

## Snow White Christmas Cake

Our Almond, Coconut and Raspberry Layer Cake is a decadent and festive finale for any holiday gathering.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

#### MAKES 16 TO 20 SERVINGS

#### **Almond Cakes**

- cups all-purpose flour
- cup ground almonds
- tbsp baking powder
- ½ tsp salt
- eggs, at room temperature
- 1½ cups granulated sugar
- cup canola oil
- tsp almond extract
- cup 2% milk
- cup 2% plain yogurt

#### Raspberry Filling

250 g fresh or frozen raspberries (about 2 cups)

- tbsp granulated sugar
- tbsp lemon juice
- tsp cornstarch

#### **Coconut Buttercream**

21/3 cups granulated sugar

- 1¼ cups liquid egg whites
- 3 cups unsalted butter, cubed and softened
- ½ cup coconut cream
- ½ tsp coconut extract (optional)
- (to 3) cups unsweetened coconut flakes

#### **Coconut Snowballs**

(recipe below) (optional)



#### DIRECTIONS

#### **Almond Cakes**

Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease three 8-inch round cake pans and line bottoms with parchment paper; set aside. In bowl, combine flour, ground almonds, baking powder and salt; set aside. In large bowl, using electric mixer on medium speed, beat eggs with sugar until light and fluffy, about 5 minutes. Beat in oil and almond extract. On low speed, beat in reserved dry ingredients in 3 additions, alternating with milk and yogurt, just until batter is smooth. Scrape batter into prepared pans: smooth tops.

Bake until cake tester inserted in centres of cakes comes out clean, about 30 minutes. Cool in pans on wire racks for 10 minutes. Unmould cakes directly onto wire racks; let cool completely. (Make-ahead: Can be stored in airtight container at room temperature for up to 24 hours or frozen for up to 1 month.)

#### Raspberry Filling

Meanwhile, in saucepan, stir together raspberries, sugar and lemon juice. Bring mixture to boil. Reduce heat and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes. In small bowl, stir cornstarch with 1 tbsp water. Add to saucepan; return mixture to boil and cook, stirring often, until filling has thickened, about 2 minutes. Transfer mixture to bowl; let cool. Chill in refrigerator for 30 minutes.

#### Coconut Buttercream

In metal bowl, whisk sugar with egg whites. Set bowl over saucepan of simmering (not boiling) water; whisk until sugar has dissolved and mixture is smooth, or candy thermometer reads 140°F, about 5 minutes. Pour mixture into bowl of stand mixer fitted with whisk attachment (or use large bowl and handheld electric mixer). Whip on medium-high speed until mixture has completely cooled and stiff peaks form, about 10 minutes (if mixture only forms soft peaks after 12 minutes, stop beating - you'll just get a little less frosting).

Fit stand mixer with flat beater. Beat butter into mixture, 1 cube at a time, until creamy and smooth (it will start out crumbly). Beat in coconut cream, and coconut extract, if using. (Make-ahead: Can be refrigerated for up to 2 days. Remove from fridge at least 30 minutes before using; beat lightly and continue with recipe.)

#### Assembly

Using serrated knife, trim tops of cakes to level, if necessary. Spread 1 tsp of the icing in centre of cake plate; top with 1 cake layer, cut side up. Spread half of the Raspberry Filling over cut side, leaving ¾-inch border around edge. Using a metal spatula, evenly cover second cake's cut side with 1 cup of the Coconut Buttercream; invert onto first cake, so buttercream and Raspberry Filling are touching. Spread remaining Raspberry Filling over second cake's exposed top, leaving 34-inch border around edge. Using metal spatula, evenly cover third cake's cut side with another 1 cup of the Coconut Buttercream: invert onto second cake layer, so buttercream and Raspberry Filling are touching.

Spread remaining Coconut Buttercream overtop, smoothing side and top. Gently press coconut flakes all over icing. Garnish with Coconut Snowballs, if using. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes before serving. (Make-ahead: Can be refrigerated for up to 2 days.)

