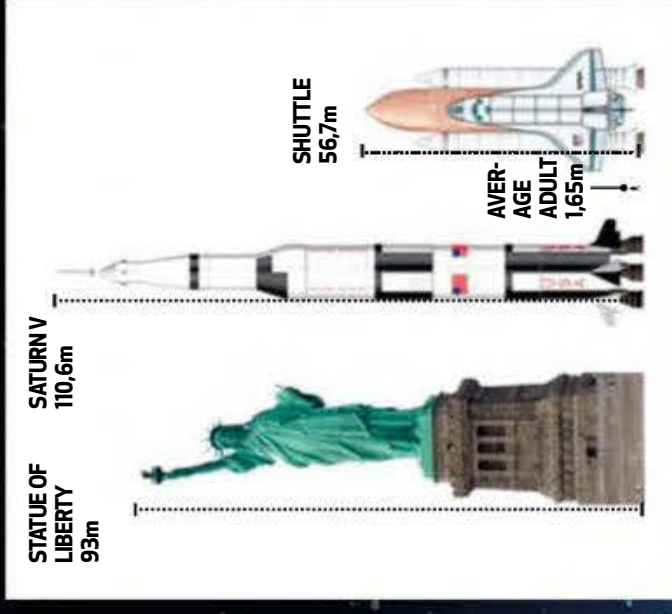

HOW THE MOON LANDING WAS DONE

The six lunar missions that landed on the moon, of which Apollo 11 was the first, all followed the same route. The Saturn V rocket carrying the mission was launched from the Kennedy Space Centre in Florida. After the flight, the command module with the astronauts landed in the Pacific Ocean.

- 1 The Saturn V rocket carrying the Apollo spacecraft launches and goes into a low Earth orbit.
- 2 The rocket's third stage propels Apollo out of Earth's orbit, and the craft heads to the moon.
- 3 The combined command and service module (CSM) separates from the rocket.
- 4 The CSM turns around and reverses until it docks with the lunar module, allowing the astronauts to crawl into the lunar module. The third - and last - stage of the rocket is discarded.
- 5 Apollo adjusts its route to orbit the moon.
- 6 The lunar module takes two astronauts to the surface of the moon.
- 7 The third crew member stays behind in the CSM that's orbiting the moon.
- 8 The top section of the lunar module transports the astronauts back to the CSM, while the bottom section stays behind on the moon. Once the astronauts are safely aboard the CSM, the lunar module's top section is discarded.
- 9 The CSM changes course and heads back to Earth.
- 10 The service module is discarded.
- 11 The command module with the astronauts enters Earth's atmosphere.
- 12 A parachute is deployed and the command module floats down to land in the ocean.

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VIRTUAL TYCOONS

Meet the new breed of young tech titans who are making a fortune from the games they develop

SHARKBITE



More than a billion people have played SharkBite, a game developed by Max and Simon.

I ALWAYS imagined being a shark would be quite straightforward. You're an apex predator. You swim around; you bite people. But actually it's much more stressful than that.

During my afternoon as a mako shark, a guy comes at me with a harpoon. Later someone shoots at me using a US navy destroyer.

"You can always upgrade to being a great white," says my shark adviser, Simon Burgess. "No one will mess with you then."

Don't worry, no fish were harmed while conducting this experiment. I was simply playing SharkBite, an online game on the insanely popular gaming platform Roblox. Ask your children. Globally, 43 million of them immerse themselves in its 20 million games (or "experiences") every day.

Roblox isn't as cool as the slightly more mature games offered by the Fortnite developer or Minecraft, but it's where you go if you want to break out of jail (Jailbreak has been played 5,2 billion times), adopt a pet (Adopt Me! has been played 23,8 billion times) or do something more prosaic such as run a pizzeria (Work at a Pizza Place has been played more than three billion times).

But the truly astonishing thing about Roblox is that, although it launched as a gaming platform in 2006, the company decided eight years ago to offer tools for youngsters to create their own games and post them on the platform.

If your game is successful, you can make a lot of money.

That's what Simon, who's based in Bournemouth, England, and his business partner, Max Entwistle (both 24), who lives in Aberystwyth in Wales, did. They met playing games on Roblox when they were 13 years old.

"I was leading an army called Advanced Robloxian Troops and Max had an air force called the United Countries Air Force and we sort of bonded over that," Simon recalls.

In 2017 they came up with their own experience, SharkBite. Last month it clocked its billionth player.

If I owned a pub, I'd ask fresh-faced Max for ID every time he ordered a shandy. He's just bought himself a Tesla.

"When we hit one million plays, it blew my mind. After 100 million I was kind of, 'Surely we're at the peak?' SharkBite is now in the million-dollars-a-year bracket in terms of income. I still can't believe the gaming I started as a kid has changed my life."

Simon is a bit more cautious. He's opted for a Volkswagen Golf. Still, SharkBite's earnings have helped him to pay his university fees and he's come a long way from his humble beginnings.

"Aged 16 I did work experience at the sea life centre here in Bournemouth," he says. "That's the nearest I've been to a real shark. Now virtual ones have sort of become my life."

ROBLOX experiences are free to access but players can customise them by buying clothes, accessories and even facial expressions for their avatar using an in-game currency called robux.

In the case of SharkBite, you might want a bigger boat (those especially hot on shark security can actually buy the Titanic, which will cost you \$87,53 or R1 313). And if you're the shark, you can

upgrade yourself by becoming, say, a mosasaurus (a prehistoric monster shark).

Roblox takes about 25% of these earnings (broadly, another 50% is deducted for app vendor fees and the costs of hosting) but even so, if you're the creator of one of these experiences, those micro-purchases soon add up.

Lewis Winch is a developer from Kent, England. In

2015 he co-created an experience called Isle, in which players escape fire, flood and an array of monsters on an island. So far it's been played 36 million times, earning him about £70 000 (R1,4 million) a year. The big money, he says, is in selling the jaunty virtual hats that players wear.

"My bestselling item is a flower hat. Each one costs 50 robux [R10] and I've sold half a million of them. It honestly isn't about the money – it just feels great knowing so many people are wearing something I created. But that money also helped buy my sister a laptop and put her through uni. And I'm taking my mom [a nurse] and dad [a policeman] on holiday to Spain next year."

Globally, Roblox creators and developers will share roughly \$500m (R7,5 billion) in 2021 and its most successful developers, or "devs", are multimillionaires.

