
Every cent I made went towards Mum's credit card bills. Eventually, I paid off one, so now I'm starting to pay off the next one.

uddling my baby, Diego, I felt so much love. 'I might take him to see my sister next week,' I told my husband, Pedro.

'There's too much work,' he said.

I ran the office for his construction business, so I assured him I'd get everything done beforehand.

'If you go, I'll end our marriage,' Pedro snapped.

My heart sank.

Becoming a couple when I was 16, we'd been together for eight years.

After a tough childhood, all I wanted was to live in a happy family. And I'd got my fairytale – marrying my first love and having a baby.

But Pedro was becoming controlling, insisting I wore tight dresses and short skirts.

If I stood my ground, he'd get nasty. At other times, he'd be overbearingly nice, sending balloons and flowers to work.

It left me walking on eggshells.

What's more, everything was in Pedro's name - he

just gave me an allowance to spend.

I knew it wasn't right, but if I ever brought it up, he would get angry.

By the time our second son, Alessandro, came along in 2005, I wasn't allowed to join a gym, or wear bathers to the beach.

I couldn't even choose my own hairstyle.

'You know I don't like it like that,' he'd growled if I ever clipped it up.

And the verbal abuse was relentless. I'd take my make-up bag with me everywhere, ready to fix my face when he made me cry.

Falling pregnant with our third son, Cristiano, in 2007, I hoped things would change after he was born. But they didn't.

'Okay,' I said, hesitantly. In the kitchen, I felt nervous and fiddled around, offering him a sandwich.

Suddenly, his eyes went dark and he launched at me, pushing me to the floor.

He started strangling me as I fought back. He was too strong, and soon I couldn't hear anything.

My vision got smaller and I stopped fighting.

Then, he let go.

Somehow, I stumbled up.

But then he dragged me to the bedroom where he raped me twice.

I called the boys' babysitter from my car, shaking. I asked her to pick them up from day care and school and take them to her place to keep them safe.


Then, I drove to my mum's. I told her everything, and phoned the police.

I battled trauma, PTSD and grief, and threw myself into caring for my boys.

Going forward, I practised

positive thinking and trained as a fitness coach. Now, I help others transform their lives – something I never imagined doing.

I've walked in incredibly tough shoes, but you *can* turn your life around.

Domestic abuse doesn't have to be physical – it can be verbal. The scars may not be visible, but they're just as painful.

If you're in an abusive situation, reach out and get help.

stared at the good-looking snowboarder and had a weird feeling. This is The One, I thought. David, then 24, was laid-back and funny.

It was only our second date, but I didn't feel like I had time for romance.

'I've got Huntington's,' I started. 'I'll probably die early, so I need to get married and have kids as soon as possible. If you don't want to, I understand.'

Instead of walking away, David held me tightly.

'I've read about Huntington's,' he said softly. 'That's awful.'

Aged 24, I lived with the genetic neurological condition, which causes cognitive and memory problems, tremors, and a diminished lifespan.

My dad, Stephen, had been diagnosed in his 40s and was living in a nursing home.

When I was 19, genetic testing confirmed I had it, along with my younger

sister Emma, then 18, but

our older sister Lee, then 23, didn't carry the gene.

The diagnosis had been devastating. With no idea when symptoms might start, I discovered we were

I threw myself into life. And I became determined to have children.

'I want a football team of kids,' I laughed to David.

'Let's see how we go,' he smiled, kissing me.

Our love bloomed and, visiting my mum, Angela, our family plans came up.

'You can test to see if a

baby has Huntington's in

the womb now - there's a 50/50 chance they carry the gene,' Mum explained.

Just a few months later,

pregnant, but our joy was tinged with worry.

'I can't put our child through the pain I'm going to have in the

future,' I told David. 'If the baby has Huntington's, I can't go through with the pregnancy.'

'I'm here for you whatever happens,' David said, bravely. At 12 weeks, I went in for

genetic testing and, after an agonising eight-week wait, our results came back.

'Your baby doesn't carry the Huntington's gene,' the doctor told us.