#### Coconut Snowballs

#### MAKES 11 SNOWBALLS

In food processor, pulse 1 cup unsweetened shredded coconut, ½ cup ground almonds and ¼ cup maple syrup until mixture forms a paste. Using hands, shape mixture by tablespoonful into balls. Place ¼ cup unsweetened shredded coconut on plate.

Roll balls in shredded coconut, coating well. (Make-ahead: Can be refrigerated in airtight container for up to 1 week.)

# The Coupe Glass

Arren Williams celebrates the comeback of the classic champagne coupe.





hampagne - that most sparkling of French exports sparks intrigue. No doubt, the lore around the beloved bubbly is fascinating. Have you heard the story that champagne was actually invented in England? To that we say, Mais non! Or maybe you've heard that the voluptuous bowl-shaped champagne coupe was modelled after the breasts of Marie Antoinette? Ooh là là! Risqué origin stories aside, it's a fact that the coupe, or champagne saucer, was depicted in The Oyster Dinner - a 1735 bacchanalian painting by French court artist Jean-François de Troy - thus cementing it as the de rigueur glassware of the 18th-century upper class.

Since then, innumerable corks have popped, but to get a perfect celebratory clink between glasses, crystal is required. For that, Waterford, appearing on the scene in 1783, not long after de Troy's painting debuted, is the go-to. Their classic Lismore pattern has been catching the light since the 1950s, when coupe glasses were in their heyday in kicky Hollywood hits starring Rock Hudson and Doris Day. Ever since, Waterford has periodically refreshed their classic for modern tastes. Lismore Essence is the latest: pared back, with just the right amount of cut crystal to make every occasion a little more sparkly.

Yes, we know oenophiles will say that champagne bubbles lose their pop quicker in a coupe, but there's something more fun about the shape. Crystal or otherwise, the coupe is a modern bar essential, and a fave of mixologists for anything with fizz and for the fanciest of cocktails. Plus, you can't make a champagne tower out of flute glasses! Speaking of fun, we love Maison Balzac's playfully pink Pomponette coupes, adorned with tiny amber glass bubbles. More contemporary is Ferm Living's Danish-designed Ripple - the ribbed smoke grey coupe manages to feel both vintage and modern at the same time. We can only raise our glasses and say "Cheers!" to the coupe!

Designer Lindsay Agnew shares how to decorate for the holidays in a style that marries modern and timeless.

lean minimal lines and textures with a timeless quality were the twin asks of the owners of this Toronto living room. Designer Lindsay Agnew of Si & Oui complied with a full rebuild that gave the room modern architectural features and strong focal points. Elements like the new

fireplace and custom shelves fulfill the mandate for modern, while pedigree fabrics like raw, unbleached linen at the windows and a wool rug underfoot add a timeless quality. The homeowners were so happy with the new space, they invited Si & Oui back to dress the room for the holidays. Here's how Lindsay imbued the room with holiday style.



#### **INSIDER ADVICE**

- → Garlands, wreaths, tree and tinsel can overwhelm a room. "Our advice is to choose pieces that complement your existing decor," says Lindsay. She repeated the burgundy and plum tones from the sofa cushions throughout the space. "The result is a fresh take on a classic palette."
- Don't overcrowd shelves. Choose large-scale accessories that are big enough to make a statement but subtle in tone so they don't create visual busyness. In this case, one full shelf of accessories was removed to make room for small gifts, pine boughs and a vintage sleigh.
- → Make it personal with new ways to display heirlooms and treasured collections. "The [painted] terracotta bowl holds some of this family's most valued ornaments, and the gifts are for their friends and family," says Lindsay.
- → During the holidays, as with the rest of the year, layered lighting is essential. Says Lindsay, "The gas fireplace, candles and the twinkle of string lights all add texture and depth to this living room."
- → Opt for no-fuss decorations. To make the room feel festive without a large tree, Lindsay arranged a few branches in a modern smoked-glass vase.
- → Create big impact with small touches. "We added hints of greenery throughout with branches, spruce boughs, fresh flowers and a tiny live tree, which all come together to pack a big punch," says Lindsay.
- → Do it yourself. "We worked with the homeowner to add faux greens and natural pine to the top of wooden wreaths," says Lindsay. "The wreaths are peppered throughout the house for a seasonal accent that is all theirs."