Adopt Me! began as a game where players looked after children. No one was much interested. Then, in 2019, developers changed the focus of the game to pets. You could adopt a virtual cat, dog, even a bee. It's now one of the most successful games on Roblox: 23 billion users and counting, earning its anonymous American creators \$50m (R750m) a year.

"Coming up with original ideas is hard," Simon says. "But if you have a hit, you get rich and famous. You're a rock star."

The pandemic helped. Globally, the gaming industry was already bigger than the film and music industries combined, but during various global lockdowns Roblox player numbers went up by 85%. In March this year the company floated on the New York Stock Exchange, valued at \$45bn (R675bn), which added another \$1bn (R15bn) to 58-year-old founder and chief executive David Baszucki's existing \$3bn (R45bn) wealth.

Kids are hooked on digital gaming platform Roblox – more than 40 million visit it daily.

◀ In the real world the pandemic may have been brutal, but some found opportunities virtually. Abbie West (22), a single mom, nursery worker and programming enthusiast from Hull, was furloughed in March 2020, which left her struggling to pay rent and bills.

Drawing on her experience as a Roblox gamer as a child (she began playing aged 11), she contacted the makers of an experience called Fishing Simulator on Twitter. They were impressed and gave her a job upgrading their virtual world of boats and rods.

“I get up with my daughter, Amelia, and take her to the park or for a day out. But when she goes to bed at 7pm, I sit in front of two screens with a Coke working until 4am. It doesn’t feel like work. I love it. I’d never go back to getting a proper full-time job.”

Abbie won’t say how much she earns, but it’s good money.

“Put it this way: there aren’t that many opportunities for single mothers in Hull, but I pay all my bills and we live a good life. This has been great for me.”

Jacob Girdler was brought up by his single mom in Somerset. When he was nine, a friend at school showed him games on Roblox and aged 11, he made his first clumsy attempt at creating one of his own. It was called 2 Player Secret Hideout Tycoon.

“I got excited when it reached 300 hits,” he recalls.

In 2019, aged 17, Jacob had another go, this time with Obby Creator, a “learn and explore” game in which you can build a skyscraper or even a whole city. He gets paid when players buy a bit of music or his coloured fog.

Soon after launch, he was in the shower when he heard his mother scream. He thought she’d fallen over. But no, money was starting to pour into her bank account. Gamers were buying the fog. These days he receives about £20 000 (R420 000) a month from the game.

“When I was young, I think my mom worried I spent too much time on a screen. Plus she works as a nanny, so she’s aware children shouldn’t be on devices too much. But I’ve taken her on a skiing holiday, which she loved. I think she’s kind of amazed that I’ve made a career from this completely virtual world.”

Roblox is indeed a completely virtual world. Despite having zero veterinary qualifications, I managed to give a lion a blood test on an experience called Vet

Earlier this year, Roblox floated on the New York Stock Exchange valued at \$45 billion (R675bn).

Simulator. To celebrate this achievement, I then bought a little celebratory dance for my avatar to do (this product is called an “emote”). My avatar is a better dancer than me. Not hard, yet still weird. But then virtual life promises to improve on reality in every way.

THE Roblox platform is seen by many as a staging post in the emergent “metaverse”, a 3D immersive internet. Be clear: this won’t simply be a world of gaming but a virtual space where you shop, work, socialise and consume culture. Anything you do in real life, you’ll be able to do online.

Of course, it’s been tried before. The virtual domain Second Life launched in 2003, promising a digital shadow world for adults. In some ways it was too real (in 2007 it hosted a “virtual riot” between French National Front and anti-racist avatars) and, although it had about a million active users at its peak, it never gained a mass population.

But 2021 feels different. Roblox’s chief executive believes this is the year the metaverse has begun to prove its potential as “a human coexistence utility”.

And why not? The pandemic has accelerated broad public acceptance of all types of virtuality. We’ve learnt to hold business meetings, job interviews and birthday parties, even consult doctors or attend funerals on Zoom.

And we’re beginning to have faith in

virtual products too. Cryptocurrencies such as bitcoin are now taken seriously (in September El Salvador became the first country to accept it as legal tender). In March, a piece of digital art (also known as an NFT or non-fungible token) by American artist Beeple sold for £50m (R1bn) at Christie’s.

But most bonkers of all, surely, is the rise of the American metaverse real estate company Upland. Can’t afford that funky little apartment in Manhattan? Then buy it virtually using cryptocurrency. Upland will sell you a virtual property linked to real-world addresses and, as it appreciates in value, you can sell it and convert your gains into real dollars.

Sound crazy? A million properties have been sold on Upland since it launched in early 2020, with some speculators boasting of 100 000% profits.

Roblox is already part of this migration of real-world ideas into a virtual world. Pop stars and rappers hold virtual concerts on there. In May the fashion house Gucci opened a “Gucci Garden” on Roblox. Fashionistas could buy virtual Gucci handbags – one went for \$4 000 (R60 000).

“Considering how fast even the tech laggards among us have learnt how to ‘digitise’ our lives over the past 18 months, the big tech companies sense a massive opportunity,” says David Rowan, founding editor of Wired UK magazine.

In July this year Facebook’s boss, Mark Zuckerberg, announced a new direction for his \$1 trillion (R15 trillion) corpora-

tion. He said it would cease to be a social media company and become a “metaverse company”, defining the latter as “an embodied internet that you’re inside of rather than just looking at”.

Zuckerberg was extremely upbeat about potential profits from digital products and services in the metaverse, but also made a rash-sounding promise.

“You’re basically going to be able to do everything that you can on the internet today as well as some things that don’t make sense on the internet today, like dancing,” he said.

Even governments are wading in. Earlier this year South Korea’s ministry of science announced plans to build a national metaverse. A consortium of companies, including big hitters such as Hyundai, have been tasked with creating a viable, alternative “online” South Korea where citizens can do all the stuff they do in the “real” South Korea.

They’ve already launched a prototype called Ifland, where avatars can go about their business wearing one of 800 outfits, accessories and hairstyles, and a choice of 66 different emotional expressions.

Matthew Ball, a tech investor and widely regarded essayist on the metaverse, predicts that Abbie’s 11-month-old daughter is likely to celebrate her 40th birthday party in a virtual world.

