

This HyperText Markup Language (HTML) book is for complete beginners, so it is written in a simple way so that the beginners do not get confused. For each theme and concept, we have provided an example with proper details of correct code output and legitimate HTML.

By the end of this HTML book, we're sure you'll be good at HTML and start creating your own web page structures. For this, you need to learn a few other technologies like Cascading Style Sheet (CSS) and JavaScript to create attractive and beautiful websites.

INTRODUCTION

HTML is a standard markup language for documents intended to be displayed in a web browser.¹ Technologies such as CSS and scripting languages such as JavaScript can help.

Web browsers receive various documents from a web server or local storage and convert them into multimedia web pages. HTML semantically defines the structure of a web page that originally contained guidelines for the appearance of a document.

HTML elements are the building blocks of HTML pages. HTML constructs can be used to insert images and other objects, such as interactive forms, into a rendered page. HTML provides a method for creating structured documents by marking the structural semantics of text, such as headings, paragraphs, lists, links, citations, and other items. HTML elements are separated by tags written using angular brackets. Tags like and <input/> directly insert content into the page. Other tags, such as , provide information about the text of the document and can contain other tags as sub-elements. Browsers do not display HTML tags but use them to interpret page content.

Hypertext is text displayed on a system or other electronic device with links to other text that the user can access immediately, usually by clicking a mouse or pressing a key. In addition to text, hypertext can contain tables, lists, forms, images, and other presentation elements. It is an easy-to-use and flexible format for sharing information over the Internet.

Markup is the use of sets of markup tags to characterize textual elements in a document and give instructions to web browsers about how the document should look. HTML was originally developed by designers Tim Berners-Lee in 1990. He is known as the father of the web. But in 1996, the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) became the authority for managing HTML specifications. HTML became an international standard (ISO) in 2000. Now, HTML5 is the new version of HTML. It provides a faster and more robust approach to web development.

HTML can embed programs written in different scripting languages, such as JavaScript, which affect the behavior and content of a web page; embedded elements define the appearance and layout of the content. The W3C, the former maintainer of HTML and the current maintainer of CSS standards, has supported the use of CSS over explicit presentational HTML since 1997. A form of HTML, known as the HTML5 version, is used to display video and audio using the <canvas> element in connection with JavaScript.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF HTML

In 1993, the first version was written by Tim Berners-Lee. Since then, there have been many various versions of HTML.² The most widely used version was the 2000s was HTML 4, which became an official standard in December 1999.

Another version, XHTML, was a rewrite version of HTML as XML. It is a standard markup language that is used to create other markup languages. Hundreds of XML languages are included like GML, MathML, MusicML, and RSS. Because each of these languages was written in a common language (XML), their content can be easily shared between applications. It makes XML potentially very powerful, and it's no surprise that the W3C created an XML version of HTML again called XHTML. It became an official standard in 2000 and was updated in 2002. It is very similar to HTML but with some stricter rules. Sometimes strict rules are necessary for all XML languages because without them interoperability between applications would not be possible.

Most pages on the Web were built using either 4.01 or XHTML 1.0. However, in recent years, the W3C has been working on a new version of HTML, i.e. HTML5. It is still a draft specification not yet an official standard. However, it is widely supported by browsers and other web-enabled devices.

The following lists the many types of content that can add to web pages using other versions of HTML. In the early days, HTML was so simple, but over time new versions were released that added more and more features. However, if web designers wanted to add content or functionality that HTML did not support, they would have to do so using nonstandard proprietary technologies such as Adobe. These technologies require users to install browser plug-ins and in some cases would mean that some users are not able to access the content. HTML5 added support for many new features that will allow you to do more with HTML without relying on nonstandard proprietary technologies.

The first description of HTML was "HTML Tags", first mentioned on the Internet by Tim Berners-Lee in late 1991.³ It describes the 18 elements that make up the initial, relatively simple HTML design. Apart from the hyperlink tag, these were heavily influenced by SGMLguid, an internal documentation format based on the Standard Generalized Markup Language (SGML) at CERN. Eleven of these elements still exist in HTML 4.

HTML is a markup language that browsers use to compose text, images, and other material into visual or audio web pages. The default properties for each HTML tag item are defined in the browser, and these properties can be changed or enhanced by further use of the website designer's CSS.

Many text elements are found in the 1988 technical report ISO TR 9537 Techniques for use of SGML, which in turn covers features of early text formatting languages, such as the language used by the RUNOFF command, which was developed in the early 1960s for Compatible

Time-Sharing System (CTSS) operating system and these formatting commands were derived from commands used by compositors to manually format documents.

However, SGML is the concept of generalized markup that is based on elements (nested annotated scopes with attributes) rather than just print effects, with structure and markup also separated; HTML gradually moved in this direction with CSS.

WHY HTML IS CALLED A MARKUP LANGUAGE?

HTML is called a markup language. It defines the structure and layout of the content that users can see on a web page.4 HTML is the most popular markup language in the world; more than 94% of websites use HTML as their markup language. It uses tags and various attributes to format the text you see when you visit a web page and describes how to display content.

The latest version of HTML5 is now widely adopted by developers and is used on around 90% of websites. Don't get confused by these two terms, HTML and HTML5. They are the same, but HTML introduced newer features to the most popular markup language.

Let's have a look at what a markup language is and why it is considered a markup language. We will then explore other markup languages available to software engineers today.

WHAT IS A MARKUP LANGUAGE?

A markup language is a basically coding system that is included in text documents to structure, format, and display various elements on a page. It is interpreted by various devices, such as your Internet browser, and controls how the document is displayed or printed. The markup languages contain two main data types such as the text that will be displayed, and then the markup describing how to display it. It means structuring in a specific way. So the markup language explains to your browser how the document should be laid out. CSS is a style sheet language that is paired with markup languages such as HTML to improve the appearance of markup. Users do not see markup languages when viewing a web page or document. It is interpreted by a device that only displays the actual text you want the audience to see.

Markup languages are essential for accessibility. These languages allow screen readers and other browsing aids to see what the user is looking at. HTML is a markup language because it defines the structure, as well as format and layout of the content we want to display on a web page. It lets any browser know how you want your website content to appear. More than 90% of websites use HTML5, making it the most popular markup language in the world.

HTML actually stands for Hypertext Markup Language. Hypertext refers to the fact that it is machine-readable, while markup language indicates that it is used for structuring and organization. It is a set of rules that grow the appearance of pages on the Internet and how they connect to the rest of the Web.

When we create HTML pages, the markup is never displayed to the user. Open the webpage and you will see the relevant text, images, and videos. However, HTML is pulling the strings behind all of this. It lets any browser know how you want things organized. HTML allows you to group paragraphs, headings, images, videos, and more. It allows to create complex forms and displays information exactly the way you want.

An often overlooked feature of HTML as a markup language is how it links pages together. It is important for search engines and users to know which pages are relevant to each other and how you want to link them. Without HTML, users wouldn't be able to navigate your site or visit the links you recommend. Remember that a markup document has two types of content.

HTML is not the markup language; however, it is the most well-known, as 94% of websites use it as a markup language. Its ease of use made it the markup language of the web, but there are various markup languages out there, all with a variety of different uses.

HTML is generally much more forgiving than other markup languages such as XML. It is case insensitive and will compile even if you omit the closing tag. HTML is easy to use the starting point for people learning web development for decades. It pairs well with CSS and frameworks like Bootstrap. As we mentioned earlier, markup languages define the way electronic documents are interpreted. They specify how something is displayed or what they mean. It is not the only markup language, other markup languages include:

DIFFERENT VERSIONS OF HTML

HTML has never been the way it is right now.⁵ HTML, like many other languages, has evolved over time and is much better and more versatile today than it was a long time ago. Different versions of HTML have different properties. But today we use HTML5, which is the latest version of HTML.

- HTML 1.0 (released in 1991)
- HTML 2.0 (released in 1995)
- HTML 3.2 (released in 1997)
- HTML 4.01 (released in 1999)
- XHTML (released in 2000)
- HTML5 (released in 2014)

HTML 1.0

It was the basic version of HTML with less support for a wide range of HTML elements. It does not have rich features such as styling and other

things that related to how content will be rendered in a browser. This initial version doesn't provide support for tables, font support, etc.

HTML 2

It was developed in 1995 to improve HTML version 1.0. It was developed to maintain common rules and regulations across different browsers. It improves a lot in terms of marker marks. In version 2.0, the concept of form came into effect. Forms were developed but still had basic markup like text boxes, buttons, etc.

Also, the table came as an HTML tag. Now, in version 2.0, browsers also came up with the concept of creating custom markup layers that were specific to the browser itself. The main intention of the W3C is to maintain standards across different web browsers so that those browsers understand and render HTML tags in a similar way.

HTML 3.2

HTML 3.2 was published by W3C Recommendation. It was the very first version developed exclusively by the W3C. With HTML 3.2, HTML tags were further improved. It had many new features like tables, superscript, subscript, etc. The two most important features introduced in it were tables and text flow around images.

Now has better support for new form elements. Another important feature it implemented was CSS support. It is CSS that provides functions that will make HTML tags look better when rendered in browsers. CSS helps style HTML elements.

After browsers were upgraded to it, the browser also supported frame tags, although the HTML specification still does not support iframe tags. Tables were widely used and are still used by programmers, but it is no longer recommended. In HTML5, div tags and other semantic elements are more often used instead of the table element.

HTMI 4.01

It is the expanded support for CSSs. In version 3.2, CSS was embedded into the HTML page itself. So if a website has different web pages to apply the style of each page, we need to put CSS on each web page. So there was a repetition of the same CSS block.

To overcome this, the concept of an external style sheet appeared in version 4.01. Under this concept, an external CSS file could be developed

and this external style file could be included in the HTML itself. HTML 4.01 provided support for additional new HTML tags.

HTML 4.01 was a revised version of HTML 4.0; it also included features for people with disabilities to improve their interactivity with the global world through the Internet.

XHTML

XHTML called as Extensible HTML.⁶ It can consider as a part of the XML markup language because it has features of both XML and HTML. It is the extended form of XML and HTML. It can also be considered as a better version of HTML.

XHTML version:

- XHTML is a different language that began as a reformulation of HTML 4.01 using XML 1.0. Now, it is no longer being developed as a stand-alone standard.
- XHTML version 1.0 was published as a W3C Recommendation on January 26, 2000, and later revised and republished on August 1, 2002.
- XHTML 1.1 was published on May 31,2001, as W3C Recommendation. It is based on the XHTML 1.0 Strict, but with minor changes, it can be adapted.
- XHTML 2.0 was abandoned in 2009 in favor of work on HTML5 and XHTML5. XHTML 2.0 was now incompatible with XHTML 1.x.

HTML5

HTML5 is the best version of HTML to date. HTML5 has improved user interactivity so much and also reduced the load on the device.

HTML5 fully supports all kinds of media applications out there. It supports both audio and video media content. It also provides full support for running JavaScript in the background.

MARKUP IN HTML

HTML markup consists of various key components, including those called tags (their attributes), character-based data types, character references, and entity references. HTML tags are most often found in pairs

such as <h1> and </h1>, although some represent empty elements and are therefore unpaired, such as . The first tag is a pair is the start tag, and the second is the end tag (also called opening tags and ending tags).

Another important part is the HTML document type declaration that triggers standard mode rendering.

The following is an example of the program given below.

The text between <html> - </html> describes the web page, the text between <body> and </body> is the visible content of the page. The <title>This is a title</title> tag defines the browser page title displayed on browser tabs and window titles, and the <div> tag defines page divisions used for easy styling. A <meta> element can be used between <head> and </head> to define a web page's metadata.

The <!DOCTYPE html> document type declaration is for HTML5. If the declaration is not included, various browsers fall back into "quirks mode" for rendering.

HTML DOCUMENT TYPE

All HTML documents must begin with a <!DOCTYPE> declaration. A declaration is not an HTML tag. It is "information" to the browser about what type of document to expect.

In HTML5, the <!DOCTYPE> declaration is simple. The <!DOCTYPE> declaration is NOT case-sensitive.

BASIC HTML CONCEPTS

There are some basic HTML concepts such as elements, tags, and attributes.⁷ Elements are a main structural unit of a web page. The tags are used to define HTML elements, and attributes provide additional information about these elements.

HTML Tags

Basically, tags are used to structure website content (text, hyperlinks, images, media, etc.).⁸ These are not displayed in browsers; they only "instruct" browsers how to display the content of the web page.

There are over hundreds of tags and you can find them in any other HTML lesson. These tags are written in curly brackets (e.g. <html>). Most HTML tags come in pairs, such as tags. The first tag in the pair is called the start (opening) tag and the second tag is the end (closing) tag. The information is written between the opening and closing tags. However, there are unpaired or empty tags that only have a start tag. (e.g.).

A document is created using different types of tags. HTML tags can be defined and divided on a different basis. Let's take a look at the following sections of this chapter. We have divided these tags based on the following classifications:

- Paired and Unpaired Tags
- Self-Closing Tags
- Utility-Based Tags

Let's explain the following are the paired and unpaired tags in HTML in detail with the help of examples.