#### CIRCLES & STARS

t's beginning to look a lot like Christmas...or is it? For many of us, the holidays conjure up images of candy canes and Santa. Others prefer a more minimal look. Here, I look at ways to make your holiday decor magical - no matter your style - by focusing on festive palettes.

#### The New Subtle Palette

A less Christmasy palette that melds with your existing decor is now an established trend. Retailers have responded with holiday decorations in every palette. So, even if your home is creamy-dreamy with top notes of lavender and plum - like this room by designers Erin Feasby and Cindy Bleeks - you can dress it in holiday style without making big changes to your existing decor. Erin and Cindy love the look so much, they have

created ready-made kits that come complete with minimalist ceramic houses, candles and mini trees, so you can be holiday stylish in a snap. If you're into subtle Christmas style, then forget swapping in seasonal pillows and throws or rolling out a new rug. Instead, work with what you have and use your accessories and art as a jumping-off point for holiday accents. Invest in low-key metallic basics, and ornaments or decorations in colours analogous to your home's palette or in similar tones. And bring in branches and simple greenery for next-level holiday style.

### Classic Christmas Colours

This look - think pinecones, handmade ornaments, nutcrackers, and classic red, white and green - will always be on trend. You can put a twist on it by incorporating decorations in tones of your home's current palette, but a traditional tree is key. If you're in a small space, opt for a mini tree in a pot or basket; place on a tabletop to make it a focal point. Festoon the mantel and stair railings with pine and eucalyptus swags embellished with ornaments, berries and flowers. Go for abundance: I like big groupings of winter flowers like amaryllis and poinsettia, as well as collections of candles, and bowls of nuts and holiday sweets.



### Tree of Treasures Palette

Most of us have ornaments we've inherited or purchased over many years, and for many of us, nostalgia trumps tight palettes! So, I suggest (designer friends, hold on to your Santa hats!) that we forget the two Christmas tree approach (designers often recommend a small "kids" tree and a perfectly decorated large one) and put old, new and kid-crafted decorations on full display. My trick to blending everything harmoniously is to keep the backdrop consistent. Start with a base of all-white lights or multiples of the same ornament, then sprinkle in those perfectly imperfect treasures. The holidays are all about tradition, nostalgia and, let's face it, a little bit of wackiness, so have yourself a happy holiday!



### UNIFY HOLIDAY DECOR

- · Group like items together. Try a large bowl of ornaments from the same era or a collection of elves or figurines on the mantel.
- Use ribbon wrapped around your tree, gifts, wreaths and garlands to unify your colour scheme.
- Hang pretty paper snowflakes in windows and on your tree - this is a great project for kids!
- · Adorn your windows, doorways and mantel with the same garland greenery.

hen the Griffith kids – Amelia, 8, and Noah, 12 – go to sleep in December, visions of sugarplums dance in their heads. But not only the Christmas kind. "We celebrate Chrismukkah," says Tamara Robbins Griffith, partner and principal designer at Kerr + Field Interiors, who grew up ringing in Hanukkah while her husband, Edward Griffith, trimmed a tree. Now their century-old blended-holiday home in Toronto's Leslieville comes to life with twinkling lights, a pastel palette and natural decor. Here's how Tamara decked the halls this year for a merry Chrismukkah!