“The ‘consensus’ birth-date of the internet is 1983 [on 1 January 1983, the TCP/IP protocol first allowed global computers to talk to one another] – only 38 years ago,” Ball says. “I think it would be pessimistic to say it will take even longer to take today’s internet and see it fully realised as the ‘metaverse’”.

The term “metaverse” was coined by author Neal Stephenson in his 1992 novel *Snow Crash*. In the novel, a pizza delivery guy named Hiro Protagonist becomes immersed in a virtual realm dominated by a corporation called Global Multimedia Protocol Group.

Rowan predicts that the battle for control of the new virtual realm is

yet to come.

“The big risk is that we let a small number of profit-led corporations dominate this emerging era – acting perhaps in their shareholders’ interests but promoting even more political polarisation and misinformation than Facebook does today,” he says.

Totalitarian and censorious governments are already getting twitchy. In September the Chinese government announced a crackdown on gaming. Under-18s are now allowed to play games for only one hour, from 8-9pm, on Fridays and weekends, never on school nights.

Developers also have to submit game titles for government approval.

There are other less political dangers to users. Last year a six-year-old Australian boy managed to spend about R92 000 on treats for his pet on Adopt Me! using his parents’ iPad while they were at work.

But Simon and other young developers have no fear of the metaverse or disseminating “spiritual opium”. In fact, many are already living heavily virtualised lives.

As a nine-year-old gamer, Lewis Winch immediately preferred life online to the real one.

“Instead of going to the actual park after school, my mates would say, ‘Shall we meet at the park on Roblox?’”

Now he’s 21 and in a “real world” indie band called Ten Pin. So far, so normal. The difference is he plans to stage their shows on Roblox.

“To me, that isn’t weird at all,” he says.

Not only that, he developed his hit game *Isle with Treebee63*, whom he met on Roblox 10 years ago. Treebee63 is his best friend. They’ve never met in person.

“That doesn’t matter,” he says. “I’ve had to Americanise my sleeping patterns so we can socialise (Treebee63 lives ‘in Texas somewhere’), but we’ve still shared amazing experiences.”

Jacob is the only “dev” I speak to with misgivings about the lifestyle of a Roblox tycoon. Until two years ago he was doing 12-hour days on his computer. He started to feel low.

“I was burnt out,” he says. “It’s a common problem. Now I sometimes do parkour [an urban training discipline that involves running and jumping over walls] or I leave my phone at home and cycle just to reset.”

But I’m most struck by Reid Millam (20), a “dev” from Portsmouth. He started playing on Roblox when he was 11. Now he’s doing a degree in cybersecurity and forensic computing at Portsmouth University, but also earning such good money as lead developer on a Roblox game called *Ghost Simulator* (you evade ghosts; there are pricey hoverboards available to help) that he can pay off his student loan.

And yet . . . he says he has only one friend in the real world.

“I’m pretty much a hermit. I keep myself to myself at uni. All my real friends are online. I really think *Ready Player One* is the blueprint for the future.”

Ah yes, *Ready Player One*. The 2011 sci-fi adventure novel (also a 2018 film directed by Steven Spielberg) by Ernest Cline posited a future metaverse called *Oasis*. There are good guys. There are bad guys. There’s a quest for an Easter egg (in gaming, an Easter egg is a secret feature or surprise).

But even the *Oasis* metaverse closed on Tuesdays and Thursdays in order to promote real-life interaction.

Reid looks sceptical. Roblox is where he’s happiest.

“That’s where I’m interacting with like-minded people, doing what I love and making money too,” he says. “Two days off a week? That’s just not realistic.” □

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THE WEIRDER, THE BETTER!

DECISIONS, decisions. Will today be Cinderella or Snow White? Buzz Lightyear or Star Wars? Or perhaps Beauty and the Beast? These are the daily dilemmas that keep Kari Walbert on her toes. Because when it comes to shoes, this special-needs teacher is in a heel lot of trouble – there are just so many beauties she could choose to wear.

Kari owns about 500 pairs of footwear, each one lovingly catalogued on her Pinterest page according to colour combinations.

“Otherwise I forget which shoes I own,” she tells us from her home in Eaton, Pennsylvania in the US.

YOU tracked the 44-year-old down after pictures of her quirky footwear collection started popping up on the internet – and here she is, chatting to us from the other side of the world, showing us around her collection of feathers and flowers, teacups and toecaps.

Shoes are her sole passion, the thing that gets her heart flip-flopping with joy and her toes tapping with delight – a veritable feat for the feet.

Think Alice in Wonderland and Hello Kitty, unicorn heels and wedges decorated with hot-rod racing car flames.

And when she feels in the mood for an island holiday, she slips into a pair that look like Hawaiian dancers.

“I love collecting shoes. But it’s not just about how many I own or the brands – it’s a case of the weirder, the better,” she says.

So much fancy footwear takes proper organising so Kari keeps all the shoes in their original boxes to save space.

“I take a picture of the pair and paste it on the outside of the box so I can easily find it,” she explains.

But even so her shoe room is nearly filled to the brim. “I’m trying not to buy more than two pairs a month.”

AS A teen Kari yearned for a pair of iconic Dr Martens or a pair of cool Converse trainers. But money was tight.

Then she went to university and took a job in a shoe shop to make money. “That’s where my love of shoes really took off,” she says.

Whenever new stock arrived that she liked, she’d immediately set aside a pair of No 7s for herself. It wasn’t long before she found she was head over heels in love with her new passion.

“I love shoes because it doesn’t matter what your weight is or if your clothes are too tight – shoes always fit. A pair of shoes can liven up any outfit. And you can have fun with them.”

George, Kari’s husband of 19 years, has an obsession of his own: he collects ancient coins.

“So he understands and supports me. But each time I bring a new pair home, he’ll joke, ‘Hey, you know we’re running out of space?’”

This is no hobby to pursue on a shoe-string budget.

"My shoe collection is probably worth more than \$60 000 [about R900 000]," she says.

"I think the average price of the shoes I collect is about \$150 [R2 250] a pair."

But surely she doesn't earn a fortune on a teacher's salary – how does she manage to get her footwear fix?

"We don't have children," she says. "I work hard for my money and I don't really spend it on anything else. George and I love travelling although we haven't done much of that because of Covid."

Her personal favourites are her Manolo Blahnik wedding shoes. "They're silver with a strap of semiprecious stones over my toes," she says.