We were overjoyed. Our little bundle of love, Mackenzie, was born in July 2013.

Placing her gently in Dad's arms at the nursing home, I helped him hold her.

'She's beautiful,' he said, as his arms shook violently.

It was lovely to see them together, but a sobering reminder of how little time I had.

Falling pregnant soon after, amazingly, the tests showed our second bub





to Mum.

'That's just baby brain,' she reassured me.

Oliver was born in August 2015.

He was divine, but I'd never been so tired.

My legs and arms began to shake and, tripping over in the kitchen one day, I burnt my arm on the oven.

'It's starting,' I told David gravely.

My worst fears were confirmed by my specialist. My symptoms had begun.

It felt like a death sentence. I knew I only had 20 years after the onset of symptoms.

The next day, at the beach with the children, tears tore down my cheeks.

Soon, I wouldn't be able to look after them and, one day, I might not recognise

their beautiful faces or see them grow up.

But as I watched the kids laughing, I realised some people never knew this much love in their whole lives.

You've got to make the best of every minute! I told myself.

'I love you so much, nothing will ever change that,' David, my tower of strength, told me back home.

We decided we'd tell the kids about my Huntington's when they got older, so they just thought I was forgetful.

My memory was so bad I put up a huge chalkboard

to write all the appointments on it. 'Mummy, I can write for you,' Mackenzie said. 'I've got a better brain than you!'

One night she piped up: 'Silly Mummy we've had chicken nuggets and chips every night this week.'

She wasn't complaining!

On a rare night at the pub with my sisters, the doorman frowned as I fell over.

'I can't let you in, you're drunk,' he said firmly.

'But I've only had one drink,' I laughed. Tve got Huntington's.'

I've learned to ask for help. I now have a cleaner, and a driver to take the kids to school. Mum also looks af**ter the kids** twice a week.

Mum started Walk for

Hope, which supports families impacted by Huntington's. She's since raised over \$100,000.

There's no treatment at present, but I'm hopeful the future will hold some. When I get too sick, I want David to put me in a nursing home, but he won't hear of it.

'You're my wife, in sickness and in health. I'll look after you,' he says.

I'm the luckiest woman alive to have such a wonderful family.

My life is full of love, and I'm going to cherish every last minute.





These horrible crimes prove that you can't always judge a book by its cover

hen Pavton Leutner went to Morgan Geyser's for a slumber party in May 2014, she had no idea her life would soon be hanging in the balance.

Payton and Morgan, both 12, had been besties for two years, but that changed when Morgan met Anissa Weier. Morgan had become



the fictional horror character 'Slender Man' after Anissa. also 12, told her about him.

The tall, thin, faceless man wearing a dark suit, who was said to abduct children, had been invented for an online contest in 2009. But the line between fact and fiction soon blurred, and some people began believing he was real.

Payton didn't understand Morgan and Anissa's fascination with Slender Man.

'It kind of frightened me a little bit,' Payton admitted to the US ABC News.

On that fateful night, Payton and Anissa slept over at Morgan's house to celebrate her 12th birthday.

Next morning, Anissa suggested they play hide and

seek in the woods, and that's when Morgan attacked Payton with a knife, stabbing her 19 times as Anissa spurred her on.

Left for dead, Payton managed to drag herself to a road, and was rushed to hospital.

Confessing, Weier and Geyser

were charged. The girls admitted they believed killing her would make them Slender Man's servants.

Weier and Geyser were sentenced to up to 25 years and up to 40 years, respectively, in a mental health facility. Weier, now 19,

was granted a conditional release this September.

hysicians are meant to heal. but Dr Michael Swango did the exact opposite - he liked to hurt people.

Once, while working as a paramedic, he was convicted of trying to poison several coworkers by putting ant

killer in their doughnuts.

> And while the deadly doc spent three months working at the Veterans Affairs medical centre in

Northport, US, in 1993, he took the lives of three patients - Thomas Sammarco, 73, George Siano, 60, and Aldo Serini, 62.