### WINDOW DRESSING

"I always put a fresh wreath on the outside front door, but it's kind of nice not having pine needles fall on your sofa," laughs Tamara, hence the felted-wool snowflake wreath pinned up over the window. Framed between striped silk drapery, it hits an elegantly festive note. Says Tamara, "It's nice to have some things you can reuse every year."

"I have to let go of my design control and let the kids have fun with it," Tamara says of her approach to dressing the Christmas tree. "This tree is a fake one that looks really good, but my husband does like the nostalgia of a fresh tree," says Tamara.



The door is always open at designer Sarah St. Amand's classic 1950s home in Brantford, Ont. At Christmas, guests enter her merry-and-bright abode beneath a garland of fresh greenery. "It's a classic," says Sarah (shown above). Indoors, the look is traditional, but - secret revealed - that banister garland isn't real. Says Sarah: "My tip? Tie it with wide satin ribbon bows. It drapes so beautifully."

The dining room houses another only-looks-real Christmas tree and a golden bar cart set with snowy forests under cloches.

# ASK US

You've got design questions. We've got the answers. Designer and Style at Home contributor Karl Lohnes solves your decorating challenges.



Q2 We are planning to renovate our powder room and have purchased a vessel sink. Should the counter height be the same as with an undermount sink? Cathy, via email S@H Sometimes good design is all about the math. Don't panic. I've done it for you. Most vessel sinks add four to six inches to

the height of the vanity. The top of your vessel sink should not exceed 36 inches in height from the floor when installed. So, in this case, the countertop height should not exceed 30 to 32 inches. These measurements are important to preplan, especially if you are incorporating a wall-mounted faucet, as plumbing will go in before the vanity is installed.

Ql I live in a split-level house. The stairs, railings, floors, door trims and doors are all vellowed oak, which I no longer like. Sanding and staining all the wood is incredibly costly. I am considering Montpellier coloured wood flooring from Dubeau. Any suggestions for the other wood finishes? Shiraz K., via email

S@H Your home has a lot of wood, which is no longer in style, so making a change will update its look and add value. My suggestion is to paint the trims, interior doors and railings - it will be less costly than replacing everything and you won't waste the perfectly good existing elements. The Montpellier flooring from Dubeau has grey undertones but also has a warmth, which is why I suggest going warmer rather than cooler for your paint colours. Try Hope TR24-8-1 from BeautiTone for trims, and their Spirited TR24-9-1 on the walls. Bottom line: Keep it fresh, light and neutral.







 $Q3_{\,I\,have\,an\,alcove/}$ nook at the back of my small living room that I would like to decorate and better connect it to the room, rather than have it sectioned off by itself. Any ideas? Sandy R.,

via email

S@H Incorporating a small open space into a larger one takes a little bit of design trickery. This is especially true in smaller spaces or in condos that might have a tiny, open "bonus den." These tips will help you to incorporate and blend the two spaces together.

1/ Paint both spaces the same colour (painting them different colours will only serve to visually separate the spaces).

2/ Choose size-appropriate furnishings for the alcove. Perhaps it's only a reading chair and lamp or a desk or games table. The alcove furnishings shouldn't crowd the space, and they should mimic the furniture style chosen for the living area.

3/ Use mirrors to visually lead you from one space to another. Forge a connection by hanging a large mirror (or a group of mirrors) on the alcove wall to reflect both the decor and the elements of the larger space.

4/ Ensure flooring, such as hardwood or wall-to-wall carpeting, runs from one space to the other. I like to leave smaller spaces free of area rugs to create less visual clutter.