At around R10 000, they're also her most expensive pair. "It's actually quite funny – so many of my wedding pics are just of my shoes," she says, laughing.

"My dress was dirt cheap because the most important part of my outfit was my shoes."

KARI says she's fine with being known as Eaton's "teacher with the shoes".

"I always joke they should put a picture of my shoes in the school yearbook, instead of my face – I think more people would recognise me that way."

She finds her students don't pay much attention to her shoes. "I teach children with autism and most of them are boys. They only notice my shoes when I'm wearing superheroes."

"In fact, I can't recall a time when any child has noticed my shoes – not even when I'm out shopping."

"It's more likely the parents who'll go, 'Look, she's wearing Snow White or Buzz Lightyear shoes!'"

While Kari loves to put her best

foot forward, she's the first to admit her unusual shoes aren't always comfortable.

"I call them my half-day or sitting shoes because you can't always walk in them for too long," she says.

Shoes will always be her passion, she adds.

"It's nice when people start chatting to me about them – even if I can see they're not really crazy about a particular pair. It doesn't bother me. Funnily enough, it's usually men who comment on my shoes."

Her shoes fill her life with hearts, flowers, fun and fantasy. They put a spring in her step and make her smile.

"And if they make someone else smile too, then that's a bonus."

As the saying goes, if the shoe fits ... □

A LIFE MORE ORDINARY

Japan's Princess Mako has turned her back on the privileges and perks of royalty to marry her commoner sweetheart

THEY'VE been dubbed Japan's Meghan and Harry and the parallels are startling: a royal falls in love with a commoner and then rejects the wealth, status and privilege that comes with being a member of the monarchy and moves to America to start a new life.

The romance between Princess Mako, niece of the country's Emperor Naruhito, and her commoner boyfriend, Kei Komuro – he of the rebellious ponytail and Western ways – has simultaneously gripped and divided Japan.

And recently, after years of controversy, the princess and the law graduate finally tied the knot in a subdued civil ceremony.

The event marked the end of a long and tumultuous road to the altar that's seen Mako (30) giving up her royal status and re-starting life as an ordinary citizen.

Their union in a local registry office in Tokyo's Akasata estate was a far cry from the pomp and ceremony of a traditional royal wedding with its elaborate rites and rituals.

"It's a radical departure from what is expected from women of the imperial family," says Shihoko Goto, an Asian affairs specialist at Washington-based think tank the Wilson Centre.

"She is prepared to make financial sacrifices and uproot herself from the comfort, safety and privileges of her life to pursue her own path."

But it seems Kei just wants to be a loving husband to his vulnerable bride, whose mental health has taken a beating.

Last month it was reported she was suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder brought on by constant scrutiny of the public and media. "I love Mako. We only get one life, and I want us to spend it with the one we love," he told a media conference in Tokyo.

On her wedding day, the princess was seen leaving her home after bowing to her parents, Crown Prince Fumihito (55) and Crown Princess Kiko (55), and hugging her younger sister, Princess Kako.

Dressed in a pale blue dress and holding a bouquet of flowers, she gave one final wave before her car left the family residence.

Kei, who she met in 2012 when they both studied at the International Christian University in Tokyo, bowed to cameras gathered outside his house as he left in a crisp dark suit and tie.

ACCORDING to Japanese imperial law, only male members of the royal family are allowed to marry commoners. The princess, having been stripped of her royal status, will now be known simply as Mako Komuro.

In another about turn, she also rejected the government payout of 150 million yen (about R20 million), which is offered to departing royals in "an effort to appease a disapproving public", one news site reports.

Polls showed up to 80% of the Japanese people opposed the marriage. Ironically when they became engaged in 2017 the news was greeted with delight – but public sentiment changed when a money scandal involving Kei's mother, Kato, emerged.

Kato, who raised Kei on her own after his father died, had apparently not repaid a four million yen (R535 700) loan from a former fiancé, which she used partly for her son's law studies in the US.

That led to critics suggesting Kei was a gold-digger, only marrying the princess for money or fame – a sentiment that was met

with grave concern by the imperial family. Kei then issued a 24-page explanation about the money, saying it was a gift, not a loan, which made him even more unpopular.

After their wedding was postponed in 2018, he left Japan for New York where he landed a job as a clerk at a venture capital firm.

Earlier this year he issued a statement saying he would repay the money, but it's unknown whether this happened.

Kei's popularity plummeted even further when he returned to Japan in September sporting a ponytail, which was deemed "most disrespectful" by the Japanese media.

Things didn't improve in the months that followed. He was scorned for visiting his future in-laws wearing a pinstriped suit as opposed to a solid black or navy one. And when he "kept his hands in his pockets too much", it didn't go down well.

Still, Kei does have some supporters with the Japan Times calling him a "polite and upstanding man".

Despite all the drama, the love between Kei and Mako has endured and last year the princess begged her people to support her decision to marry her commoner.

"We are irreplaceable to each other – someone to rely on during both happy and unhappy times," she said. "So marriage is a necessary choice for us."

She also touched on the public's sentiment. "I acknowledge there are various opinions about our marriage. I feel very

sorry for the people to whom we gave trouble.

She added that biased reporting about her new husband had caused her "great fear, stress and sadness".

THE princess' exit has also reignited debate about Japan's shrinking royal line, which now consists of just 17 members – 12 women and five men. This is in stark contrast to the 67 members remaining after World War 2.

Emperor Naruhito has a daughter and no sons, but since women can't ascend the throne there are only three eligible successors: the emperor's 55-year-old brother and Mako's father, Crown Prince Akishino; Mako's 15-year-old

brother, Hisahito; and an 85-year-old uncle of the emperor, Prince Hitachi.

A poll carried out in Japan last year found that 70% of people were in favour of a female emperor – but there's nothing the royal family can do about it.

The line of succession is governed by Japanese law and the current conservative elite, including the prime minister, want to "preserve the world's oldest monarchy the way it is now", Time Magazine reports.

Mako's wedding has highlighted previous calls to allow women to be part of the line of succession – not only to help save Japan's monarchy but to bring it in line with the rest of the world.

The newlyweds will be looking forward to putting those tumultuous days behind them as they begin their new lives.

It's believed they'll be moving to the US where Kei wants to practise law. But his career plan was dealt a setback when just after his wedding he discovered he'd failed his bar exam.