In July 2000, he was finally charged with their murders.

Pleading guilty, Swango admitted that he murdered the patients with lethal injections.

'I did this by administering a toxic substance which I knew was likely to cause death. I knew it was wrong,' Swango said.

Pages from Swango's diary were submitted as evidence and revealed that the serial

killer enjoyed the feeling of power that came with taking a life.

'By his own admission in his diary, he killed because it thrilled him,' Assistant US Attorney Gary Brown said.

Swango was sentenced to three consecutive life sentences, without the possibility of parole, in a maximum-security prison.

Although convicted of only three murders, it's suspected Swango could be responsible for the deaths of as many as 60 patients.

Karen, who lived nearby, in California, US, had driven past

had met her lovely husband Tony, 90, a decade earlier waiting at a supermarket deli counter.

Chatting, he'd asked her out for a coffee that night. A charmer, he even bought two dozen roses!

So, in September 2018, when Adele received the news her daughter Karen Navarra, 67, had been found dead in her home, Tony was there for his devastated

wife.

After failing

to show up for

his house and tooted her horn later that day, Tony added. Karen was wearing a FitBit,

and its data revealed her heart rate spiked at 3.20pm that day before dropping rapidly. Her last heartbeat registered at 3.28pm.

Security footage of Karen's home showed Tony's car parked in her driveway from 3.12pm until 3.33pm that day.

Footage also revealed that Karen's white car hadn't driven past Tony's home.

Police also found a

camouflage jacket of Tony's covered in splatters of his stepdaughter's blood.

Arrested and charged with killing Karen,

Tony Aiello maintained that he was innocent.

'She was alive when I left,' he insisted to police.

'I'm a... family man,' he said. Denied bail, Tony remained in prison while he awaited trial, and his health deteriorated rapidly. He died on September 10, 2019 - a year after Karen's death and before he faced court.

Without any other suspects to consider, the case was closed.

Marcel helps to feed the hungry and combat food waste

n church, my friend Eliza came up to me.
She'd brought me a loaf of bread from the bakery where she worked.

'Give this to someone who needs it,' she said.

It was such a simple gesture, but I knew it would make the world of difference to someone less fortunate.

Over the next few weeks, Eliza brought in more bread for me to give to others.

'It was going to end up in the bin,' she told me.

With the help of a friend who had a truck, she was distributing loaves as a way of paying forward kindness.

Later, Eliza told me her friend had sold his truck and could no longer assist her, so I offered to help her one day a week. Stacking my tiny car up to the roof, there was enough food to feed an army!

Me and the Gift

of Bread van

How on earth will I get rid of it all? I wondered.

So, armed with dozens of loaves, I knocked on all my

friends' doors to drop off the fresh produce.

At first, they were delighted. And it was a wonderful

excuse to catch up and break bread together. But within weeks, their freezers were so full they couldn't

take any more either.

'I could put you in touch with some organisations who help disadvantaged members of the community,' one friend offered.

Incredibly, within

days, we had more requests for food than we could keep up with from charities such as St Vincent de Paul.

Sadly, more than three million Australians are living below the poverty line.

I approached more local bakeries, and they agreed to donate their unsold produce for us to distribute within the community.

Sharing the good news with friends, they offered to take turns picking up, repacking and delivering the food.

'What an incredible gift,' people said, when they heard about what we did.

It inspired me to name our charity Gift of Bread.

Before long, I'd outgrown my car, so I traded it for a more practical SUV, before we were gifted our very first van by the Canterbury League Club, home of the Bulldogs football team.

And what started as a few

friends helping out, quickly turned into 20 volunteers.

I'm proud of how far we've come

We were given the use of a hall to store and pack the bread. But within months, we outgrew it and moved to a facility of our own.

Since its humble beginnings in 2007, the charity has gone from strength to strength, with 300 volunteers working in eight centres in Sydney.

We collect about 10,000 loaves a week from dozens of stores, including Coles, Bakers Delight, Shepherd's Artisan Bakehouse, Luxe Bakery and more.