Paired Tag

An open tag is known as a paired tag if the tag consists of a start tag and an end tag as a companion tag. An HTML Paired tag begins with an opening tag: the name of the tag enclosed in curly brackets; for example, the paragraph opening tag is written as "". Content follows a start tag that ends

with an end tag: tag name starting with a slash; for example, a paragraph end tag is written as "". The first label can be labeled "Opening tag" and the second label can be called the "Closing tag".

Unpaired Tags

An HTML tag is called an odd tag if the tag has only an opening tag and no closing tag or accompanying tag. The Unpaired tag does not require a closing tag; with this type, an opening label is sufficient. Unpaired tags are also sometimes named single tags or singular tags because they do not require any accompanying tag.

It is to close the unpaired/singular tags. But unfortunately, we do not have the closing tag. So, an unpaired tag is closed putting behind a slash(/) before the greater than > sign. For example:

 value of slash(/) in the tags is to close them. Here are some unpaired tags:

Heading Tags (H1 Tag to H6 Tag)

These are used to give headings of different sizes in a document. There are six different heading tags, which give various heading sizes and are defined by <h1> - <h6> tags. <h1> gives the biggest heading and <h6> gives the smallest one. So <h1> can be used for important headings for bold headings, and <h6> can be used for a least important ones.

HTML p Tag - Paragraph Tag

The tag defines a paragraph in a document. An HTML paragraph or HTML tag provides the text inside the paragraph as completion. It is noteworthy that the browser itself adds line breaks before and after the paragraph.

We'll show you how it works with a simple example.

HTML Tag – Anchor Tag

An HTML hyperlink is defined using the <a> tag (Anchor tag). It is used to create a link to any file, web page, image, etc.

This tag is called an anchor tag, and anything between the opening <a> tag and closing tag is a part of the link, and the user can click on that part to go to the linked document.

HTML img Tag- Image Tag

The image is used to add images to HTML documents. The img tag is used to add an image to a document. The 'src' is used to specify the source of the image. The height and width of the image can control the – height="px" and width="px".

The alt is used as an alternative if the image is not displayed. Whatever is written as the value of this attribute is displayed. It provides information about the image.

Self-Closing Tags

Self-closing tags are HTML tags that do not have a partner tag, where the first tag is the only tag needed that is valid for formatting. The main and important information is contained INSIDE the element as its attribute. An "img" tag is a simple example of a self-closing tag. Let's see it in action below.

Utility-Based Tags

HTML tags can be broadly differentiated based on their usefulness, i.e. based on the purpose they serve. We can basically divide them into three categories as below:

- Formatting tags
- Structure marks
- Control labels

HTML tags that help us in formatting texts like text size, font styles, making text bold, etc. This is done using , , <u>, etc. tags. Tables Tags, divisions, and span are also those tags that help to format a web page or document and set the page layout. Below is a small program that uses a break to format a page along with some other formatting tags.

Structure Tags

HTML tags that help structure an HTML document are called Structure Tags. Description, title, HTML, heading, body, etc. form a group of page structure tags. Structure tags only help in building or creating a basic HTML page from the root; that is, they do not affect or participate in text formatting. The basic HTML program is therefore a basic group of structural tags.

Control Tags

Another category of tags that can be created is 'Control Tags'. Script tags, radio buttons or checkboxes, Form tags, etc. are control tags. These are

tags that are used when managing content or managing scripts or libraries that are external. All form tags, drop-downs, input text fields, etc. are used when interacting with a visitor or user.

The HTML tags are based on the type of tags and their usefulness. HTML tags can also be easily divided based on basic categories such as basic HTML root tags, formatting tags, audio and video tags, form and input tags, frames, links, lists, tables, styles, meta tags, etc.

STRUCTURE OF AN HTML DOCUMENT

The <!DOCTYPE html> declaration specifies the version of HTML used in the document.¹¹ Every HTML document must start with this declaration so that browsers can render the page in accordance with HTML standards.

There are several <!DOCTYPE> types defined for each version of HTML. <!DOCTYPE> – The doctype declaration indicates the type of document and version of HTML used on the web page. Each version has a different doctype declaration. This example uses the HTML5 Doctype.

All content on a web page is written between html and html element is used to tell browsers that this is an HTML document. httml - It is the root tag of the document that describes the

entire web page. It is also paired tag, i.e. it also has a closing </html> tag. Everything will be written inside these tags.

The <head> element contains metadata (that is data about the HTML document), character set, document name, styles, etc. This data is not displayed to viewers. This tag contains information about the document, such as its title, author information, web page description, and so on. It has various tags to perform these functions. It is also a couple tag.

HTML EDITORS AND TOOLS

If you've heard of web development, the term HTML should sound familiar.¹² HTML is one of the most important and common elements that define the structure of the web.

The most common functions in a good HTML editor are:

- It can be used to distinguish HTML tags in different colors based on the categories, making it easier to read and recognize the structure of the code.
- The automatic suggestion of HTML elements and attributes based on previously added values, time-saving when typing a longer piece of code.
- It can easily scan for syntax errors whenever you type in code incorrectly to fix the mistake immediately and make them highlight.
- It helps to find out particular code and replace them all at once, saving time from editing each string of code.
- It connects web server with an FTP client right from the dashboard.
- It can hide a section of code and focuses on certain parts of the HTML document.

WHAT IS AN HTML EDITOR?

An editor is software for creating and editing HTML code.¹³ It can be standalone software designed for writing and editing code or part of an Integrated Development Environment (IDE). The HTML editor provides more advanced features and is specially designed for developers to create websites more efficiently. It ensures that every line of code is clean and working properly.

There are several professional editors that web developers use for coding. However, not every editor can satisfy all your needs. A good HTML editor must therefore have the following features:

- syntax highlighting display of text, especially source code, in different colors and fonts,
- tab display support keep multiple web pages open in tabs at the same time,

- checking for errors in the HTML document, and
- code wrapping hiding large code fragments leaving only a line.

Some HTML editors can also translate HTML into a programming language such as CSS, XML, or JavaScript. This means that different types of HTML editors can offer different sets of functions and features.

HTML ELEMENT SYNTAX

An HTML element is a separate part of an HTML document. It represents semantics or meaning. For example, the title element defines the title of the document.

Most HTML elements start with a start tag (or opening tag) and an end tag (or closing tag), with content in between. The elements can also contain attributes that define their other properties.

HTML uses tags for its syntax. The tag consists of special characters: <, >, and /. They are interpreted by software to create an HTML element.

There are some tag and attribute names that are not case-sensitive (but most attribute values are case-sensitive). It means the tag is the same as tag <P>. In XHTML, they are case-sensitive and the tag <P> is different from the tag .

HTML COMMENTS

The comments are usually added with the purpose of making the source code easier to understand. It may help other developers to understand what you were trying to do with the HTML. Comments are not displayed in the browser.

An HTML comment starts with <!-- and ends with --> as shown in the example below.

The comment tag is useful when debugging code.

- This is a simple piece of code that web browsers delete (ignore), i.e. the browser does not display it.
- It helps the coder and the reader to understand the part of code used especially in complex source code.

TYPES OF HTML COMMENTS

There are three types of comments in HTML given below:

- Single line comment: A single line comment is given inside a tag (<!- comment ->).
- Multi-line comment: Multi-line comment can be given by the syntax (<!-->), basically it is the same as used in single line comment, the difference is half of the comment part ("->") is appended where to intended the comment line ends.
- Using the <comment> tag: There used to be an HTML <comment> tag, but it is currently not supported by any modern browser.

Importance:

- It improves code readability, especially when multiple developers access a single HTML document.
- It ensures fast and efficient understanding of complex codes.
- It makes debugging the source code easier and makes it easier to maintain.

TYPES OF HTML ELEMENTS

Elements can be placed in two different groups such as block-level elements and row-level elements. The former forms the structure of the document, while the latter dresses the contents of the block.

The block element also takes up 100% of the available width and is rendered with line breaks before and after. Whereas an inline element only takes up as much space as it needs.

The most commonly used block level elements are <div>, , <h1> to <h6>, <form>, , , , etc. While the commonly used row-level elements are , <a>, , , , , <i>, <code>, <input>, <button>, etc.

HTML ATTRIBUTES

It defines other characteristics or properties of the element, such as the width and height of the image.¹⁴ Attributes are always specified in the opening tag and consist of name/value pairs like name="value". Attribute values always are enclosed in quotation marks.

Some attributes are also required for certain elements. For example, the tag must contain the src and alt attributes. Let's look at some examples of using attributes.

GENERAL ATTRIBUTES

There are some attributes, such as id, style, title, class, etc., that you can use on the majority of HTML elements.¹⁵ The following sections describe their usage.

The id Attribute

It is used to give a unique name or identifier to an element within a document. It makes it easier to select the element using CSS or JavaScript.

The class Attribute

Same as id attribute, the class attribute is also used to identify elements. But unlike id, the class attribute doesn't have to be unique in the HTML document. It means you can apply the same class to multiple elements in a document, as shown in the following example.

MORE ABOUT STYLE ATTRIBUTES

It was designed as a simple way to present information. Its CSSs were introduced in December 1996 by the W3C to provide a good way to style elements.

CSS makes it very easy to specify things like font size and type, text and background colors, text and image alignment, the amount of space between elements, element borders and outlines, and many other styling properties.

Adding Styles to HTML Elements

It is the styling information that can either be attached as a separate document or embedded in the document itself. These are the three methods of implementing styling in an HTML document:

- Inline styles It is used in the style attribute in the HTML start tag.
- Embedded style It is used in the <style> element in the head section of the document.
- External style sheet It is used in the element, pointing to external CSS files.

Inline Styles

Inline styles are used to apply unique style rules to an element by inserting CSS rules directly into the start tag. It can attach to an element using the style attribute.

The style attribute contains a number of CSS property-value pairs. Each property:value pair is separated by a semicolon (;), just as you would write in an inline or external stylelist. But everything must be on one line, i.e. without a line break after a semicolon.

Using inline styles is generally considered bad practice. Because the style rules are embedded directly in the HTML tag, it causes the presentation to blend in with the content of the document, making it very difficult to update or maintain the site.

Adding Styles to HTML Elements

Style information can be attached as a document or embedded in the document itself. There are three ways to implement style information in an HTML document:

- Inline styles It is used to the style attribute in the HTML start tag.
- Embedded style It is used to the <style> element in the head section of the document.
- External style sheet It is used to the <link> element, pointing to external CSS files.

Inline Styles

Inline styles are used to apply unique style rules to an element by inserting CSS rules directly into the start tag. It can attach to an element using the style attribute. The style attribute contains a number of CSS propertyvalue pairs. Each property:value pair is separated by a semicolon (;), just as you would write in an inline or external stylelist. Embedded Style Sheets

Embedded are also called as internal style sheets that only affect the document they are embedded into. Embedded style sheets are defined in the <head> tag of the document using the <style> tag. You can define various number of <style> elements in the <head> section.

External Styles

An external stylesheet is used when the style is applied to many pages. An external style sheet contains all of the style rules in a separate document that you can link to from any HTML document on your website. External stylesheets are the most flexible because with an external stylesheet you can change the look of your entire site by updating just one file. You can connect external stylesheets in two ways such as linking and importing.

Index html

Importing External Style Sheets

The @import rule is another way to load an external stylesheet. The @import directive instructs the browser to load an external stylesheet and apply its styles.

You can use it in two ways. The easiest way is to use it in the <style> element in the <head> section. Note that additional CSS rules can still be included in the <style> element.

HTML Image

Images improve the visual appearance of websites by making them more interesting and colorful.¹⁶ The is used to insert images into HTML documents. It is an empty element and contains only attributes. The tag syntax can be specified using as below.

Each image must carry at least two attributes: the src attribute and the alt attribute. The src attribute tells where to find the image. Its value is the URL of the image file. The alt attribute provides alternative text for an image if it is not available or cannot be displayed for some reason. Its value should be a meaningful replacement for the image.

More about Image Attributes

These attributes are used to specify the width and height of an image. The values of the attributes are considered in pixels by default.

You can also use the style attribute to define width and height of the images. It prevents stylesheets from changing the image size by mistake since inline style has the highest priority.

HTML TABLE

An HTML table allows you to organize data into rows and columns.¹⁷ They are used to display tabular data such as product listings, details, financial reports, and so on.

You can create a table by using the element. Inside element, you can use elements to create rows, and you can use elements to create columns inside a row. You can define a cell as a header for table cells using the element.

The following example shows the most basic table structure:

By default, tables have no borders. You can use the border property to add borders to these tables. Also, table cells are sized to fit the content by default. To add space around the content in table cells, you can use the CSS padding property.

SPANNING MULTIPLE ROWS AND COLUMNS

HTML PROPERTIES

Before diving deeper into this complete HTML book, some basics need to be clarified. As a beginner, you must be aware of the features and functions of HTML. Only then you will be able to take an interest in HTML coding. Let's discuss the important features of HTML:

- Develops the structure of the website. All the blocks and elements on the web exist because of HTML.
- Simple, human-readable tags represent elements on a web page. So they are easy to remember.
- It is universally supported by all browsers. It is a markup language for web development.
- HTML5 can provide support in improving the experience in the gaming arena.
- It is easy to learn and implement.
- It is cross-platform independent, i.e. it works on all operating systems.