He intends resitting the exam next year and in the meantime, he and Mako will live in his tiny one-bedroom apartment in New York.

The princess has a master's degree in art museum and gallery studies from the University of Leicester in Britain, and worked at a museum in Tokyo for more than five years, so she might be looking for work in the Big Apple's art world, the New York Times says.

"All I want," she said recently, "is just to lead a peaceful life in my new environment." □

ALL **NINE** ARE FINE!

At six months old, these nonuplets are finally well enough to go home COMPILED BY **LESEGO MKHIZE**

THEY weren't all expected to live – nonuplets are extremely rare and the nine babies were tiny, weighing between 500g and 1kg each.

But what a difference six months makes. The five girls and four boys have gone from strength to strength, more than doubling in size, and are now well enough for their parents to start making plans to take them home to Mali.

Mom Halima Cissé (26) couldn't be happier. "All of them are getting on very well and are a joy to look after," she says.

"They're getting stronger every day and it may well be they're allowed to leave full-time medical care soon."

The children – Hawa, Adama, Fatouma, Oumou, Kadidia, Mohammed, El-hadji, Oumar and Bah (named after Mali president Bah N'Daw) – are staying with their mom and dad, Kader Arby (35), in a flat near the clinic in Casablanca, Morocco, where they were born.

Halima was 25 weeks pregnant when she was transferred from home in Mali to

the hospital, which was better equipped to care for her and the unborn babies.

The nonuplets were born on 4 May via C-section at 30 weeks, an experience Halima describes as overwhelming. "I was very aware of what was going on and it seemed as if there was an endless stream of babies coming out of me," she says.

It was touch and go whether all nine would make it but here they are – chubby and thriving. To mark their six-month milestone, the proud parents released a series of heartwarming pictures of their remarkable brood.

Snuggled together on a couch dressed in a mixture of rompers, the babies are blissfully unaware of the drama that surrounded their birth – or the round-the-clock care their parents and an army of medical staff are providing.

"Giving birth to one child is hard enough," says Halima, who also has a two-and-a-half-year-old daughter, Souda, with Kader. "Having nine is unimaginable."

The babies go through 100 nappies and six litres of milk a day. "There's an astonishing amount of work involved in looking after them," Halima says.

HALIMA is the only woman in the world to have surviving nonuplets. Two other women – one in Australia in 1971 and the other in Malaysia in 1999 – gave birth to nine babies but the infants died shortly after birth. Carrying and delivering so many babies

took its toll. Medical staff estimate Halima's belly weighed 30kg by the time she gave birth and the babies were so jam-packed doctors initially thought she was having seven infants – two were undetectable in her crowded uterus.

A team of 10 doctors and 25 paramedics were on hand to deliver the brood but the birth wasn't easy. Halima lost a lot of blood, leaving her weak and exhausted.

She admits she was too drained to look after her children and spent the first few months in a private room in the hospital, visiting the babies once a day for 30 minutes to bond with them.

The babies were fed every two hours and within a month she had run out of breast milk.

The nonuplets are now fed from a milk bank and have a team of hospital staff

to help their mom look after them.

Kader, who works for the Mali army and wasn't present at the birth of the nonuplets as he was at home caring for Souda, joined Halima in July.

He's grateful for all the help they're receiving in Morocco.

"At the moment we have full-time care, and that's a blessing because my wife needs the rest," he says.

Kader is still surprised that Halima delivered nine babies – the couple say they were conceived naturally.

"There's nothing to explain how this happened other than Allah's grace," he says. "These children are a gift from Him."

THE babies were on ventilators in ICU for 12 weeks before their lungs were strong enough for them to breathe on their own. In August they were removed from their incubators and discharged from hospital.

They've been staying in the flat near the facility with their parents so medical staff can continue to monitor them.

Souda, who's being cared for by relatives in Mali, can't wait to meet her siblings when they go home.

"She didn't fully grasp what had happened to begin with, but she will when she meets the babies," Kader says.

Though the nonuplets are out of the woods, there are a good deal of challenges ahead of them. Halima, who's studying human resources administration at a technical college in Timbuktu, knows it will take a village to raise them.

"My sister, Aisha, was with me [while giving birth] and she was holding my hand but all I could think about was how would I look after them and who was going to help me."

Kader, who's been given plenty of time off from work to deal with his newly expanded family, is a hands-on dad who has vowed to help bear the load.

"Being together as a family is the best thing in the world," he says. "The most important thing is that we are all safe and well and in great hands."

Still, the couple can't help worrying about having nine additional mouths to feed. As they get ready to return to their modest three-bedroom house in Mali, Kader admits it will be challenging to look after his family of 12.

"But we are mainly full of positive thoughts," he says. "For now, we're primarily focused on looking after our babies and getting them home." □

Manchester United is a team in crisis, pundits say – and their manager doesn't seem to know how to fix it COMPILED BY DENNIS CAVERNELIS

THE defeat was about as humiliating as a loss could be. “It was a bad day, no doubt about that,” came the manager’s response. “It was our worst ever day.”

Those words were uttered by Alex Ferguson in October 2011 when Manchester United were drilled 5-0 by Manchester City.

Now, a decade later almost to the day, manager Ole Gunnar Solskjær finds himself in the same position.

“It is the darkest day I have had leading these players,” the Norwegian said after his team were recently thrashed 5-0 by Liverpool – at Old Trafford, no less. “Not good enough individually or as a team.”

It’s a defeat that won’t quickly be forgotten, given that Liverpool is United’s biggest rival and their humiliation was so absolute.

But unlike Ferguson, who was revered and respected, Solskjær doesn’t seem to have the ability to turn around a team

that once dominated English and European football, pundits say – despite their subsequent 3-0 victory over Tottenham. We take a closer look at what’s up.

MEDIOCRE DEVILS

“After three years Solskjær clearly doesn’t know what his best team is,” ex-footballer turned pundit Paul Merson says.

“They broke the bank to get a player for £70 million (R145m) in Jadon Sancho – he doesn’t play. They’ve got a player in Paul Pogba who they’ve sweated to keep, and he didn’t start the biggest game of the season.”

When the pres-

sure’s on, they fall short, says ESPN’s Mark Ogden, who describes them as “a nearly team”, having won nothing major since Solskjær’s took over permanently in March 2019.