Q4 I moved into a condo with nine-foot ceilings and would like to purchase an artificial tree with lights. How tall should it be and how many lights should it have? Angie, Calgary, via email

S@H If you love the look of a big, grand tree, then choose one that matches your ceiling height. But do note, most trees aren't exactly the height the box specifies. In your case, if a nine-foot tree seems daunting, opt for a 7½-foot tree, which is just over two-thirds the height of your room. It will be big enough so it doesn't look small in the room, but it will also leave breathing room between the treetop and the ceiling and allow space for a tree topper. As for lights and decorations, consider the math. Generally, it's 100 lights per vertical foot of the tree. For ornaments, it's a minimum of 20 per vertical foot. Follow my rule of putting the largest ornaments on the bottom and the smallest on top, which will create good scale and proportion. These ratios apply to trees where the entire circumference of the tree will be decorated. If the tree is in a corner, for instance, you can assume you will decorate only three-quarters of the tree, so adjust the numbers accordingly. And don't forget the bottom of the tree! Artificial trees tend to have ugly metal bases. Make sure to cover that with a tree skirt, faux fur throw, large basket or decorative tree collar.

aryn Gordon balances many professional roles: CEO, leadership and relationship expert, author, public speaker, TV personality. But at the Muskoka, Ont., home she shares with husband Brent Penner and their 16-year-old twins, Baron and Chase, her favourite roles are hot chocolate maker and board game player. "Our place is so magical in the winter," says Karyn, who designed the 2,400-square-foot abode, while Brent, Baron and Chase pitched in by building its custom furniture.

When it came to layering in holiday cheer, Karyn called her designer friend Sarah Walker. "The Muskoka setting had everything to do with the styling direction," Sarah says. "I wanted to bring the outdoors in and honour the beauty of nature that surrounds the property." Her use of beeswax candles, organic textures and evergreens gets the look and promotes unwinding. Cue the softly falling snow and bring on the steaming hot chocolate!

## Natural Bounty

On the kitchen island, designer Sarah Walker used a mix of materials for the serving pieces. "I included marble, ceramic and wood accessories, along with organic shapes and textures that play perfectly with evergreen boughs cut from the property," she says. "I wanted the ritual of lighting the beeswax candles to speak to the awe-inspiring simplicity of the setting." The custom countertop is rough-cut, extra-thick lumber sourced and jointed together by Brent Penner. Wicker baskets add warmth to the black-and-white scheme.

The living area boasts 24-foot-high ceilings yet doubles down on cozy vibes thanks to soft furnishings, a wood stove, and showstopper wood storage and display. "When I was designing the space, I told my husband I wanted the logs to go right to the ceiling," Karyn says. "He thought I was kidding! It's the wow-factor element everyone talks about when they first walk in - it's beautiful and functional." The wood, sourced from old trees from the nine-acre property, serves as display (in the upper cubbies) and as fuel storage (in the lower cubbies), and has an organic presence amid the orderly lines of the shiplap-clad walls. Its natural textures are picked up in the jute rug. Pendant lights offer drama, but their open design keeps them from dominating.



# Green Energy

Wreaths from a local nursery embellish the wood storage and are complemented by garlands the family made from cuttings from the property. Two unadorned trees feel fresh. "They were also foraged from the property," says Sarah. "I told Karyn I wanted a 'Charlie Brown goes to Norway' vibe, and Brent found the perfect pair of trees to fill the space under the stairs. They create a delightful Christmas moment, last well beyond the holidays, and their fragrance is intoxicating!" Comfy sofas flank the coffee table, which Karyn designed. Says Karyn: "It's solid wood bolted together and supported by funky pipe fittings. My husband and our boys, the Penner Brothers, made it."

The dining area is anchored by a solid wood table that Brent and the twins made. It seats 12 and Karyn contrasted it with white metal chairs. She says, "I love the combination of wood and metal on top of the natural jute rug, and the chairs are stackable and easy to clean." Sarah layered in a tactile linen runner as a soft contrast to the hard materials and dotted it with bowls of greenery and more beeswax candles for a festive, modern farmhouse feel.

### Pared Down & Peaceful

In the primary bedroom, Karyn designed a built-in bed using shiplap for continuity and simplicity. "I love simple, modern farmhouse style with a little flair," she says. A single bulb suspended from the ceiling channels the pared-back look, while the pendant light adds some oomph. A stool, like the ones at the kitchen island, acts as a bedside table, and a wicker chair packs a warm punch in the pale colour scheme. Sarah added in soft wool throws and a vase that holds a single green bow for a sprinkle of seasonal cheer.