WHAT TO DO WITH HTML

You can do a lot of things with HTML. It is used to publish documents online with images, lists, tables, text, etc. You can access resources such as images, videos, or other HTML documents through hyperlinks. You can create forms to collect user input such as name, email address, comments, etc. You can include sound clips, applications, and other HTML documents directly in an HTML document. You can create another offline version of your website that works without the Internet. You can store the data in the user's web browser and access it later. You can find out the current location of your website visitor.

HOW DOES HTML WORK?

Each individual HTML file contains lots of nested elements along with tags. ¹⁸ Almost anyone can write an.html file using a basic text editor and then upload it to the Internet and start creating their own web pages.

Furthermore, web data servers need to know what to do with the uploaded files and how to send them to the client's computer to understand them. HTML code is used to handle this. It's the glue that holds everything together.

Your HTML page will contain many elements that are fortunately easy to understand because they have names that describe what they are (i.e. header tags, paragraph tags, and image tags).

All websites are made up of these tags. Then your site's plain text content – what you want the user to see – is neatly wrapped in a bundle of tags that tell the page what kind of content it is. This helps the web browser understand how to display each type of content in the HTML file.

The paragraph tag puts your content into neat little paragraphs, and the header tag puts words like a proper heading on the page. You must start the tag, include the plain text content in the middle, and then close the tag so the computer knows you're done with the tag.

HTML CONTENT MODELS

In HTML5, the content of a webpage can be divided into semantic groups that describe its content. These are called content models. Each of these models describes the type of elements it contains. A content model can contain text and child elements. An element can belong to one or more content categories.

ADVANTAGES

HTML is very easy to learn and understand. HTML is the first and most important language to go through for someone learning web development. It has simple markup, and there is no case-sensitivity fuss in HTML.

It simply has some marks that serve a specific purpose and that's it. One can easily understand someone else's code and can make changes to it if necessary because there is not much to understand. Moreover, it does not cause any error or create any problem like other programming languages if the developer forgets to close the tags or makes some mistakes in the code.

One of the biggest advantages of HTML is that it is free and there is no need to buy specific software.

HTML is supported by almost every browser. HTML provides an easy way for web developers to optimize a website in HTML according to browsers.

HTML is one of the most search engine friendly compared to all the programming languages available in the market. It is much easier to create SEO-friendly websites using HTML than other programming languages. HTML web pages are easier to read and accessible to web crawlers and therefore reduce page parsing time and page load time, improving page performance.

HTML is very easy to edit because no special interface or platform is needed to edit it. It is written in simple Notepad and therefore can be easily edited in any text editor like Notepad, Notepad++, etc.

In the previous chapter, we covered the fundamental of the HTML. Now here you will get all the basic information of HTML separately, such as all the tags and elements, along with in separate sections so that you will get to know why all these are used in HTML.

HTML TAGS

An HTML document can be described by a set of HTML tags. We'll introduce some common HTML tags that can be used to create a basic page with images, lists, tables, and links.

STRUCTURE AND TAGS OF HTML DOCUMENTS

The first thing in HTML document is the <!DOCTYPE html> tag, which specifies the correct version of HTML used throughout the document. The following shows how to use the <!DOCTYPE> tag.

ANATOMY OF AN HTML ELEMENT

Let's explore this paragraph element a little further. The main parts of the element are as follows:

- Opening tag: It consists of the name of the element (in this case p), wrapped in opening and closing curly braces. This is where the element begins or takes effect in this case, the paragraph begins.
- Closing tag: It is the same as the opening tag, which includes a slash before the element name. This is where the element ends in this case, where the paragraph ends. Not adding a closing tag is one of the standard beginner mistakes and can lead to weird results.
- **Content:** It is the content of the element, which is just text.
- **Element:** The opening tag, closing tag, and content together form an element.

Here we have the following:

- <!DOCTYPE html> document type. It is a mandatory preamble. Back in the mists of time when HTML was still young (around 1991/92), doctypes were supposed to act as references to a set of rules that an HTML page follows to consider good HTML, which means automatic error checking and other things. However, nowadays they do not do more and basically just need to make your document behave properly. That's all I need to know for now.
- <html> </html> <html> element. This element wraps all content on the entire page and is sometimes called the root element. It also contains the lang attribute, which sets the primary language of the document.
- <head> </head> <head> element. This element acts as a container for any content you want to include in your HTML page that isn't the content you're displaying to your page viewers. This includes things like keywords and page descriptions to appear in search results, Cascading Style Sheet (CSS) to style content, character set declarations, and more.

- <meta charset="utf-8"> It sets the character set document should use to UTF-8, which includes characters from the vast majority of written languages. Basically, it can now handle any textual content you place on it. There's no reason not to set it up, and it might help you avoid some problems later on.
- <meta name="viewport" content="width= 'device-width'> The viewport element ensures that the page is rendered to the width of the viewport, preventing browsers from rendering pages wider than the viewport and then scaling them down.
- <title> </title> <title> element. It sets the title of the page, which
 is the name that will appear in the browser tab in which the page is
 loaded. It is used to describe the page when bookmark/favorite it.
- <body> </body> <body> element. It contains all the content you
 want to display to web users when they visit your page, whether it's
 text, images, videos, games, playable audio tracks, or anything else.

- Attribute name followed by an equal sign.
- Attribute value wrapped in opening and closing quotes.

A typical element includes an opening tag with some attributes, a closed body of text, and a closing tag.

IMAGE AND MULTIMEDIA

HTML supports a variety of multimedia resources such as images, audio, and videos.³

- <area> The HTML <area> element defines an area inside an image map that has predefined clickable areas. An image map allows geometric regions in an image to be hyperlinked.
- <audio> The HTML <audio> element is used to add audio content to documents. It can contain one or more audio sources, represented by the src attribute or the source element: the browser selects the most appropriate one. It can also be a target for streaming media using MediaStream.
- The HTML element inserts an image into a document.
- <map> The HTML <map> element is always used with <area> elements to define an image map (clickable area of a link).
- <track> The HTML <track> element helps as a child of media elements, audio, and videos. Allows you to specify timed text tracks (or time-based data), for example for automatic subtitle processing. These tracks are formatted in (.vtt files) WebVTT format that is Web Video Text Tracks.
- <video> The HTML <video> element used to embed a media player in the document that supports video playback. You can use <video> for audio content, but an audio element may provide a more appropriate user experience.

ELEMENT DESCRIPTION

In addition to normal multimedia content, HTML can contain a variety of other content, although it is not always easy to work with it.⁴

- <embed> The HTML <embed> element used to embed external
 content at a specified location in the document. The content is provided by an external application or other source of content, such as
 a browser plug-in.
- <iframe> The HTML <iframe> element defines a nested browsing context that inserts another HTML page into the current page.
- <object> The HTML <object> element represents an external resource that can be treated as an image, browsing nested context, or a resource to be handled by a plugin.
- <picture> The HTML <picture> element contains zero or more source elements and one img element that offers alternative versions of the image for different display/device scenarios.
- <portal> The HTML <portal> element allows you to insert another HTML page into the current page to allow smoother navigation to new pages.
- <source> The HTML <source> element specifies various media sources for an image, audio element, or video element. It is an empty element, meaning it has no content and no closing tag. It is used to offer the same media content in multiple file formats to ensure compatibility with a wide range of browsers due to their different support for image file formats and media file formats.

SVG AND MathML

You can embed SVG and MathML content into the HTML documents using the <svg> and <math> elements.

<svg> The HTML <svg> element is a container that defines a coordinate system and viewport. It is used as the outer-most element of documents, but can also be used to insert an SVG fragment into an SVG or HTML document.

<math> The top-level HTML element in MathML is <math>. Every valid instance of MathML must be wrapped in <math> tags. Additionally,

you cannot nest a second <math> element inside another element, but you can have any number of other child elements within it.

SCRIPTING

In order to create dynamic web applications, HTML supports the use of scripting languages, primarily JavaScript. Some elements support this ability.

<canvas> Use the HTML <canvas> element with the canvas scripting API or the WebGL API to draw graphics and animations.

<noscript> The HTML <noscript> element defines the part of HTML to be inserted if the script type is not supported on the page or if scripting is currently disabled in the browser.

<script> The HTML <script> element is used to insert executable code or data; this is typically used to embed or reference JavaScript code. The <script> element can be used with other languages such as the WebGL shader GLSL programming language and JSON.

TEXT ALTERATION

These elements allow you to provide indications that certain parts of the text have been changed.

 The HTML element defines a range of text that has been removed from a document. This can be used, for example, when plotting "tracking changes" or information about source code differences. The HTML <ins> element can use for the different purposes to indicate text that has been added to the document.

<ins> This element represents a range of text added to a document. You can use the del element to same represent a range of text that has been removed from a document.

TABLE CONTENTS

The elements are used to create and process tabular data.

- <caption> The HTML <caption> element specifies the caption (or heading) of the table.
- <col> The HTML <col> element defines a column in a table and is used to define common semantics for all common cells. It is usually found in the colgroup element.

- <colgroup> The HTML <colgroup> element represents a group of columns in a table.
- The HTML element represents tabular data that information presented in a two-dimensional table composed of rows and columns of cells containing data.
- The HTML element encapsulates a set of table rows (tr elements), which means it forms the body of the (table).
- The HTML element defines a table cell that contains data. It participates in the tabular model.
- <tfoot> The HTML <tfoot> element represents a set of rows summarizing table columns.
- The HTML element represents a cell as the header of a group of table cells. The exact nature group is defined by the scope and headers attribute.
- <thead> The HTML <thead> element represents a set of lines defining table column headers.
- The HTML element is used to represent a row of cells in a table. Row cells can then be created using a combination of td (table data cell) and th (table header cell) elements.

FORMS CONTENT

HTML language provides a number of elements that can be used together to create forms that a user can fill and submit to a web page or application. Much more information about this is available in the HTML form guide.

- <button> The HTML <button> element is an interactive element
 activated by the user using a mouse, keyboard, finger, command, or
 other assistive technology. Once activated, it will then perform a programmable action, such as submitting a form or opening a dialog.
- <datalist> The HTML <datalist> element consists a set of option elements that represent the allowed or recommended options available for selection within other controls.

- <fieldset> The HTML <fieldset> element is used to control and label within a web form.
- <form> The HTML <form> element defines a section of a document containing interactive controls for submitting information.
- <input> The HTML <input> element helps to create controls for web
 forms to accept data from the user; a wide variety of input data types
 and control widgets are depending on the device and user agent. The
 <input> element is powerful and complex in all of HTML due to the
 huge number of combinations of input types and attributes.
- <label> The HTML <label> element represents a label for an item in the user interface.
- <legend> The HTML <legend> element used to define a caption for the content of its parent fieldset.
- <meter> The HTML <meter> element defines either a scalar value in a known range or a fractional value.
- <optgroup> The HTML <optgroup> element helps to create a grouping of options within the <select> element.
- <option> The HTML <option> element is used to define an item that
 contains a select, optgroup, or datalist element. The <option> element can represent menu items in pop-ups and other item lists in an
 HTML document.
- <output> The HTML <output> element is a container element into which a website or application can insert the results of a calculation or the result of a user action.
- <progress> The HTML <progress> element shows an indicator that shows the progress of a task's completion, usually displayed as a progress bar.
- <select> The HTML <select> element defines a control that provides a menu of options.
- <textarea> The HTML <textarea> element is a multiline plain text
 editing control that is useful when you want to allow users to enter large
 amounts of free-form text, such as a review comment or feedback form.

OTHER INTERACTIVE ELEMENTS

HTML offers a selection of elements that help create interactive user interface objects.

<details> The HTML <details> element creates an accessibility widget in which information is only visible when the widget is switched to the "open" state. A label must be provided using the details element.

<dialog> The HTML <dialog> element represents a dialog box or other component, such as a dismissable alert, inspector, or pane.

<summary> The HTML <summary> element specifies a summary, title, or legend for the disclosure field of the detail element. Clicking on the <summary> element toggles the open and closed state of the parent <details> element.

WEB COMPONENTS

Web Components is a technology related to HTML that basically allows you to create custom elements as if it was regular HTML. You can create your versions of standard HTML elements.

<slot> The HTML <slot> element – part of the Web Components suite of technologies – is a placeholder inside a component that you can fill with your own markup, allowing you to create separate Document Object Model (DOM) trees and present them together.

<template> The HTML <template> element is a way for holding HTML that is not meant to be rendered immediately after page load but can be instantiated later at runtime using JavaScript.

INLINE VS. BLOCK ELEMENTS

Block-Level Elements

HTML elements have historically been categorized as either block-level elements or inline-level elements. Since this is a presentational characteristic, nowadays CSS is specified in Flow Layout. A block-level element gets the entire horizontal space of its parent element (that is called as a container) and space equals to the height of its content, creating a "block".

The following is a list of all block-level HTML elements (although the word block-level is not defined for elements that are new to HTML5).

- <address>: It is used to contact information.
- <article>: It defines content of the article.
- <aside>: It is content aside.