“They’ve let in 11 goals in the last three games,” Merson adds. “A team like Manchester United shouldn’t be letting in that number of goals over a good chunk of the season, but that just shows where they are at the moment.”

They don’t operate at the same high standard as under Ferguson’s leadership because “mediocrity is enough to impress [US owners] the Glazers”, Ogden says.

MANAGER MAYHEM

Former manager José Mourinho left the team despondent by the time he was sacked and many welcomed Solskjær’s appoint-

ment as caretaker coach at the end of 2018. He did things “the Manchester United way”, allowing players to attack and shine

club. I think what we've done, what I've seen, the development, of course, the results lately haven't been good enough.

"But I've got to keep strong and I do believe in what we've been doing, the coaching staff and the players."

STAR WARS

By many accounts there's no coherent team structure and there's no effective system for Solskjær to maximise the galaxy of stars at his disposal.

The club's business model is based on milking former glories, wrote The New York Times' Rory Smith. This puts the manager in a bind when it comes to forming a cohesive squad.

For Solskjær to play Paul Pogba means leaving out Bruno Fernandes, Marcus Rashford or Mason Greenwood. Then there's Ronaldo, one of the greatest footballers of all time, signed to the team with great fanfare a few months ago. United wanted him back but didn't know how he'd fit into the team, and him joining effectively stalled Sancho's career, Smith says.

"It's Solskjær's fault that he can't get the best out of these players; that he sent out a team so woefully overmatched against Liverpool. But it's not his fault that his resources are so uneven."

MEDIOCRE SUPPORT

The quality of Solskjær's assistant coaches, Kieran McKenna, Michael Carrick and Mike Phelan, leaves much to be desired, pundits say.

McKenna was Tottenham's and Manchester United's under-18 head coach, who had six months as assistant to

Mourinho before becoming Solskjær's first-team coach in December 2018. Carrick was a novice when he joined Mourinho's staff at the same time as McKenna.

"How much do Ronaldo, Bruno Fernandes, Edinson Cavani, Luke Shaw, Mason Greenwood, Paul Pogba, et al believe in McKenna and Carrick?" The Guardian's Jamie Jackson asks.

Former Red Devil Paul Ince didn't mince his words after their Liverpool defeat, blasting Solskjær and his support team. "You can't have a manager who took [Welsh team] Cardiff City down, then goes to [Norwegian club] Molde FK, and expect him to come into the biggest club in the world and produce a team that's going to challenge the best teams in the world with the staff that he's got.

"You've got an under-23 coach come up from the academy. He's got Michael Carrick . . . no coaching experience. Micky Phelan – I don't know what he does.

"This is his coaching staff. So you analyse that with the world-class players in the team and we keep mentioning tactics and not getting the best out of the players. Look at that staff.

"This is the staff that Ole says is 'very good, brilliant'. It's a load of b*****s because they're conceding goals for fun." □

«WAITING IN THE WINGS

Former Chelsea manager **ANTONIO CONTE** (52) is reportedly keen to take over.

The Italian has a reputation for delivering immediate success. But he's the opposite of Solskjær – his abrasive style often puts him at odds with his employers, and eventually the players.

Hiring Conte would be a gamble, The Independent's Mark Critchley says. "[It] goes against a lot of what the Solskjær era was meant to represent: steady, gradual progress aligned with the club's core principles, with a view to . . . sustainable, long-term success."



instead of sticking to the largely defensive game Mourinho introduced.

The 48-year-old former United player was somehow spared the sack after the Liverpool thrashing – possibly because of his long history with the club, where he was once a formidable striker, and his intimate knowledge of its workings.

"Man United, as a club, we always give people a fair chance," former captain Bryan Robson said on talkSPORT. "Ole has now got to turn it around quickly."

In July the club gave Solskjær a contract extension to 2024 with an option for an extra year.

Asked if he'd be leaving, Solskjær said, "We've come too far as a group and we're too close to give up now. I've heard nothing else. This is the lowest I've been. But as I've said, I accept the responsibility.

"I do believe in myself. I do believe that I'm getting close to what I want with the

MY MOM'S A CONTROL FREAK

As Lourdes Leon carves her own path, she's proud of her strict mom and has taken her advice to heart

HER mom is a poster child for permissiveness, famous for raunchy stage shows, risqué fashion choices and a penchant for toy boys.

So you'd think the children of the queen of pop would be growing up in a free and easy household where anything goes – but the truth is quite the opposite.

In a rare interview, Madonna's firstborn, Lourdes Leon, pulled back the curtain on what it was like growing up with a mom like hers – and how Madge has always been determined that her kids would carve their own way in the world.

"My mom is such a control freak," Lourdes Leon (25) tells her mom's actress friend Debi Mazar in *The Interview* magazine. "She controlled me my whole life. I needed to be completely independent from her as soon as I graduated from high school."

Lourdes – or Lola as everyone calls her – says Madonna knows how and when to crack the whip and runs a tight ship. "We don't get any handouts in my family."

Her mother's main modus operandi, Lourdes says, is to protect her and her five siblings, Rocco Ritchie (21), David Banda (16), Mercy James (15) and twins Stelle and Estere Ciccone (9).

"I think my mom saw all these other kids of famous people, and she was like, 'My kids are not going to be like this,'" she says.

Lourdes has always wanted to live her

life on her own terms. "I feel like if your parents pay for things, then it gives them leverage over you."

When she finished school in 2014, Lourdes left her mom's multimillion-dollar estate in Lisbon, Portugal, and moved to New York, fuelled with passion and ambition.

She pursued her studies in dance and paid for her own tuition before turning to modelling.

"I want to create a world in which

models have more agency over what they're doing," she says. "They're not just silent clothing racks."

MADONNA had some advice for her daughter when she made her modelling debut in 2018.

"Proceed with caution and think about what you want to be known for," she said.

And it's advice Lourdes abides by.

are a lot of outside influences. I'm trying to make sure I impart the same wisdom and love to everyone. I'm bad cop. I'm the one that says no. I accept that role. I'm not the popular parent."

The music legend is amazed by how fast her babies have grown up, especially Lourdes, and describes the day her daughter left home as "an absolutely devastating experience".

"I fell into the deepest depression," she told Ellen DeGeneres. "We're pretty close. I'm always so happy when she calls me and says, 'Mommy, I miss you' or 'I need you to rub my head'."