# Soak in the Beauty

"We spend most winter afternoons outdoors, either snowshoeing, cross-country skiing or ice skating, so it's magical to come back to a fire in the snow."






n 2001, Julie Gagné and Kevin Hill built their dream home in Hemmingford, Que. The home was colourful and busy - tailor-made for life with two young daughters. In 2018, they hired designer Manon Thibault to update the girls' bedrooms, then called on her again in 2020 to open up the kitchen to the living room. "The house is filled with family on weekends, and Julie needed a space big enough for everyone to gather," Manon says. The plan to remove one wall snowballed, and soon Manon was redoing the entire main level to accommodate the family's active social life. But the new aesthetic Julie now wanted was just the opposite of busy: she loves the serene modern farmhouse look. Manon delivered with airy white spaces layered with down-to-earth pieces in sturdy cotton, natural wood and rustic wicker. It's the perfect backdrop for a quiet life à deux when the girls are away at school. But it's most enchanting at Christmas, when it's dressed in ethereal white decorations, set aglow with twinkly lights, and brimming with friends and family all gathered together in the welcoming new heart of the home.

"These are so beautiful," Manon says. "They're all handmade by a local flower farm, Les Belles-Soeurs, here in the Eastern Townships. When you get up close to the tree, you see that every ornament is different. Julie loves flowers, and she adores those little details."



Painting the drawer fronts white makes the piece feel lighter, and this dark-light contrast is echoed in the shelving at the foot of the bed (opposite, top right), where some cubbies are filled with woven storage baskets.

Designer Stephanie Brown's take on holiday decorating? Keep it simple and keep it local.

hen the owners of this Vancouver residence asked designer Stephanie Brown to dress their home for the holidays, her immediate answer was yes! "I'd designed the home, so I was already familiar with their sensibilities, style, and the fact that their blended family has six adult kids who visit often!" says Stephanie. "I wanted to give the rooms a holiday look that would support the style of the home. which is fresh and pure." For this, she relied on Neve Floral, who sourced holly, ferns, cedars and spruce from Vancouver and the Fraser Valley. "Classic greenery exudes winter and says Christmas without being literal about it. And since the holiday mood is everywhere this time of year, even simple additions are enough," says Stephanie. "A mere branch here and a bobble there are all it takes to instantly set the look of your home apart and announce that this is truly the most joyous of the seasons."

**THESE PAGES** Sheepskin-clad chairs and a firepit invite lingering. Indoors, designer Stephanie Brown bears gifts as she passes a vintage mirror adorned with a simple spruce bough. Twin wreaths on the front doors and casual holly branches are all it takes to declare that the holidays are here.





A Very Prairie Christmas Bakebook is bursting with old-fashioned recipes for a sweetly nostalgic holiday. Author Karlynn Johnston presents traditional favourites, family recipes and Ukrainian specialties sure to become your holiday traditions of tomorrow. This collection from her new book is a sweet way to start your festive baking season.

#### **NUTTY CARAMEL POPCORN**

MAKES 16 CUPS

- 12 cups popped popcorn, unpopped kernels
- cups toasted whole almonds
- cups toasted pecans, halved
- cups packed brown sugar
- cup salted butter
- cup dark corn syrup
- tsp baking soda
- tsp vanilla extract

Preheat the oven to 250°F. Line a large rimmed baking sheet (also known as a jelly roll pan) with parchment paper.

Place the popcorn, almonds and pecans in an exceptionally large heatproof bowl.

In a medium saucepan, bring the brown sugar, butter and corn syrup to a rolling boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to mediumhigh and bring the mixture to the soft-crack stage (270°F to 290°F on an instant-read thermometer) without stirring.

Remove from the heat and stir in the baking soda and vanilla.