- <blockquote>: It is a long ("block") quote.
- <details>: It is a publish widget.
- <dialog>: It is a dialog window.
- <dd>: It describes a term in the list of descriptions.
- <div>: It is used to distribute documents.
- <dl>: It is a descriptive list.
- <dt>: It is a descriptive list term.
- <fieldset>: It is a field set label.
- <figcaption>: It is a description of the picture.
- <image>: It defines the groups media content with a caption (see <figcaption>).
- <footer>: It is the footer of a section or page.
- <form>: It is an entry form.
- <h1>, <h2>, <h3>, <h4>, <h5>, <h6>: It is heading Levels 1–6.
- <header>: It is a section or page header.
- <hgroup>: It is a group header information.
- <game>: It is the horizontal ruler (dividing line).
- : It defines list item.
- <main>: It contains central content unique to this document.
- <nav>: It contains navigation links.
- : It is an ordered list.
- : It is a paragraph.
- <before>: It is used to preformatted text.
- <section>: It defines the part of a website.
- : It is a table.
- It is an unordered list.

Inline elements: Inline elements only take up enough width to allow for other elements next to each other that are inline. Inline elements do not start on a fresh line and do not have top and bottom borders like block elements.

Examples of embedded elements:

- <a>: This tag is used to include hyperlinks on a web page.
-
br>: This tag is used to mention line breaks on a web page whenever needed.
- <script>: This tag is used to include external and internal JavaScript codes.
- <input>: This tag is used to receive input from users and is mainly used in forms.
- : This tag is used to include various images on a web page to make the page look beautiful.
- : This tag is an inline container that takes up only the necessary space.
- : This tag is used where bold text is needed.
- <label>: This tag is used to improve usability for mouse users, i.e. if the user clicks on the text in the <label> element, it toggles the control.

ANATOMY OF HTML ELEMENTS

It is the global structure of an HTML that includes HTML version, HTML elements, attributes, inline and block elements, editors, formatting, and paragraphs.⁵ As more and more editors are expected to proofread content on the web, it's increasingly helpful for us to know at least the basics of HTML. So here is a simple introduction to the web language.

Whenever you view a web page, your web browser converts the HTML code into rendered text, images, and other media. If you ever want to fix or modify the content of the page, you will often need to change this HTML code. The very thought of it strikes fear into many hearts, but it doesn't have to.

HTML is made of a series of hierarchal elements. Most elements have an opening and closing tag, with some content in between. If you are used to mark up chapters, headings, and subheadings, this concept should be easy to grasp. Here's an example of the paragraph element:

Define Paragraph: The content of paragraph goes between the opening and closing tags. The block will be treated as a single paragraph with block content element.

A small number of elements use a single tag. These are referred to as self-closing elements. Here's an instance of a self-closing element – the line break (
br>).

Creating an HTML Document

With a fundamental understanding of the sorts of elements that exist, we can start to build an HTML page. First, let's create the file that contains our code:

- Create a new text file in any plain-text editor such as Notepad in (Windows) or TextEdit in (Mac).
- Then save the empty file as sample.html (.html is an extension).
- We recommend you to use any text editor to write code in HTML.

OK, we now save the file somewhere to place HTML code. When you are done editing the sample file, we can save the file, close it, and then double-click to reopen it in a web browser (by default, the .html files open by own in a web browser).

The simplest documents start with this opening tag such as

We can show our data correctly on the web browsers by declaring the HTML standard. To use the latest HTML5 standard, you should start our book as follows:

CREATING THE HIERARCHY OF HTML

Just as a branch of the tree, the elements in HTML can be nested within other elements. Our root html> element must be contained the following elements, in the same order such as:

- <head> it includes information about the page
- <body> it includes information displayed on the page

The code defines a basic, empty HTML page. Anything we add to the page will be nested within the <head> or <body> elements. These elements will become the parents of their child elements.

PAGE TITLES

We can add a title to the page by including a <title> tag within the <head> element also its closing tag. Here's how that looks given below.

In HTML, you can add spaces and tabs that return it anywhere, and the code will still work.

You won't see the page title appears in the main part of the web browser screen, but it's often displayed at the very top of the browser window on the new Tab.

PARAGRAPHS AND FORMATTING

Most text on the page should be placed inside the block element tag tags within the <body> element. We can usually set text in bold or italics by using the and elements respectively. Here's an example such as,

The level 1 heading (<h1>) is the upper level on the page. It appears at or near the top of the page, and it is good to use just one <h1> on each page. It is for an <h2> to be used after an <h1>, for an <h3> to be used after an <h2>, and so on.

IMAGES

Images are added by using the self-closing tag element. We use 'attributes' inside the element to specify an image to display and to provide

information about the image. Here is an example of an element with 3 attributes. Here is an example of an element with three attributes:

Let's look at each part of the code:

- It is an element used to display an image.
- src="" It is an attribute used to set the name and location of the image file.
- alt="" It is an attribute used to set the text to display when the image can't be loaded.
- title="" It is an attribute used to set the text to display when the pointer hovers over the image.

Image Sources

The src="..." attribute has to be written so that the image can be located. It is important to know how to locate the image on your website otherwise it won't end up with a broken image on your page.

There are various ways to define the correct 'path' to an image. You can find the easiest method to start from the top level of the web server and list every folder that has to be opened to reach the image.

Here's an example: let's say that we give online URL of flower photo from pexels.com (you can copy the img source address by right-clicking and pasting in the src of the img tag). You can add your local file image just by finding the path of it.

Elements and Its Attributes

The previous chapter was all about the structure of HTML. Here we will learn elements and attributes. Before starting the discussion of HTML elements attributes, let's discuss the difference between the tags and elements.

In HTML, tags are used at the start and end of an element. The element itself consists of tags and a structure inside. And attributes are given to elements to define their properties. Hopefully, this will provide you with a better understanding of tags, elements, and attributes.

HTML TAGS

Tags are used to define the start and end of an HTML element.¹ They consist of an opening parenthesis (<) followed by the name of the element and then a closing parenthesis (>). If an attribute is used in the

tag, it will be placed after the element. Here is an example of the HTML title tag.

HTML ELEMENTS

An element contains opening and closing tags, as well as what's inside those tags.² It usually consists of some structure that is used to define the relevant tags. Here is an example of an HTML title element.

Syntax:

The HTML element is the start tag to the end tag.

Example:

In this example, the HTML element is the heading "My Website" complete with opening and closing title tags. An element is defined by a start and end tag, some content, and an end tag.

The browser is the main tool of the web. So you should have a working knowledge of HTML5 and CSS3 programming because all your users are viewing your site using one browser or the other.

WEB BROWSERS

A web browser is a software application that is for the purpose of reading instructions and displaying the result on the web page.³ It is fully functional software that can interpret and display HTML of web pages, applications, JavaScript, AJAX, and others hosted on web servers. HTML is responsible for telling the web browser how text and other objects in a web document should appear. The Hypertext Transfer Protocol (HTTP) defines how browsers should request web pages and how web servers should respond to those requests.

How Does It Work?

A web browser typically reads and renders HTML documents. This happens inside the browser in two phases – the parsing phase and the

rendering phase. During the parsing phase, the browser reads the markup in the document, breaks it down into components, and creates a Document Object Model (DOM). After creating the DOM tree and loading and parsing all CSS stylesheets, the browser starts the rendering phase. Each node in the DOM tree will be rendered and displayed in the browser.

HTML Web Browser Support

All web activity begins on the user side when a user launches their browser. Each browser renders HTML a little differently, for example, handles JavaScript, multimedia, stylesheets, and other HTML plugins differently. Web browsers were created specifically to read HTML instructions and display the resulting web page. So when you're working with HTML, you need to test your site in as many different browsers as possible.

The purpose of a browser such as Chrome, Edge, Firefox, Safari is to read documents and display them correctly.⁴ The browser does not display HTML tags, uses them to determine how to display the document.

1. **Internet Explorer:** Microsoft Internet Explorer (IE) remains the dominant player on the Internet. Explorer is still very popular because it comes with Microsoft Windows. Of course, it works exclusively with Microsoft Windows. Mac and Linux are not supported. Version 10 of IE finally has respectable major parts of the HTML5 standard. If you write pages according to the HTML5 version, you can expect your site to work well in IE10. Most features will work in IE9, but not all.

But the older versions of IE are still extremely important because so many computers don't have IE10 installed yet. Version 6 has been the dominant player on the Internet for some time and refuses to die. However, it won't play well with modern standards, so it's considered obsolete by most developers.

- 2. **Mozilla Firefox:** Firefox is a big improvement on IE from a programmer's perspective due to the following reasons:
 - Better code display: If you view the HTML code of the page, you
 will see the code in a special window. The code has syntax coloring, making it easy to read. Some versions of IE display the code
 in Notepad, which is confusing because if you think you can edit
 the code, but you are simply editing the copy.

- Better error handling: You will make mistakes. In general, Firefox is better at pointing out errors than IE, especially when you start using JavaScript and other advanced technologies.
- Great extensions: Firefox has some amazing extensions that make web development a lot easier. These extensions allow you to edit code on the fly, automatically validate code, and dynamically examine your page structure.
- Cross-platform support: IE only works on Windows operating system, so it is not available for Mac or Linux users. Even if you are a Windows-only developer, your users might be using something else, so you need to know how other browsers see things.
- 3. Safari: The default browser for Mac and iPhone/iPad operating system (iOS) is called Safari. It is a powerful browser built on the WebKit rendering engine. Safari was designed with compliance and speed in mind. Mac and iOS users will certainly be using Safari, so you should know something about it. Chrome also uses WebKit, so if it looks good in Chrome, you'll probably be fine with Apple users.
- 4. **Google Chrome:** Google sees the future of browser-based applications using AJAX technologies. The Chrome is extremely fast, especially in the JavaScript technology that serves as the basis of this strategy. Chrome has a number of developer tools that make it the browser of choice for many web developers. Here are the highlights.
 - Real-time edits: You can go to any web page, right-click "inspect this element" and edit the text of that element in real-time. You can then see how the element looks with the new content. You can select a part of the page to see which corresponds to the code; you can select a code to see which part of the page the code represents.
 - Page outline: A well-designed page is created in the form of an outline with various elements nested within each other. The Elements View allows you to view a web page in the format with the ability to collapse and expand elements to clearly see the structure of the page.
 - Real-time CSS edits: As you learn how to use CSS styles, you'll want to see how different CSS rules change your page. In the

Explore Element view, you can highlight a part of the page and change the CSS while watching how the change affects your page in real-time.

- Network Tab feature allows user to see how long each part of your page takes to load. This can be useful when troubleshooting a slow-loading page.
- View sources: It allows you to view the full code of your page. It's
 especially useful when you get into JavaScript programming, as
 it includes a powerful debugging suite.
- Console: The console view is a small command line tool integrated directly into your browser. This can be very useful as it often shows errors that are otherwise hidden. The console is most useful when using JavaScript.

HTML ATTRIBUTES

Some characters are reserved in HTML.⁵ If you use the symbol less than (<) or greater than (>) signs in any text, the browser mixes them with tags. Character entities are used to show reserved characters in HTML. A character entity looks like this:

NON-BREAKING SPACE

A commonly used entity in HTML is the non-breaking space: a non-breaking space that will not break into a new line.⁶ The two words separated by a non-breaking space will stick together (not break into a new line).

COMBINING DIACRITICAL MARKS

A mark is a "glyph" added to a letter. Some of the diacritical marks, such as grave (`) and acute (´), are called accents. Diacritical marks can appear above and below a letter, within a letter, and between two letters.

This marks can be used in combination with alpha-numeric characters to create a character set (encoding) used on the page.

The attributes are used to define a property for more than one HTML element. They are found in the opening tag of an element and often contain spaces that are separated by pairs of values. Here is an example of the HTML alt text attribute:

In this example, the attribute is named an alt text of "Red Pink Rose" for the image "https://images.pexels.com/photos/56866/garden-rose-red-pink-56866.jpeg?auto=compress&cs=tinysrgb&w=300". While images will be rendered and displayed regardless of whether or not they contain alt text, adding this attribute is several different reasons.ood The search engines pay close attention to the alt text attribute of images, using this information to determine their meaning.

We have seen several HTML tags and their uses such as heading tags <h1>, <h2>, paragraph tag , and other tags. So far we've used them in their simplest form, but most HTML tags can also have attributes, which are extra bits of information.

All attributes consist of two parts - a name and a value:

- Name is the property that you want to see for getting data in database or fetch. For example, the paragraph element in the example carries an attribute named align, which you can use to indicate the alignment of the paragraph on the page.
- The value is what you want the property value to be set to and is always enclosed in quotes. The following example shows three possible values for the align attribute: left, center, and right.

Attribute names and attribute values are not case sensitive. However, the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) Organization recommends lowercase attributes/attribute values in its HTML 4 Recommendation.

Core Attributes

There are four core attributes that can be used on the majority of HTML elements:

- Id
- Title
- Class
- Style

Let's discuss all one by one.

ID Attributes

The id attribute can be used to uniquely identify any element within an HTML page. There are two primary reasons that you want to use an id attribute on an element given below:

- If an element carries a unique id attribute as a unique identifier, it is easy to identify its element content.
- If you have two elements of the same name within a single page (or style sheet), you can use the unique id attribute to distinguish between elements that have the same name.

The title attribute provides a suggested title for the element. The syntax for the title attribute is the same as explained for the id attribute. The behavior of the attribute will depend upon the element that carries it; however, it is displayed as a tooltip when the mouse cursor comes over the element or while the element is loading.

The class Attribute

The class attribute is used to link an element with a style sheet that specifies the class of element. You will learn much more about the use of the class attribute when you will learn CSS. The value of this class attribute may be a space-separated list of class names. Here is the syntax of the class attributes.