MADONNA once said her daughter made her green with envy because "she's incredible at everything she does".

Yet she's drummed home that her children should never rest on their laurels and that they could have a hard time because of how famous their mother is.

"I feel social media plagues Lourdes in particular and makes her feel like,

'people are going to give me things because I'm her daughter,' she says.

"I try to give examples of other celebrities like Zoë Kravitz, for instance, who have to work through that, 'Oh yeah, you're the daughter of . . . and then eventually you're taken seriously for what you do. You just have to keep going.'"

There are fundamental differences between her and her daughter, Madonna adds. "Does she have the same drive I have? No. But she also has a mother and I didn't [her mom died in 1963]. She grew up with money and I didn't. So everything is going to be different. But what can I do? I can't fixate on it. I just have to do my best."

Lourdes, whose father is Carlos Leon (55), is very protective of her mother.

"If you feel like you have the right to comment on my mother, then I'm going to do the same to you," she says about people who've hurled insults at her mom.

"I'm increasingly able to recognise how influential and amazing this woman is and how empowering to other women and ahead of her time she's always been. She's probably the hardest worker I've ever seen."

When Lourdes isn't gracing runways or posing for high end fashion magazines, she goes to dance classes, does yoga and hangs out with her skater boyfriend, Jonathan Puglia (23), who she's reportedly been with since 2017.

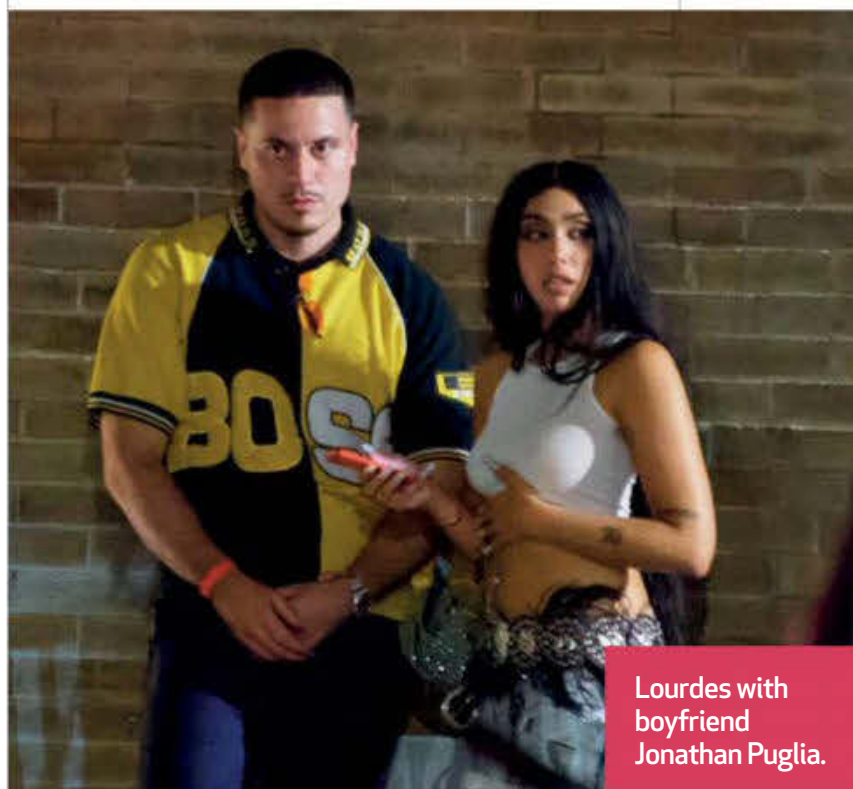
"I enjoy being a caregiver. I like cooking dinner for my boyfriend," she says. But marriage and babies aren't on the cards just yet. "I don't feel the need to get married and the idea of birth scares me literally to my core."

For now, Lourdes is focused on taking her career to the next level and she recently made headlines

when she starred in a racy campaign for Mugler. The model donned a daring dominatrix-style black bodysuit – and the resemblance to her famous mom was not lost on fans.

"Financially, modelling is a smart decision," she says. "I enjoy being very hands-on with the campaigns I do, so that I'm not just modelling, per se. I like to incorporate all those parts of myself into my projects."

Taking control, doing things her way. Like mother, like daughter. □

Madonna, who's worth a cool \$1.5 billion (R21.75 billion) also told Lourdes that money, fame and luxury are all smoke and mirrors.

"She said, 'It's what you're bringing into the world and what you're going to leave behind that count,' Lourdes says. "It's always this advice that shakes me awake when I get too caught up in everything."

Madonna has spoken candidly in the past about her challenges as a parent.

"Lola has a different father than Rocco and I have four adopted kids so there

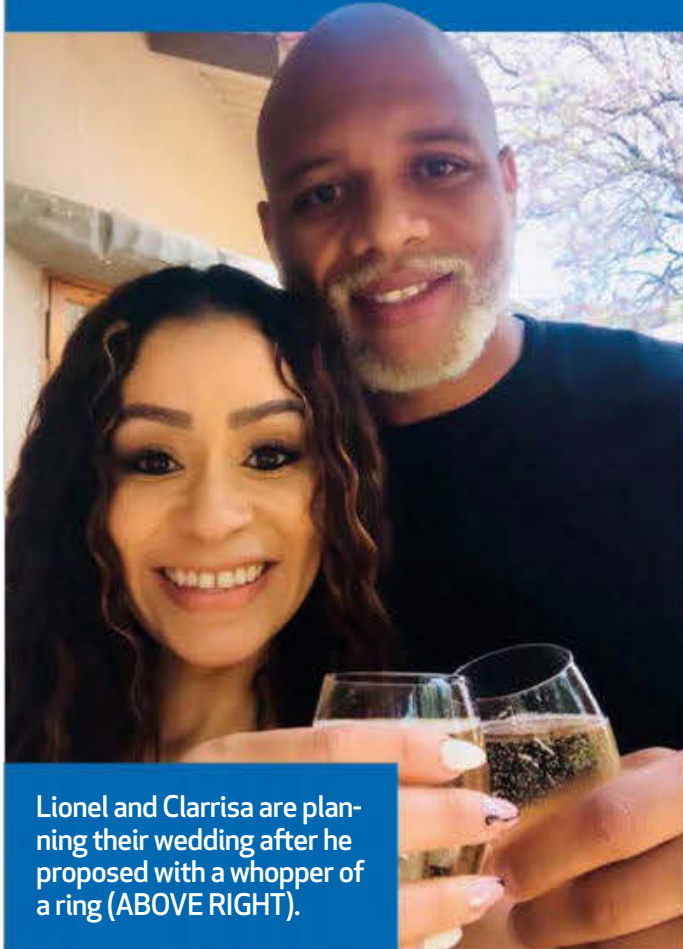
The film, which also stars Joey Rasdien, Schalk Bezuidenhout, Denise Newman and Zakeeya Patel, hits theatres on 26 November.