Pour the caramel mixture over the popcorn and nuts, and stir until completely coated.

Scoop out onto the baking sheet, arranging in an even layer.

Bake for 1 hour, stirring every 15 minutes. Let cool completely, then break apart into your desired size of clusters.

Store in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 5 days or in the freezer for up to 3 months.



#### **CANDY CANE BLONDIES**

MAKES 2 DOZEN RARS

- 21/4 cups flour
- 1½ tsp baking powder
- tsp salt
- cup butter
- cups firmly packed brown sugar
- eggs
- tsp vanilla extract
- tsp mint extract
- cup finely chopped peppermint-flavoured candy canes
- cup chopped white chocolate chips

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter a 13-x-9-inch

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.

In a stand mixer with the paddle attachment or in a large bowl using a handheld mixer, beat

the butter and brown sugar on medium speed until creamy and light in colour. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Mix in the vanilla and mint extract until combined. With the mixer on low speed, gradually add the flour mixture, mixing until fully incorporated. Using a wooden spoon, stir in the candy canes and chocolate chips until evenly distributed.

Pour the batter into the prepared pan and, with buttered hands, pat into an even layer.

Bake until golden brown on top and a tester inserted in the centre comes out nearly clean, 25 to 30 minutes. (You want to slightly underbake these or they will dry out; they are easily overbaked.) Let cool completely in the pan, then slice into 24 bars.

Store in an airtight container in layers, with parchment or waxed paper between each layer, in the fridge for up to 5 days or in the freezer for up to 3 months.

#### **ENGLISH TOFFEE**

#### MAKES 40-45 PIECES

2<sup>3</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cups granulated sugar

- 2 cups salted butter
- cup water
- 2 tbsp light corn syrup
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 cups milk chocolate chips
- cups toasted chopped or slivered almonds

Line a 20-x-14-inch rimmed baking sheet, or 2 smaller rimmed baking sheets, with parchment paper.

In a large, heavy-bottomed saucepan, combine the sugar, butter, water and corn syrup. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, to the hard-crack stage (295°F to 300°F on an instant-read thermometer).

Remove from the heat and quickly stir in the vanilla.

Spread the mixture on the prepared baking sheet(s) in an even layer of about 4-inch thickness. While the toffee is still hot, sprinkle the chocolate chips overtop in an even layer. Once the chips have melted (they turn shiny when ready), use a spatula to spread out the chocolate evenly.

Sprinkle with the almonds and press lightly into an even layer on the chocolate to ensure they stick. Refrigerate until set, about 20 to 25 minutes.

Using your hands, break the toffee into pieces.

Store in an airtight container in layers, with parchment or waxed paper between each layer, at room temperature for up to 5 days or in the freezer for up to 3 months.



#### MAKES 15 PIECES

- ½ cup whipping cream or heavy cream
- oz semisweet baking chocolate, coarsely chopped
- tsp extract of choice (such as mint, vanilla or orange)

Unsweetened cocoa powder, finely chopped nuts, finely shredded sweetened coconut, or sprinkles, for coating

In a small saucepan over medium heat, heat the cream, stirring, until hot but not boiling.

Remove from the heat and stir in the chocolate. Let stand until the chocolate softens, then stir until well combined. Stir in the extract. Let cool, then refrigerate until cold, about 2 hours.

Line a large baking sheet with parchment or waxed paper.

Form a tablespoonful of the chocolate mixture into a ball and place on prepared baking sheet. Try to handle it as little and as lightly as possible or it will start to melt! Repeat with the remaining chocolate mixture. Refrigerate the chocolate balls for 30 minutes.

Pour the desired coating onto a plate. Quickly reshape any balls as needed, then roll the balls in the coating and return to the baking sheet. Refrigerate for another 30 minutes.

Store in an airtight container in layers, with parchment or waxed paper between each layer, in the fridge for up to 1 week or in the freezer for up to 3 months.