The style Attribute

The style attribute allows to specify CSS rules within the element.

The additional values that configure the elements are listed below. HTML attributes provide additional information about HTML elements.

All elements can have attributes.⁸ It provides extra information about elements. They are specified in the start tag. It usually comes in name/value pairs like: name="value. Now we will talk about some important attributes of some of the tags below:

- The src Attribute
- The width and height Attributes
- The href Attribute
- The alt Attribute
- The style Attribute
- The lang Attribute
- The title Attribute

These attributes are frequently used by the users, but the list is too big for HTML attributes.

GLOBAL ATTRIBUTES LIST

HTML5 defines a few attributes that are common to all elements. These attributes specify all elements, such as elements found inside the <head> section of the document, e.g. <base>, <script>, <title> etc.

spellcheck	true false	It specifies whether the element may be checked for spelling errors or not.
style	style	It specifies inline style information for an element.

title	text	It provides advisory information related to the element. It would be appropriate for a tooltip.
translate	yes no	It specifies whether the text of an element should be translated or not.
XML:lang	language-code	It specifies the language for the element's text content, in XHTML documents.

The following event attributes can be applied to most elements to execute JavaScript when certain events occur, with some exceptions where this is not relevant, such as elements located in the <head> section, e.g. <title>, <base>, , <tink>, etc.

FORM ATTRIBUTES EVENTS LIST

Events triggered by actions inside an HTML form (applies to almost all HTML elements but mostly used in form elements):

- onblur: It fires the moment that the element loses focus.
- onchange: It fires the moment when the value of the element is changed.
- oncontextmenu: It is a script to be run when a context menu is triggered.
- onfocus: It fires the moment when the element gets focused.
- oninput: It is a script to be run when an element gets user input.
- oninvalid: It is a script to be run when an element is invalid.
- onreset: It fires when the Reset button in a form is clicked.
- onsearch: It fires when the user writes something in a search field (for <input="search">).
- onselect: It fires after some text has been selected in an element.
- onsubmit: It fires when a form is submitted.

KEYBOARD ATTRIBUTES EVENTS LIST

- Onkeydown: It fires when a user is pressing a key.
- onkeypress: It fires when a user presses a key.
- onkeyup: It fires when a user releases a key.

MOUSE ATTRIBUTES EVENTS LIST

- onclick: It fires on a mouse click on the element.
- ondblclick: It fires on a mouse double-click on the element.

- onmousedown: It fires when a mouse button is pressed down on an element.
- onmousemove: It fires when the mouse pointer is moving while it is over an element.
- onmouseout: It fires when the mouse pointer moves out of an element.
- onmouseover: It fires when the mouse pointer moves over an element.
- onmouseup: It fires when a mouse button is released over an element.
- onmousewheel: Now it is deprecated but use the onwheel attribute instead.
- onwheel: It fires when the mouse wheel rolls up or down over an element.

DRAG ATTRIBUTES EVENTS LIST

- ondrag: It is a script to be run when an element is dragged.
- ondragend: It is a script to be run at the end of a drag operation.
- ondragenter: It is a script to be run when an element has been dragged to a valid drop target.
- ondragleave: It is a script to be run when an element leaves a valid drop target.
- ondragover: It is a script to be run when an element is being dragged over a valid drop target.
- ondragstart: It is a script to be run at the start of a drag operation.
- ondrop: It is a script to be run when dragged element is being dropped.
- onscroll: It is a script to be run when an element's scrollbar is being scrolled.

WINDOW ATTRIBUTES EVENTS LIST

The following events are related to the window object:

- onafterprint: It fires after the associated document is printed.
- onbeforeprint: It fires before the associated document is printed.
- onbeforeunload: It fires before a document is unloaded.
- onerror: It fires when document errors occur.
- onhashchange: It fires when the fragment identifier part of the document's URL, i.e. the small portion of a URL follows the sign (#) changes.
- onload: It fires when the document has finished loading.
- onmessage: It fires when the message event occurs, i.e. when a user sends a cross-document message or a message is sent from a client with postMessage() method.
- onoffline: It fires when the network connection fails and the browser starts working offline.
- ononline: It fires when the network connection returns and the browser starts working online.
- onpagehide: It fires when the page is hidden, such as when a user moves to another webpage.
- onpageshow: It fires when the page is shown, such as when a user navigates to another webpage.
- onpopstate: It fires when changes are made to the active history.
- onresize: It fires when a browser window is resized.
- onstorage: It fires when a Web Storage area is updated.
- onunload: It fires immediately before the document is unloaded or the browser window is closed.

MEDIA ATTRIBUTES EVENTS LIST

Events that occur when handling media elements that embedded inside the documents, such as <audio> and <video> elements:

- onabort: It fires when playback is aborted, but not due to an error.
- oncanplay script: It fires when enough data is available to play the media, but would require further buffering.
- oncamplaythrough: It fires when entire media can be played to the end without requiring to stop for further buffering.
- oncuechange: It fires when the text track cue in a <track> element changes.
- ondurationchange: It fires when the duration of the media changes.
- onemptied: It fires when the media element is reset to its initial state, because of a fatal error during load, because the load() method is called to reload it.
- onended: It fires when the end of playback is reached.
- onerror: It fires when an error occurs while fetching the media data.
- onloadeddata: It fires when media data is loaded at the current playback position.
- onloadedmetadata: It fires when metadata of the media (like duration and dimensions) has finished loading.
- onloadstart: It fires when loading of the media begins.
- onpause: It fires when playback is paused, either by the user or programmatically.
- onplay: It fires when playback of the media starts after having been paused, i.e. when the play() method is requested.
- Playing: It fires when the audio or video has started playing.
- Progress: It fires periodically to indicate the progress while downloading the media data.

- onratechange: It fires when the playback rate or speed is increased or decreased, like slow motion or fast forward mode.
- onseeked: It fires when the seek operation ends.
- Seeking: It fires when the current playback position is moved.
- Installed: It fires when the download has stopped unexpectedly.
- Unsuspend: It fires when the loading of the media is intentionally stopped.
- ontimeupdate: It fires when the playback position changes, like when the user fast forwards to a different playback position.
- onvolumechange: It fires when the volume is changed, or playback is muted or unmuted.
- onwaiting: It fires when playback stops because the next frame of a video resource is not available.

HTML URL

URL, known for Uniform Resource Locator, is the address of documents and another resource on the World Wide Web.⁹ Its purpose is to identify the location of the document and other resources available on the Internet and to determine the mechanism for accessing them through a web browser.

For example, if you open Google and look in the address bar of the browser, you will see:

https://google.com/

URL Syntax

Common URL syntax is as follows: scheme://host:port/path?query-string#fragment-id

A URL has a linear structure and usually consists of one of the following:

- Scheme Name The scheme name identifies the protocol to be used to access the resource on the Internet. Schema names followed by three "://" characters (colon and two slashes). The most used protocols are HTTP://, HTTPS://, FTP://, and mailto://.
- Hostname The hostname identifies the host where the resource resides. A hostname is the name of a domain assigned to a host computer. This is usually a combination of the local hostname and its parent domain name. For example, www.google.com consists of the hostname www and the domain name tutorial republic.com.
- Port Number Servers often supply more than one type of service, so you must tell the server what service is being requested. These requests are sent by port number. Known port numbers for the service are usually omitted from the URL. For example, HTTP web service runs on port 80 by default, HTTPS runs on port 443 by default.
- Path A path identifies a specific resource within a host that the user wants to access. For example, /html/url.php, /news/technology/, etc.
- Query String The query string contains the data to be passed to the server-side scripts running on the web server. For example, search parameters. A query string is preceded by a question mark (?) that is usually a string of name-value pairs separated by an ampersand (&);

for example, ?first_name=Jan&surname=Kouk, q=mobile+phone, etc.

• Fragment Identifier – The fragment identifier, if present, specifies the location on the page. The browser can scroll to view this part of the page. A fragment identifier introduced by a hash (#) is the optional last part of the document URL.

URL ENCODING

- URLs can only be sent over the net using the ASCII character set. If the URL contains non-ASCII characters, the URL must be converted.
- URL encoding converts non-ASCII characters into a format that can be transmitted over the Internet.
- URL encoding replaces non-ASCII characters with a "%" followed by hexadecimal digits.
- URLs cannot contain spaces. The encoding replaces some space with a plus sign (+) or %20.

RESERVED CHARACTERS

Some characters are reserved or restricted for use in URLs because they may (or may not) be defined as delimiters by generic syntax in a particular URL scheme. For example, slash / characters are used to separate different parts of a URL.

If the data for a URL component contains a character that would conflict with a reserved character set that is defined as a delimiter in the URL

scheme, the conflicting character must be percent-encoded before the URL is created. The reserved characters in the URL are:

HTML META

The <meta> tags are typically used to provide structured metadata such as document keywords, description, author name, character encoding, and other various metadata. Any number of <meta> tags can be placed in the body of an HTML or XHTML document.

The metadata will not display on the web page, but will be machineanalyzable and may be used by browsers or search engines such as Google or other web services. The following describes the use of <meta> tags for various purposes.

CHARACTER DECLARATION ENCODING IN HTML

This tag is typically used to declare character encoding inside HTML document.

DEFINING THE AUTHOR, KEYWORDS, AND DESCRIPTION FOR SEARCH ENGINES

You can use the meta tag to define who is the author or creator of the web page.

Some search engines use metadata, particularly keywords and descriptions, to index web pages; however, this is not necessarily true. Keywords that add extra weight to the keywords and document description provide a brief overview of the page.

HTML SCRIPT

JavaScript can either be embedded directly in an HTML page or placed in an external script file and referenced inside the HTML page. Both methods use the <script> element.

The <script> tag helps to embed or reference JavaScript in an HTML document to add interactivity to web pages and give a significantly better user experience. Some of the common uses of JavaScript include form validation, generating alert messages, creating image galleries, displaying hidden content, manipulating the DOM, and many more.

Embedding JavaScript

To embed JavaScript in a file, just add the code as the content of the <script> element.

HTML NOSCRIPT ELEMENT

The <noscript> is used to provide alternative content to users who have either disabled JavaScript in their browser that does not support client-side scripting.

This element can contain any HTML element except <script>, which can be included in the <body> element of a normal HTML page.

HTML LAYOUT

Website design is the activity of placing various elements that make up a website in a well-structured manner and give the website an attractive appearance. You have seen that most websites on the Internet usually display their content in multiple rows and columns in a magazine or newspaper format to provide users with a better reading and writing experience. This can be easily achieved by using HTML tags like , <div>, <header>, <footer>, <section>, etc., and adding some CSS styles.

LAYOUT BY HTML TABLE

A table provides the easiest way to create a layout in HTML. It generally involves the process of inserting content such as text, images, etc. into rows and columns. The following layout is created using an HTML table with three rows and two columns – the first and last rows span both columns using the table's colspan attribute.

LAYOUT BASED ON HTML DIVISION TAG

Using <div> (meaning division) elements is the most common method of creating layouts in HTML. The <div> element is used to mark a block of content or a set of other elements in an HTML document. It can contain other additional div elements if needed.

The following example uses <div> elements to create a multi-column layout. This will result in the same result as in the previous example, which uses a table element.

INTRODUCTION

HTML provides several tags that can be used to make some text on your web page appear different from regular text; for example, you can use the tag
b> to make your text bold, the tag <i>to make your text italic, the tag <mark> to highlight text, tag <code> to display a fragment of computer code, tags <ins> and to indicate editing, insertion, and deletion.\frac{1}{2}

Text formatting helps us to improve the visual of the text in any document.² HTML provides many tags to format the appearance of the text on

a web page to make it look attractive to web visitors. In this section, we will discuss what HTML formatting is. You will understand how to work with text formatting tags for bold, italic, lowercase, uppercase, insertion, deletion, superscript, subscript, and emphasis in an HTML document.

TEXT FORMATTING TAGS

HTML formatting tags allow to format text to increase its visual appeal. Various HTML tags can change the appearance of the text on a web page and make the attractive. We can use text formatting tags for bold, italics, underline, etc.

The following shows various formatting tags. Now try to understand how these tags actually work.

HTML - TEXT LINKS

The website may contain various links that take directly to other pages and even to specific parts of the page. These links are known as hyperlinks. It allows users to navigate between websites by clicking on words, phrases, and images. It allows you to create hyperlinks using text or images available on a web page.⁴

Linking Documents

The link is specified using the HTML <a> tag. This tag is called an anchor tag, and between the opening <a> tag and the closing <a> tag.

The target Attribute

The attribute is used to specify the location where the linked document is opened. Following are the possible options.

No.	Option	Description
1	_blank	It shows the linked document in a new window or tab.
2	_self	It shows the linked document in the same frame.
3	_parent	It shows the linked document in the parent frame.
4	_top	It shows the linked document in the full body of the window.
5	target frame	It shows the linked document in a named target frame.

img tag becomes part of the link, and the user can click on that part to go to the linked document. The following is a simple syntax for using the <a> tag.

Using the Base Path

When you link HTML documents related to the same web page, it is not necessary to provide the full URL for each link. You can get rid of it by using the
base> tag in the header of your HTML document. The tag is used to specify the base path for all links. So your browser concatenates the given relative path to this base path and creates a full URL.