Then we deliver these goods to more than 200 community organisations, including ones that deal with youth homelessness, women's refuges, boarding houses, plus others.

That's around 160,000 kilos of food being spared from landfill *each week*.

Relying on donations from fundraisers and community grants, I'm so proud of how far we've come. As long as there are mouths to feed, we'll be here to make sure no-one goes hungry.


1 x 220g packet frozen sweet flan/pie base 2 lemons

3 eggs, at room temperature 395g can sweetened condensed milk ½ cup caster sugar

- 1 Cook pie base according to packet directions and let cool.
- 2 Finely grate rind and squeeze juice from lemons. You will need 1 tblsp of lemon rind and ½ cup of juice.

2 x 200g blocks dark cooking chocolate, chopped4 egg yolks1 tblsp golden syrup

300ml tub thickened cream COFFEE MERINGUE

4 egg whites
1 cup caster sugar
1 tblsp dry instant coffee
powder (not coffee granules)

1 Lightly grease a 24cm round x 5½ cm deep, loose-base flan tin (base measures 21cm).

2 Process biscuits in a food processor until finely crushed. Add butter and syrup. Process until combined. Press firmly over base and side of tin. Refrigerate.

3 To make filling, place chocolate in a medium heatproof bowl. Sit bowl over a saucepan of simmering water. Stir until melted. Remove the bowl and cool for 10 minutes.

4 Whisk yolks into chocolate (mixture may seize at this stage). Add syrup and 2 tblsps of boiling water. Whisk until smooth. Cool to room temperature. Whisk in cream.

5 Pour filling into biscuit crust. Cover. Refrigerate for 4 hours, or overnight.
6 To make meringue, beat egg whites in the large bowl of an electric mixer until frothy. Gradually beat in sugar, 1 tblsp at a time until combined. Continue beating on high speed for about 8 to 9 minutes, or

until sugar is dissolved and meringue is thick and glossy. Add coffee. Beat for about 1 minute, or until dissolved.

7 Spoon the meringue over the filling in tin, using the back of a spoon to create peaks.

8 Cook in a very hot oven (220°C) for about 3 to 4 minutes, or until evenly browned. Remove. Cool in tin for 10 minutes before refrigerating for 30 minutes.

9 Transfer pie to a plate. Cut into wedges to serve.

1 Place undrained pineapple, lime juice and sugar in a blender. Blend until smooth.

3 Beat coconut milk, condensed milk and cream in a small bowl of an electric mixer until thick.

tatton?' I exclaimed.
'That's my surname!'
It was April 25,
1996 – Anzac Day
– and my local paper had
listed the names of
Tasmania's 13 Victoria Cross
recipients. One was Sergeant
Percy Clyde Statton.
Ldidn't know much about

I didn't know much about medals, but I knew the Victoria Cross, or VC, was the most prestigious there was. Awarded for acts of bravery in wartime, it was our highest military honour.

Presented at Buckingham Palace, London, UK, it was given for valour 'in the presence of the enemy' to members of the British and Commonwealth countries' Armed Forces.

'Are we related to Percy Clyde Statton?' I asked my aunt Merlene.

'Oh yes, he's your greatgrandfather,' she confirmed

proudly. 'He was
a real hero.
He died in
1959, eight
years

before you were born.'

Aged 31, I was shocked nobody had mentioned this before. Eager to learn how he'd earned his VC, I applied

for Percy's WWI records.

I discovered that on
August 12,
1918, near
Proyart in
northern
France, and
armed only with a
revolver, he'd rushed four
German machine gun posts,
forcing them to retreat.

Intoy Tough
for OUR
also leads to the soldier of the soldie

He then ran into heavy fire to drag two of his injured comrades to safety.

Sergeant Statton set a magnificent example of quick decision, and the success of the attacking troops was largely due to his determined gallantry, his citation read.

Blown away, I went to the Australian War Memorial in Canberra, ACT, where his VC, awarded to him by King George V, sits behind glass for everyone to see.

I gazed at it in awe.