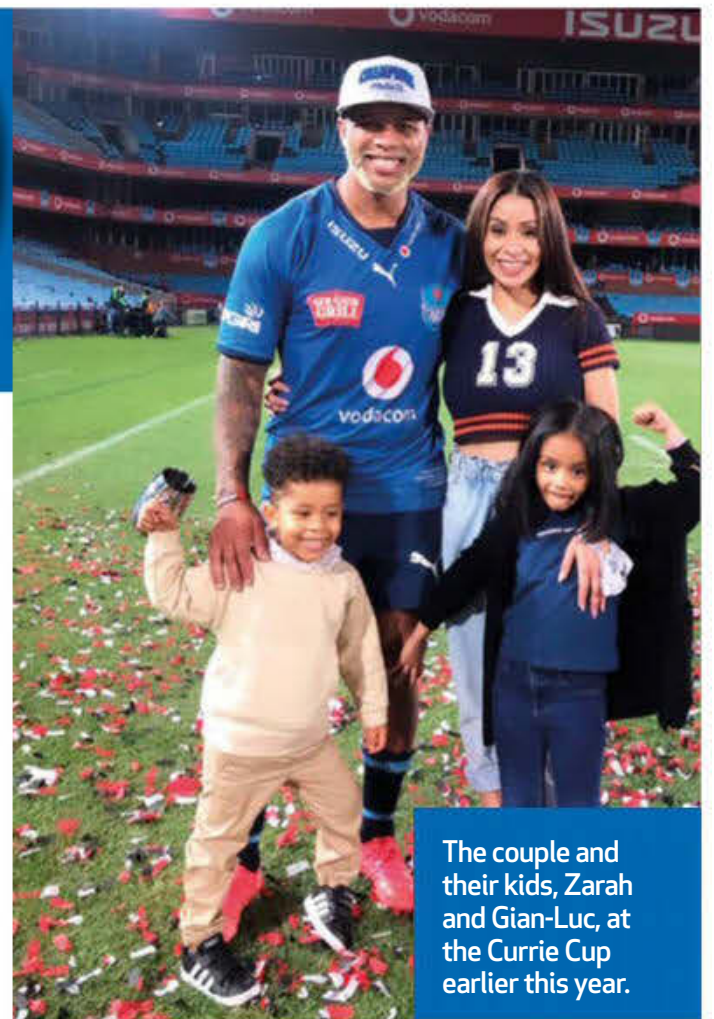

FAMILY FEUD!

THE ALLEGATIONS, THE CHARGES & GIGI AND ZAYN'S 'SUPER TOXIC' RELATIONSHIP

Things between **ZAYN MALIK** and **GIGI HADID**'s family are getting messy. One year after the singer welcomed daughter Khai with the supermodel, he's been accused of harassing her mother, Yolanda Hadid. Here's everything we know about the ongoing family drama.

Zayn Malik and Gigi Hadid have called a time-out on their relationship amid growing family drama.



► THE INCIDENT

Rumours of an altercation between Gigi's mother, **YOLANDA** (57) and Zayn (28) first surfaced towards the end of last month.

Yolanda claimed the singer had "struck" her at his home in rural Pennsylvania while Gigi

was away working in Paris in late September.

The reality TV star claimed in the legal paperwork that the singer had "grabbed and shoved her into a dresser, causing mental anguish and physical pain."

The court documents

also accuse Zayn of uttering "continuous cursing" toward Yolanda, calling her "a f**king Dutch slut".

The musician immediately responded, "adamantly" denying the accusations in a public statement.

◀ THE FALLOUT

Gigi's siblings have both unfollowed the Dusk till Dawn singer on Instagram. Her younger sister Bella Hadid (25) also shared a cryptic message on Instagram: "I can do nothing for you but work on myself. You can do nothing for me but work on yourself," the quote read.

Zayn's sister Waliyha Malik is clearly in her brother's corner as she shot back with a loaded reply aimed at the Hadid clan. "Karma comes after everyone eventually. You can't get away with screwing people over your whole life, I don't care who you are," her post read.

◀ THE CHARGES

A day later things took a legal turn when Yolanda pressed charges, accusing Zayn of four counts of harassment.

He immediately pleaded no contest to the charges and in addition to being fined was placed on a 90-day probation for each charge, accumulating

to 360 days total. The terms of his probation include an anger management class, a domestic violence programme and having no contact with Yolanda or her security detail.

THE SPLIT ►

Shortly after news of the family drama was made public insiders confirmed that Zayn and Gigi had split a few weeks ago, with a friend describing their relationship as "super toxic".

"It's much better that they've separated. Gigi and Zayn had a very destructive relationship when they were together," the source said of the pair who'd been dating on-off for six years.

Another insider says the

model has felt stuck in the middle of the drama between her mother and Zayn.

"Gigi feels like she's in the middle, she's not on anyone's side. That's her mom and the father of her child so it's a tough spot - she has loyalty to both."

The insider added that "Gigi realised it was healthier for her to not be with Zayn right now."

"It was ultimately her who ended the relationship."

WHAT NOW?

A legal battle between the estranged couple might be brewing.

"Gigi and Zayn co-parent **KHAI**, but any suggestion that he has aggression issues, or cannot be trusted to care for her, is something he'll fight against with every ounce of his body," a close pal of Zayn says.

According to the friend, the mother of one allegedly asked Zayn to seek help with anger management before they broke up.

"Gigi had urged Zayn to get therapy before they split and wanted him to deal with his issues."

Although Gigi wants to co-parent, she could be swayed by Yolanda's sentiment towards Zayn.

"Her mother could potentially make legal moves within the court systems about custody."

The Texas-born rapper (26) recently announced she'll receive her undergraduate degree in health administration from Texas Southern University later this year.