LINKING TO A PAGE SECTION

An anchor link is a link that allows users to navigate through a web page. It helps to scroll easily and read quickly. An anchor can use to link to another part of the same page or to a specific part of another page.

Let's see how to navigate a marked part of the page using the <a> tag. You can add an id to the anchor element to name the page section. The attribute value can be a word or a phrase.

Download Links

You can create text link to make PDF, DOC, or ZIP files downloadable. This is simple; you just need to give complete URL of the downloadable file as follows.

Example:

It basically consists of three different parts (attribute)⁵:

- 1. href attribute
- 2. target attribute
- 3. name attribute

href Attribute

It means a hyperlink. If we want to create a hyperlink, the requirement is the address of the document, which can be anything like another web page, any file, e.g. PDF, etc.

target Attribute

The target attribute defines how the document is opened. It has many types and we can use them according to our needs.

- _parent: Only opens the linked document in the parent frame.
- _blank: Opens the document in a new tab or window.
- _top: Opens the attached document in a full window.

• _self: Opens the document in the same window or tab in which it is clicked. By default, this target is enabled.

name Attribute

The name is used to jump or navigate to a location on the page; this can be useful when we have a large VRU page with so much content. This helps save users' search and time without scrolling.

Syntax,

In this case, just click and go to the bottom of the page without scrolling down.

HTML URL

There are two types of URL in HTML:

- Absolute URL
- Relative URL

An absolute URL contains the whole address from the protocol (HTTPS) to the domain name (www.google.com) and includes the location within your website in your folder system (/foldername_A or /foldername_B) names within the URL. It is the full URL of the page that you link to. An example of an absolute URL is:

```
<a href = "https://www.w3schools.com/html/">
```

A relative URL does not use the full web address and only contains the location following the domain. It assumes that link you add is on the same site and part of the same root domain. A relative path starts with a slash and tells the browser to stay on the current site.

An example of a relative URL is:

```
<a href="/xyz.html">
```

You should use relative URLs whenever you are linking to somewhere on the same site. If you are linking to another site, then you will need to use an absolute URL.

ABSOLUTE URLS VS. RELATIVE URLS

Absolute URL: An absolute URL contains all the information needed to locate the resource. It usually starts with HTTP:// or HTTPS://. For example, "https://google.com" is an absolute URL.

Relative URL: A relative URL usually contains only the path to a specific file. These usually begin with a slash. The slash basically tells the browser to go to the site's domain. For example, /images/img.jpg tells the browser to go to the domain, then look for the images folder, then find img.jpg.

HTML LINK COLORS

We can also provide colors to our HTML link. By default, they have three states for the link color; this will appear in all browsers.

- Active links: After clicking on any link, it becomes an active link with underlined and red color.
- Unvisited links: The default browser colors are blue and underlined.
- Visited links: They are purple and underlined.

However, we can also provide our own colors to link using the syntax below. We can track this other type and provide color to our link. But we're using inline CSS here; you can also create external CSS if you want.

- Enter the color name directly.
- Using the HEX color code.
- Using rgb() and rgba() values.
- Using hsl and hsla() values.

DOCUMENT FRAGMENTS

If you want to link to a specific part of an HTML document, then it is called a document fragment, not just the top part of the document. To do the same, you first assign the id attribute to the element you want to

reference. It makes sense to refer to a specific heading, so it would look something like this:

Then to link to that specific id, you include it at the end of the URL, always preceded by a hash/pound symbol (#), for example:

HTML Images and JavaScript

In this chapter, we'll go through the steps involved in adding a favicon to your web page using HTML. You can use any image for any favicon, but keep in mind that simple, high-contrast images are often best for a small favicon size. You can also generate your own favicon through sites like favicon.cc. In the previous chapter, we discussed HTML URL links to help you pass the path in the image tag src attributes. In the next topic, we will discuss how JavaScript is used in HTML code.

HTML FAVICON

A favicon is a small image located in the browser tab to the left of the website name. The image below illustrates the location of the favicon. This icon actually appears in the address bar, browser tab, browser history, bookmarks bar, etc. The favicon icon image is in .ico file format. There are different file formats; the .ico format is supported by all browsers.

To add a favicon to the site, create a folder in project directory called images (if you don't already have one) and save your favicon image in the same folder. If you don't have an image, you download it from the Internet. Next, add the link> element to index.html file right below the <title> element. Your code should now be like this:

Replace Favicon Image Location with the relative file path of favicon image. Then save the index.html file and reload it in web browser. Your browser tab should now contain a favicon image.

HTML IMAGES

Images enhance the appearance of the web pages by creating them more interesting and colorful. The elements are used to add images to the documents. It is an empty element that contains attributes only. The simple syntax of the tag can be given below.

The following example adds three images to the web page:

Each image must carry at least two attributes such as the src attribute and an alt attribute. The src attribute tells the web browser where to find the image. Its value is the URL of the image file. Whereas, the alt attribute provides text for the image if it cannot be displayed for some reason because when the browser gets the path the image will show otherwise the alt value show. Its value must be a meaningful content for the image.

Also, the tag has other various tags such as width and height of an image. Both width and height attributes are used to specify the width and height of an image.

You can use the attribute named style to specify width and height for the images. It prevents stylesheets from changing the image size by mistake since inline style has the highest priority.

HTML <picture> TAG

The <picture> element in HTML is used to give web developers flexibility in specifying image resources.² The <picture> tag contains the <source> and tags. The attribute value is set to load a more appropriate image.

The tag is used for the end child element of an image declaration block. The element is used to give compatibility for browsers that do not support the element if none of the source tags match.

The <picture> tag is similar to the <video> and <audio> tags. We add different resources and the first resource that matches the preferences is the one that will be used.

The <picture> element contains 0 or more <source> elements, each referring to a different image source, and one element at the end.³ Each <source> element has a media attribute that specifies a media condition (similar to a media query) that the browser uses to determine when a particular source should be used.

WORKING WITH IMAGE MAPS IN HTML

The <map> tag defines an image map. A map is an image with clickable areas. Areas are defined by one or more <area> tags. It is also an image map that allows you to define hotspots on an image that works just like a hyperlink. The basic idea is creating an image map is to provide an easy way to connect different parts of an image without splitting them into separate image files. For example, a world map might have each country hyperlinked to get more information about that country.

HTML Iframe

An iframe tag is used to display a nested web page (a web page within a web page). The HTML <iframe> element defines an inline frame, that's why it's also called an inline frame. An iframe works like a mini web browser inside a web browser. Also, the content inside the iframe element exists completely independently of the surrounding elements.

An HTML iframe tag is defined with the <iframe> tag; the syntax is given below.

There are various attributes of iframes given below:

- allowfullscreen: The frame can open in full screen if the value is true.
- height: It defines the height of the added iframe, the default height is 150 px. The default value is Pixels.
- name: It provides the name to the iframe. The name attribute is most important if you want to create a link in one frame.
- frameborder: It provides whether iframe should have a border or not. But now it is not supported in HTML5. Its value is 1 or 0.
- width: It provides the width of the embedded frame, and default width is 300 px. Its default value is Pixels.
- src: The src attribute gives the path name or file name for which content is to be loaded into iframe.
- sandbox: It is used to apply restrictions for the content of the frame.
- allow-forms: It allows submission of the form if this keyword is not used then form submission is blocked.
- allow-popups: It enables popups, if not applied then no popup will open.
- allow-scripts: It enables the script to run.
- allow-same-origin: If the keyword is used, then embedded resource will be treated as downloaded from the same source.
- srcdoc: The attribute is used to show the content in the inline iframe. It overrides the src attribute.
- scrolling: It indicates whether the browser should provide a scroll bar for the iframe or not. It is not supported in HTML5.
- auto: It is a scrollbar that only shows if the content of iframe is larger than its dimensions.
- yes: It always shows a scroll bar for the iframe.
- no: It never shows scrollbar for the iframe.

HTML JavaScript

A script is a single piece of programming that can add interactivity to your website.⁴ For example, a script can generate a popup notification message or provide a drop-down menu. This script can be written using JavaScript or VBScript. Using any scripting language, you can write various small functions, called event handlers, and then run those functions using HTML attributes.

Currently, most web developers only use JavaScript and related frameworks, VBScript is not even supported by various major browsers.⁵ You can keep the JavaScript code in a separate file and then include it where needed, or you can define functions inside the HTML document itself. Let us look at both the cases one by one with suitable examples. Currently, the most popular scripting language used for web pages is JavaScript.

EXTERNAL JavaScript

The JavaScript file will have a.js extension and will be included in the HTML files using the <script> tag. If you want to define functionality that will be used in any HTML documents, then it is better to keep that file separate and then include that file in HTML documents using <script> tag.

Consider a function using JavaScript in script.js that has the following code.

EVENT HANDLER

Event handlers are simply defined functions that can be called against any mouse or keyboard event.⁶ In the event handler, you can define business logic, which can vary from 1 to 500 lines of code.

The following example explains how to write an event handler. We write one simple EventHandler() function in the header of the document. We call this function when a user hovers over a paragraph.

There are various other methods that users can add in code:

- onchange: It is an element that has been changed.
- onclick: When the user performs a click on the particular HTML element.
- onmouseover: When the user drags the mouse over an HTML element.
- onmouseout: When the user drags the mouse away from an HTML element.
- onkeydown: When the user pushes a keyboard key.
- onload: When the browser has finished loading the page.

FORM EVENTS

Form events are actions that pertain to forms, such as input elements being selected or unselected, and forms being submitted.

- submit: It fires when a form is submitted.
- focus: It fires when an element (such as an input) receives focus.
- blur: It fires when an element loses focus.

KEYBOARD EVENTS

Keyboard events are used for handling keyboard actions, such as pressing a key, lifting a key, and holding down a key.

- keydown: It fires when a key is pressed.
- keyup: It fires once when a key is released.
- keypress: It fires continuously while a key is pressed.

JavaScript can change HTML styling. Moreover, you can change various things such as content of HTML, color, size, and font; you can also add padding and margin.

THE <noscript> ELEMENT

You can provide alternative info to the users whose web browsers do not support scripts and for those users who disabled the script option in their browsers. You can do this by using the <noscript> tag.

DEFAULT SCRIPTING LANGUAGE

There may be situations where you include multiple script files and end up using multiple <script> tags. You can specify a scripting language for all script tags. This saves you from having to specify the language every time you use a script tag on a page.

HTML AUDIO AND VIDEO

The HTML5 DOM has methods, properties, and events for the <audio> and <video> elements.

Methods

The HTML5 <audio> and <video> tags make it simple to add media to any website. You can set the src attribute to identify the media source

and include a controls attribute so that the user can play and pause the media.

- addTextTrack(): It adds a new text track to the audio/video.
- canPlayType(): It checks whether the browser can play the specified audio/video type.
- load(): It re-loads the audio/video element.
- play(): It starts playing the audio/video.
- abort: It is generated when playback is aborted.
- canplay: It is generated when enough data is available that the media can be played.
- ended: It is generated when playback completes.
- error: It is generated when an error occurs.
- loaded data: It is generated when the first frame of the media has finished loading.
- loadstar: It is generated when loading of the media begins.
- pause: It is generated when playback is paused.

HTML HEAD ELEMENT

The <head> tag (element) is a container for the following elements such as <title>, <style>, <meta>, <link>, <script>, and <base>. Let's discuss various tags that are usually added in the head section.

The <head> Flement

The <head> is a container for metadata (that means data about data) that is placed between the <html> tag and the <body> tag.

The <title> Element

The <title> element defines the title of the HTML document. The title must be text-only; it is shown in the title browser bar or in the page's tab. The <title> element is required in the documents.

The <style> Element

The <style> element is used to describe style information for a single HTML page.

The <link> Element

The <link> element defines the relationship between the current document and an external resource.

TABLE HEADER, BODY, AND FOOTER

Tables can be divided into three parts – head, body, and foot.² The header and footer are more like headers and footers in a word-processed document, which remain the same for each page, while the body is the main carrier of the table's content. Three elements separate the head, body, and foot of the table are:

<thead> – It is used to create a separate table header. The <thead> element wraps up the part of the table that is the header; it is usually the very first row containing the column headers not always. If you use the <col>/<colgroup> element, the table header should be below them.

ATTRIBUTES ID AND HEADERS

An alternative to the scope attribute is to use the id and headers attributes to create associations between headers and cells.⁴ The way to use them is as follows.

You add a unique ID to each element. You add the headers attribute to each element. Each headers attribute must contain a space-separated list of IDs of all elements that act as headers for that cell.

HTML - EMBED MULTIMEDIA

Embedding Multimedia in HTML is adding images, audio, video, and other plugins to the web-using special HTML tags, the web browser started to support text and colors.⁵ Multimedia has interactive content. Let's understand HTML Embed Multimedia in detail.

Embedded Multimedia

Multimedia elements are embedded in the documents by various methods, which are also used to add media files to an HTML web page supported by various types and formats.

There are three ways to add multimedia to the web page as given below:

- 1. HTML <embed> Tag
- 2. HTML
bgsound> Tag
- 3. HTML <object> Tag

The <embed> Tag

The <embed> tag is used to add multimedia files of external applications, which are mainly audio and video, and other plugins to a web page.

- 1. <embed> tag: Supported by most web browsers and new in HTML5.
- 2. <embed> tag: It only has an opening tag and does not guarantee to have a closing tag.
- <noembed> tag: It is used when no web browser recognizes the HTML <embed> tag.