Being so rare, it was
worth well over a million

Piecing together his life,

dollars. But to me, it was priceless.

They fought
for our
freedom

I learnt I was a descendant from his marriage with Elsie May, who left Percy when he went

to war. My research

also led me to meeting local war veteran Frank MacDonald MM, a former soldier who not only served

with Percy in the 40th battalion, but was a witness to his bravery.

Despite
being nearly
100, Frank had
not forgotten
Percy's actions.

Taking my hand in his,

'Percy's bravery was outstanding,' he told me. 'He deserved three VC medals for what he did. He risked his life facing those German machine guns.'

Frank and Percy had stayed friends after World War I, before both also serving in WWII.

I learnt so much about Percy through Frank, and loved seeing him.

Each time, he'd take my hand in his, and cry.

'You're the only person he does that with,' whispered his niece Phyllis who looked after him. 'He looks at you and sees Percy,' she said.

I felt so honoured. Frank lived to 107,





making him the oldest

surviving First World War veteran, and I paid my respects at his state funeral.

I also connected with Jason Howell, the grandson of Tasmanian schoolboy Reginald Barker, who had exchanged letters with Percy in 1917.

He still had a letter from Percy, kept in an old tin for a century. It was wonderful to read the 'letter from the grave'. Percy described being in his bunker as it snowed, and how he longed for the warmth of home.

The fact he took the time to write back to this 11-yearold boy overwhelmed me.

In 2018, to commemorate the centenary of the 1918

armistice

ushering in the end of the war, I travelled to France to retrace Percy's steps.

There, I went to the Western Front, a major battle line, where soldiers had fought from muddy, uncomfortable trenches.

Ken Lees, my guide, took me to each location where Percy had fought. Finally, he led me onto private property, and up a cliff.

'This is where it happened, Kerri,' he said, pointing. 'Germans would have been there and Percy, here. This is where your greatgrandfather earned his VC.'

Imagining the scene, I broke down in tears.

I felt so privileged to have been able to walk in Percy's shoes.

Back in Tasmania, I was determined to prevent the names of our brave men vanishing into history.

I wanted to get together
descendants of all 15
Tasmanian VC recipients
– two more had been
awarded VCs posthumously
– so we could share

memories in their honour. It took a year of research, but

I found them all.

They all knew about their brave ancestor and were thrilled to have been contacted.

Caroline, the daughter of Lance Corporal Bernard Sidney Gordon VC, MM, and in her 80s, burst into tears when I rang her.

'I thought Dad had been forgotten,' she wept.

I assured her he hadn't.

In August 2021, in a world first, descendants from each VC recipient met up for a prestigious luncheon where they were presented with replica sets of the VC and a ceremonial cake was cut with a sword.

Then each person shared the story of their ancestor. It was incredibly moving.

Today, I'm still a voice and passionate advocate for all Victoria Cross recipients in Australia.


I march in honour of them all on Anzac

Day and lay a wreath on Remembrance Day to pay tribute to them.

sheep farm. But, in 2020, when Xena

was three years old, in the middle of a drought, the COVID-19 pandemic hit.

Struggling to make ends meet, with 32 hectares of sheep and cattle property to maintain, we were forced to destock.

As Xena and Hera were sheepdogs, I knew we'd have to lose them too.

'They're our girls,' I said to Brad, devastated.

But I knew Xena and Hera would no longer thrive on our farm, and we loved

So, in October 2020, we made the heartbreaking decision to give them a new home at a nearby property.

Block out blue light two hours before bed. Blue light, which is emitted from screens such as your TV or phone, can inhibit melatonin. Some newer TVs and computers

have blue light filters you can use. You can also buy blue blocking

Try diffusing lavender – one study found it improved sleep quality by as much as 45 per cent.

Give yourself an hour of technology-free time before bed. You could also set your alarm to remind yourself when it's time to do this.

Take a shower. The drop in core body temperature as you emerge from a steamy shower into a cooler bathroom is a cue for melatonin synthesis.