Supported Video Types

You can use different types of media in the embed tag, such as Flash movies (.swf), AVI files (.avi), and MOV files (.mov).

- .swf files These files are file types created by Macromedia's Flash program.
- .wmv files These files are Microsoft's Media Video file types.
- .mov files These files are in Apple's Quick Time Movie format.
- .mpeg files These files are movie files created by the Moving Pictures Expert Group.

The following is a list of important attributes that can be used with the <embed> tag. The most common attributes used by an element to add multimedia to HTML are listed below:

- height: It defines the height of the multimedia object in pixels.
- src: It defines the web browser URL as an embedded media object.
- width: It defines the width of the multimedia object in pixels.
- type: It is used to define the media type of the built-in plug-in.
- name: It is used to define the reference of the object.
- volume: It is used to control volume of the sound. Can be from 0 (off) to 100 (full volume).

The
bgsound> Tag

You can use the
bgsound> HTML tag to play an audio track in the background of your web page. Only Internet Explorer supports this tag, and most other browsers ignore this tag. When a user first downloads and displays a host document, it downloads and plays an audio file. The background audio file will also play whenever the user refreshes the browser.

Points to remember:

There are two main attributes used in the
bgsound> element to add background sound:

- loop It defines how many times the background sound will be played in a loop with specified conditions.
- src It defines the URL path to the embedded audio track.

The <object> Tag

HTML 4 introduces the <object> element, which offers a universal solution for embedding generic objects. The <object> element allows HTML authors to specify everything an object requires to be presented by a user agent. The <object> tag is used to add external object multimedia files, which are mainly audio, images, pdf, flash, video, and other web pages to the current web page.

- The <object> tag is supported by web browsers. It was introduced in HTML 4.
- The <object> element is defined in the <body> tag of an HTML document.
- The <param> tag is used as plugin parameters that have been included with the <object> tag.
- An HTML document object can be defined under the <object> tag of the current HTML document.

Attributes of the <object> tag

Common attributes used in the <object> element to add multimedia to HTML:

- height: It defines the height of the multimedia object in pixels.
- form: It defines the form ID of the object element.
- width: It defines the width of the multimedia object in pixels.
- type: It defines the media type of the embedded plug-in.

HTML MARQUEE

The Marquee Element in HTML is used to handle the effect of scrolling text and images in different directions using attributes on a web page of an HTML document to improve the appearance of the web.⁶

Usage

The HTML <marquee> tag is a container tag used to define the scrolling effect of a text or image element vertically or horizontally, or more precisely, the scrolling of the element is either top to bottom or left to right or vice versa.

The <marquee> tag is used in HTML 4 and is no longer used in the latest version of HTML, i.e. HTML5. Instead of the <marquee> tag, Javascript and cascading styles are used for the same effects.

The <marquee> tag supports global and event attributes and is only supported by a few browsers, e.g. firefox, internet explorer, safari, chrome, etc. A <marquee> tag starts with an opening tag and ends with a closing tag with the attribute value and content in between.

In the previous chapter, we discussed various topics of HTML such as Table, Marquee, and Multimedia with their attributes. Now, this chapter covers styling a web form that requests various data from the user. The form can use text fields, radio buttons, checkboxes, drop-downs, a textarea, and submit and reset buttons. The forms are basically a very important part of any website. It is a way to take user's information and process requests. Web forms are a basic element of website design, ranging from the complex of a search form to contact forms and complex data filtering.

HTML FORMS

Forms offer controls for every application use. Using the form controls and form fields, we can request small and large amounts of information such as user ID, password, billing details, job application, etc. You can create and modify form and its elements by resetting styles using the appearance property, setting own consistent style for the form, adding placeholder responses for text fields, and customizing radio buttons and checkboxes using other pseudo-classes and pseudo-elements.

Now, first add up the basic HTML and CSS for forms then save this file with index.html page. Begin by opening the index.html file in the editor. Then, add the following HTML code to provide a base structure for the file.

The elements contained in the <head> define the title of the page with the <title> tag where to load the stylesheet using the k element. <meta> tags define the character encoding and guide the browser on how to display the website on a small-screen device. The content of the main form will be placed inside the <body> and <main> tags.

Next, in the <main> tag, create a <form> element. Inside the <form> you add various form elements and <div> elements to help with the layout. BASIC STRUCTURE OF FORMS IN CSS

In order to get information through a form, we must first learn how to create it.¹ The syntax is shown below.

To add a form to a web page, we need to add a <form> element. All input fields and form controls should be wrapped in a <form> element. There are many attributes available for a form element, but the most used or important ones are action and method.

HTML FORM TAGS

Let's check the list of HTML5 form tags listed below:

 <form> defines an HTML form for entering inputs on the used page.

The <form> tag defines a form that contains attractive controls that allow a user to submit information to a web server. An HTML form is used to capture other information such as name, password, address, email details, credit card information, and so on.

Information can be captured in a form using many different form controls such as <input>, <textarea>, <select>, <option>, and <button>. There are also labeling and grouping controls that include the <optgroup>, <fieldset>, <legend>, and <label> elements.

• <input> defines an input control.

The HTML <input> element is the used form element. An <input> element can display in many ways, depending on the type attribute: <input type="text"> displays a single-line text input field, <input type="radio"> displays a radio button, <input type="checkbox"> displays a checkbox, <input type="submit"> displays a submit button, and <input type="button"> displays a clickable button.

Text fields are used to gather information from the user. It can be created using the <input> element and its type attribute, which describes what type of information we want the user to enter. We can set the name of the input element using the name attribute.

Here is the syntax of text fields,

<textarea> defines a multiline input control.
 The text area is only used to receive text information. A text area field can be created using the <textarea> element. This element cannot accept a type attribute because it only accepts one type of value, but it does accept a name attribute, which means that the user can name the text field.

• <label> defines a label for the input element.

Labels are used to give captions or headings to form controls. Labels are created using the <label> element. It is considered better to have a label in the form. If you click on the label, it will focus on the text control. To do so, you must have a form attribute on the label tag that must be the same as the input tag's id attribute.

Example:

- <fieldset> groups a related element into a form.
 - The text area is only used to receive text information. A text area field can be created using the <textarea> element. This element cannot accept a type attribute because it only accepts one type of value, but it does accept a name attribute, which means that the user can name the text field.
- <legend> defines a legend for the <fieldset> element.
 A legend is used to provide a form header that gives a quick idea of the type of form. The legend is created using the <legend> element immediately after the opening <fieldset> element.

Here is the syntax,

<select> defines a drop-down list.
 The <select> is used to create a drop-down list. It is often used in a form to collect user input. The name attribute is needed to have

a reference of form data after the form is submitted. Here the id is needed to associate the drop-down list with a label. There are various attributes used in <select> tag such as autofocus, disabled, form, multiple, and required.

 <optgroup> defines an optgroup of related various options in a dropdown list.

The <optgroup> tag is used to group related options in a <select> element (drop-down list). There are various attributes of optgroup such as disabled and label.

<option> defines the option in the drop-down list.

 The <option> can represent menu items in popups and other lists of items in a document.

• <button> defines a clickable button.

The checkbox is a square box that is ticked (checked) when activated. These are used to let a user select more than one option of a limited number of choices.

Radio buttons are presented in radio groups. Basically, it is a collection of radio buttons describing a set of related options. The only radio button in a group can be selected at the same time.

VARIOUS FORM ATTRIBUTES

Below are the various form attributes that you can use in your code:

action: The backend script is ready to process your passed data. The
action attribute defines the action to be performed when the form is
submitted. The data is sent to a file on the server when the user clicks

on the submit button. In the example, the form data is sent to a file called "actione_page.php". The file contains a server-side script that handles the form data.

• method: The method to use to upload the data. The method attribute specifies the HTTP method to use when submitting form data. Form data can be submitted as a URL variable (with method= "get") or as an HTTP post transaction (with method= "post").

The two common methods for the request-response between a server and client are²:

- 1. GET It requests the data from a specified resource.
- 2. POST It submits the processed data to a specified resource.

The GET method refers to the HyperText Transfer Protocol (HTTP) method used to request information from a particular resource. It is also used to specific variables derived from a group. The POST HTTP requests information from the supplying browser to be inserted into the server's message system.

KEY DIFFERENCES

GET

The parameters maintain in the server since it forms a portion of the URL.

It is capable of being bookmarked since it is within the URL.

The GET method of HTTP sends parameter information but with a limitation to what is acceptable to the URL.

The URL is limited to 2000 characters under the GET method.

The GET method is easily get with this not safe since the information received is saved in the URL, which means that anyone else can have access to it.

POST

The parameters do not remain since it is not within the browser history.

It cannot be bookmarked.

The POST method of HTTP sends information to the server without any kind of problem, including the information in the user form of uploaded files.

It method does not feature such restrictions.

On the other side, the POST method is safer but not easily cracked up. The POST parameters are not maintained on the server or webpages, thus it is not easily accessed. • target: This attribute specifies where to display the result that is received after submitting the form. It also specifies the target window or frame where the script result will be displayed. It takes values such as _blank, _self, _parent, etc.

Here is the explanation of the target values:

- 1. _blank: The answer will be dispayed in a new window or tab.
- 2. _self: The answer will be displayed in the current window.
- 3. _parent: The response will be displayed in the parent frame.
- 4. _top: The answer will be displayed in the entire body of the window.
- 5. framename: The response will be displayed in the named iframe.
- 6. enctype: User can use the enctype attribute to specify how the browser performs and encodes data before sending it to the server. The possible values are:
 - application/x-www-form-urlencoded It is the standard method that most forms use in simple scenarios.
 - multipart/form-data It is used when you want to upload binary data in the form of files like image, word file, etc.

HTML FORM CONTROLS

There are various types of form controls that you can use to collect data using HTML form such as³:

Text Input Controls: In the text control, there are also more categories such as Single-line text input controls, Password input controls, Multiple-line text input controls, etc.

There are three types of text input used in forms:

 Single Line Text Input Controls – It is used for items that require only one line of user input such as search fields or titles. They are created using the HTML <input> tag.

Example:

The following is a list of attributes for the <input> tag:

- type: It indicates the type of input control you want to create. This
 element is used to create other form controls such as radio buttons and checkboxes.
- name: It is used to specify the name of the part of the name/value pair that is sent to the server representing each form control and value that the user entered.
- value: It provides the initial value for the text input control that the user will see when the form is loaded.
- size: It allows you to specify the width of the text input control in characters.
- maxlength: It allows you to specify the maximum number of characters that the user can enter in the text field.
- 2. Password Entry Controls It is single-line text input, but masks the character once the user has entered it. They are created using the HTML <input> tag.

The following is a list of attributes for the <input> tag to create a password field.

- type: It indicates the input control type and will be set to password for password input control.
- name: It is used to specify the name of the control that is sent to the server to be recognized and get a value.
- value: This can be used to specify an initial value inside the control.

- size: It allows to specify the width of the text input control in characters.
- maxlength: It allows you to specify the maximum number of characters that the user can enter in the text field.
- 3. Multiline Text Entry Controls It is used when the user is required to enter details that may be longer than one sentence. Multiline input controls are created using the <textarea> HTML tag.

Here is the following list of attributes for <textarea> tag:

- name: It is used to specify the name of the control that is sent to the server to be recognized and get a value.
- rows: It indicates the number of lines of the text field.
- cols: it indicates the number of columns of the text field.
- Checkboxes Controls Checkboxes are used when more than one option is required to be selected. They are created by using the HTML <input> tag, but the type attribute is set to checkbox.

Following is the list of attributes for < checkboxes > tag:

- 1. type: It indicates the type of input control and for checkbox input control. It will set to checkbox.
- 2. name: Used to specify the name of the control that is sent to the server to be recognized and get a value.
- 3. value: The value will be used if the box is checked.
- 4. checked: It sets to checked if you want to select it by default.
- Radio Box Controls A radio button is used to select one of many given options.⁴ The radio buttons are displayed in radio button groups to show a set of related options from which only one can be selected. A radio in HTML can be defined using the <input> tag.

The general syntax for a radio definition is:

The following is a list of important attributes of the <radio> tag:

- 1. type: The type attribute of the input tag. When creating a radio button, it must be "radio", but it can be other input types, such as button, checkbox, file, etc.
- 2. name: It specifies the name of the input element. Switches with the same name form a switch group.
- 3. value: The value against the radio button that, if checked, is sent to the server.

Here are some examples using attributes for radio buttons such as:

- 1. Checked radio button
- 2. Disabled radio button
- Select Box Controls A selection box, also called a drop-down box, that provides the ability to list various options in the form of a dropdown list from which the user can select one or more options.

The following is a list of important attributes of the <select> tag:

- 1. name: It is used to specify the name of the control that is sent to the server to be recognized and get a value.
- 2. size: It can be used to display a scrolling list.
- 3. more: If set to "more", it allows the user to select more items from the menu.

In the <select> tag, we have one more tag known as <option>:

- 1. value: The value that is used if an option is selected in the select field.
- 2. selected: It specifies that the option should be the initially selected value on page load.
- 3. label: An alternative way of labeling.
- Hidden Controls Hidden form controls are used to hide data inside
 a page that can later be sent to the server. This control is hidden
 inside the code and does not appear on the actual page. For example,

the following hidden form is used to preserve the current page number. When the user clicks on the next page, the value of the hidden control will be sent to the web server and it will decide which page to display next based on the current page passed.