Boost your magnesium by Thaving lots of leafy greens in your diet. Studies have found this mineral can lower anxiety.

Get reading. Diving into a good Obook (or magazine) can help to reduce stress levels - with one study finding the effects take hold in just six minutes.

Use an eye mask – this will protect you from the sabotaging effects of light while you sleep.



Is surgery necessary for my heel spur?

My partner and I did a lot of walking on a recent trip away. I have developed a pain in my heel, which I put down to the increase in exercise, but we've now been back home resting for several days and it's no better. My GP is arranging an X-ray, as he suspects I may have a spur. If that's the case, will I need surgery?

Heel spurs are caused by a build-up of calcium deposits on the underside of the heel bone, and they form over months rather than just days, so this may have been developing before your recent increase in exercise. If the X-ray confirms it's a spur, your doctor will discuss

options with you, and those could include getting custom-made orthotics (worn inside footwear), anti-inflammatories, steroid injections or, yes, possibly surgery.

A childhood infection caused problems for Pamela more than 50 years later

y back's so itchy!'
I cried, scratching
it madly. My right
arm was itchy too.

It was September 2020, and the next day, the skin on my back and arm broke out into blisters, then into a red rash.

I must be allergic to something, I thought.

Two days later, my right arm got heavy – and then became paralysed!

I had a shoulder injury so, assuming it had been caused by having cortisone injections for that, I saw my doctor.

'You've got shingles,' he said, after doing a swab test.

'Shingles?' I exclaimed.

'Yes, it's an infection that's caused by the same virus as chickenpox and can appear as blisters on your skin,' he told me.

The doctor explained that if you have chickenpox, it stays in your system and later

can reactivate as shingles. I was stunned.

I'd had chickenpox as a child, but I never dreamed it would cause me problems over half a century later.

'A common complication is postherpetic neuralgia,' the doctor added, 'which causes pain after the blisters have cleared up. That's what's causing the paralysis in your arm too.'

He put me on medication

for pain relief, which helped, but made me sleepy.

If I hadn't waited five days to see him, I could have gone on anti-viral med

anti-viral medication, but now it was too late.

The rash cleared up after two weeks, but I still couldn't even lift my right arm and had to stop working as an aged care nurse.

I couldn't carry shopping or do household chores with that arm either. Luckily, I had lovely neighbours who helped me out.

The worst part was the

nerve pain, which would hit without warning.

It was like a red hot poker stabbing through my neck and down my arm. Sometimes, it woke me at night.

The skin on my arm was so sensitive that I'd wince if anyone touched it or if I wore long sleeves.

'The pain and sensitivity will stop when the shingles clears up,' my doctor said.

'How long will that be?'
I asked, but he didn't know.
Someone told me her

mum had shingles for five years!

The blisters

Although shingles isn't contagious, a few months later my daughter

Melissa, 41, also got shingles down her leg after a partial knee replacement.

Thankfully, hers wasn't as bad as mine, and cleared up in a month.

She'd had chickenpox as well as the chickenpox vaccine as a child.

My mum also had shingles on her scalp, but no pain at all. Studies have found it can run in families.

Today, a year on, I've got some feeling back in my arm and I've gone back to work part-time.

My advice to others is to go to your doctor straight away if you think you have it. Caught early enough, anti-viral medication should stop it in its tracks.

Next year, I plan to retire and go travelling around Australia in my campervan.

I hope to

recovery

Hopefully, I'll make a full recovery and will be able to do just that. ●

SHINGLES

- Is a viral infection caused by the varicella zoster virus, the same one that causes chickenpox. It is most common in people over 50.
- Over time, our immune systems weaken, which may allow the virus to reactivate years later.
- Typically, it causes a painful rash on one side of the face or the body that often blisters and scabs over in 10 to 15 days.
- Symptoms include itching, burning, numbness and tingling. It can also cause nerve pain that can last months or even years.
- A zoster vaccine reduces the risk of getting shingles.
- Shingles isn't contagious, but if an unvaccinated person comes into direct contact with the blisters, they may get the virus.

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
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