 Control buttons – There are different ways to create clickable buttons in HTML.⁵ You can create a clickable button using the <input> tag by setting its type attribute to button. The type attribute can take on the following values –

The following is a list of important attributes of the <button> tag:

- 1. submit: This will create a button that will automatically submit the form.
- 2. reset: It can create a button that automatically resets the form controls to their default values.
- 3. button: It can create a button that is used to run a client-side script when the user clicks on the button.
- 4. image: This will create a clickable button, but we can use an image as the background of the button.

• File upload field

If a user wants to upload a file to a website, you will need to use a file upload field, also known as a file selection field. It is also created using the <input> element, but the type attribute is set to file.

The following is a list of important file upload field attributes:

- 1. name: It is used to specify the name of the control that is sent to the server to be recognized and get a value.
- 2. accept: It specifies the file types that the server accepts.

HTML FORM INPUT TYPES

In HTML, the <input type=""> is an element of HTML form. The "type" attribute of the input element can be of other types that define the information field. Example, <input type="text" name="name"> provides a text field.

The following is a list of all types of HTML <input> elements:

1. Text: It defines a single-line text input field.

In this chapter, we will learn Cascading Style Sheets (CSS), its fundamental concepts, versions, syntax, and how we can link our HTML page with CSS files. More concepts, like modules, selectors, ids, classes, borders, tables, forms, colors, etc., will also be discussed in the chapter.

So let's get started with CSS.

INTRODUCTION

A document is usually a text file created using tag language – HTML is the most common markup language, but you can merge it with other tag languages such as SVG or XML. It is presenting a document to a user means converting it into a form used by audience. The Browsers, like Firefox, Chrome, or Edge, are designed to deliver text by view.

CSS is a programming language that integrates all relevant information related to web page display.¹ It defines the style and format of a website or page, including layout, colors, margins, fonts, padding (space around each element), and more. Along with HTML and Javascript, CSS forms

the basis of how the Internet works. All three standards and specifications are maintained by the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C).

CSS can be used to create a basic text style – for example, to change the color and size of titles and links. It can be used to build a structure to convert a single column of text into a structure with a content area and a separate bar for related information. It can be used for effects such as animation.

HISTORY

CSS is highly regarded by Norwegian Håkon Wium Lie, who, back in 1994, wanted to make a standard style sheet for the World Wide Web.² The first site tried for CSS is the Arena web browser. Since its first creation, Lie has continued to co-produce versions of CSS1, CSS2, RFC 2318 with Tim Berners-Lee, and Robert Cailliau. In the first decade of existence (1994–2004), CSS, in all the clarity, became the standard website that has a significant impact on the look and feel of the global web as we know it today. CSS3 was released in 1999.

Web standards are the topics to Lie's heart. Since the introduction of CSS, he has appealed to major technology players like Microsoft and other web browsers to support the standard web whole and continue to improve.

CSS SYNTAX

Now move on to the original CSS.³ The first thing we will do is make paragraph text a different color. So type or paste this into style file.css.

This looks different from the code in HTML file because it is a different syntax. We will add a white area and cut it into code as follows:

Both of the above examples are exactly the same about browser. But developers often write CSS as the latest example to differentiate styles.

CSS is a rule-based language that defines rules by specifying groups of styles to be applied to specific objects or groups of objects on your web page. For example, you may decide that a major topic on your page is shown as a red flag. The following code shows a simple CSS rule.

- For example, the CSS rule opens with a selector.
- Selects the HTML element that will style it. In this case, we style the first-level titles ().
- Then we have a set of twisted pieces {}.
- Inside the instruments, there will be one or more announcements, which take the form of the goods and pairs of value. Specifies the location (color in the example above) before the colon, and specifies the value of the property after the colon (red for example).
- This example contains two declarations, one color and one font size. Each pair specifies the location of the element (s) we select (in this case), and then the value we would like to give the structure.

CSS layouts have different valid values, depending on the specified format.⁴ In our example, we have a color package, which can take on different color values. We also have a font size structure. This structure can take units of various sizes as a value.

The CSS style sheet will contain many such rules, written in sequence.

DIFFERENT TYPES OF CSS YOU CAN USE

We have three types of CSS⁵:

- CSS might appear in another external file.
- It may appear inside the top of a document or webpage.
- It may appear in the queue, next to the CSS text.

External Style Sheets contain CSS instructions, and these are special files and have a .css file extension. If an external style sheet is installed on any web page, the CSS file will control its sound and appearance.

A DIFFERENT VERSION OF CSS

CSS3 and CSS4 – These versions build in CSS2.1, adding new functionality and maintaining backward compatibility. Some features are still being tested and may change in the future. Use this with caution, as it may cause problems with your site.

CSS2.1 (recommended) – This version has fixed many bugs and problems in CSS2 and is now the official recommended version of CSS.

CSS1 and CSS2 (no longer applicable) – These were the first two versions of CSS and are no longer updated or maintained.

STARTING WITH A SPECIFIC HTML

HTML and CSS are two methods of tags (code) with their own unique syntax. There is an important difference between the two. You can think of HTML as a page layout, while CSS gives HTML its own style.

LINKING YOUR HTML AND CSS FILES

Before we can write CSS, we actually have to go back to our HTML. We need to write a new line to link the HTML file and CSS file together. So, open the HTML file and add the provided line "style.css "rel=" stylesheet "type =" text / CSS "/>". Your file code looks like this:

This line of code links a new CSS file to your HTML file. Let's split it: the href attribute specifies the link associated with the CSS file. We'll get to the links later, for now, just make sure the style.css file is in the same folder as index.html file. The rel attribute tells your browser that this is a style sheet. The attribute type tells the browser that this linked file should be translated as CSS syntax.

HOW CSS AND HTML WORK TOGETHER

CSS is only concerned with web page layout, while page content is defined using marker language such as HTML. The separation of style and content has various advantages, among them improved accessibility, and more control over web design.

CSS documents are used to define a web page style, then linked to an HTML document (or document in a different tag language) that contains the content and layout of the page. Setting the style directly to the HTML document is possible, but not recommended. CSS texts can be created in any text editor, such as Text Editor on Mac or Notepad for Windows, as well as many other free or paid options that you can download.

How to Apply Classes on Paragraph in HTML?

There are some things you need to look for when creating classes in CSS, such as the attributes you will add to the elements and the number of classes you want to create. If you plan this in advance, it will help you to edit the code easily.

Overall, you should also pay attention to these three factors:

- Specify your class the name of the class should provide information about the attributes added to the feature. Therefore, it will be easier to understand. For example, if you want to add a class that will change the font size to 36, the best bet would be to name it a font-36.
- Make sure the class does only one thing adding more than one attribute might make the class harder to use again. For example, you cannot use a class that contains two attributes green text and 36 pixel font size if you only want green text without changing the font size.
- Organize your classes based on their characteristics when you create classes, organize them based on their usage. For example, you can collect classes related to font size. This practice would help you in the long run.

CSS classes will help you style HTML elements quickly. Additionally, you can avoid duplicating the same code for each HTML object using the same style. Therefore, the amount of CSS code to be used decreases – making it more readable and easier to remove.

In another note, you can also use the ID selector to style HTML elements. However, it can only change one HTML object, and the class selector can create more than one object.

CSS COMMENTS

CSS comments are not visible in the browser but may be helpful in writing your source code. Comments are also used to explain the code and can be helpful if you edit the source code later. Comments ignored by browsers. CSS comments are embedded within the <style> element, and begin with // and end with */:

How to Use These Colors

Each color can be represented in various different ways. For example, blue can be represented as # 0000ff, # 00f, RGB (0, 0, 255), and other ways. It does not matter which one you choose as long as it is a valid color. You can

apply any of the colors to a website or blog by using the appropriate CSS code.

- To set the background color, use the background color.
- To set text color, use color.
- To set a border color, use the border color.

CSS SELECTORS

CSS selector for matching features on a web page.⁸ The style rules connected with that selector will apply to items such as the pattern. Choices are one of the most important CSS features as they allow you to direct certain elements to your web page in a variety of ways to style them.

A few types of selectors are available in CSS, let's take a closer look.

Universal Selector

It is indicated by a star (*), corresponds to each part of the page. The universal selector may be removed if other conditions are present in the feature. This filter is often used to remove automatic genes and pads from elements for quick testing.

Let's try the following example to understand how it basically works:

The style rules within the selector * will apply to everything in the document.

Element Type Selectors

It is the same as every element in a document and the name of the corresponding element type. Let's try an example to see how it really works.

Id Selector

The id selector is used to describe style rules for one or more items. The id selector is defined by a hash (#) symbol that is immediately followed by the id value.

Example:

This style rule gives the text the object in red, its id identifier being set as default.

Class Selectors

It is used to select any HTML component with a class attribute. All features with that class will be formatted according to a defined rule. The class selector is defined by an intermediate symbol (.). That is immediately followed by a class value.

Descendant Selectors

You can use these options if you need to select an interest-bearing element of another element, for example, if you want to identify only those anchors contained in the random list, rather than directing all anchor elements. Let's see an example on how it works.

The style rules within the selector ul.menu li a apply only to those elements <a> contained within the element that has a class .menu, and that does not affect other links within the document. Similarly, style rules within the h1 em selector will only apply to those elements of content contained within the element of <h1> and which do not affect other elements of .

Child Selectors

The child selector is used to select only those specific child items for a particular feature. The children's selector is made up of two or more selectors that are separated by a larger symbol (>). You can use this selector, for example, to select the first level of list items within a nested list with more than one level. Let's look at an example on how it works.

The style rule inside the selector, such as ul > li applied to only those elements that direct children of the elements, has no effect on other list elements.

Adjacent Sibling Selectors

Adjacent sibling selectors are used to select its sibling elements (i.e., elements at the same level). This selector has a syntax such as: E1 + E2, where E2 is the target selector.

The h1 + p selector in the following example will select elements only if the < h1 > and elements share the same parent in the document tree and < h1 > precedes the section immediately. This means that only those sections that come immediately after each < h1 > title will have corresponding style rules. Let's see an example on how this option really works.

Sibling Selector

The standard sibling selector is similar to the nearest sibling selector (E1 + E2), but less powerful. The standard sibling selector is made up of two simple picks separated by a tilde (\sim) character. It can be written as follows: E1 \sim E2, where E2 is the purpose of the selector.

The $h1 \sim p$ selector in the example below will select all the features preceded by the < h1 > section, where all the features share the same parent in the document tree.

Grouping Selectors

Usually, a few selectors on a style sheet share declarations of the same style rules. You can group them with a comma-separated list to narrow the code to your style sheet. It also prevents others from repeating the same style rules over and over again.

Let's take a look.

SOME OTHER CONCEPTS OF CSS

There are various properties you can use to design your page using CSS listed below:

- CSS Syntax
- CSS Selectors
- CSS Comments

We have already discussed previously all the above-listed properties.

CSS Colors

The color properties are specified using color names, or RGB, HEX, HSL, RGBA, and HSLA values. For example, #ff0000, RGB(0, 0, 0, 0.1), HSL(240 100% 50%), etc.

CSS Backgrounds

The background properties are used to add background effects for elements. There are various other properties of background such as background-color, background-image, background-repeat, background-attachment, background-position, etc.

- CSS Borders: The border properties specify the style, width, and color of an element's border. The following values are allowed such as, dotted, dashed, solid, double, groove, ridge, inset, outset, none, and hidden.
- CSS Margins: CSS margins are used to create space around elements, without any defined parameters. There are features for setting the margin for each element of the element such as top, bottom, right, and left. CSS has features that specify a margin for each element of the element for margin-top, margin-bottom, margin-right, and margin-left.
- CSS Padding: CSS padding is used to generate space near element content, within any defined parameters. There are pad

setup properties on each side of the element, such as top, bottom, right, and left. CSS has paddling specifications for each element of the element: padding-top, padding-bottom, padding-right, and padding-left.

- CSS Fonts: CSS Fonts defines font-related properties and how font resources are loaded. It also defines the style of a font, such as its family, size and weight, line height. There are various properties of font such as font, font-family, font-size, font-size-adjust, font-stretch, font-style, font-variant, etc.
- CSS Lists: The List specifies the listing of the contents or items in a
 particular manner which helps to make a clean webpage. The list can
 be categorized into two types such as Unordered List and Ordered
 List.
- CSS Tables: The table is used to apply various style elements to HTML table elements to organize data in rows and columns, or possibly in a more complex format. This feature is used to set the algorithm used to edit cells, rows, and columns.
- CSS Display: The display property determines how an element looks.
 It is also a part of the presentation of code as it has a significant
 impact on layouts. The display property has different values such as
 inline, inline-block, block, grid, flex, none, inline-grid, and more,
 which all influence the layout and presentation of an element on the
 web page.
- CSS Position: The position property defines the type of positioning method used for an element. There are five different position values such as static, relative, fixed, absolute, and sticky.
- CSS Forms: Forms are a part of any website. It is a way to take user
 information and process requests. To add a form to a web page, we
 need to add a <form> element. All input fields and form controls
 should be wrapped in a <form> element.
- CSS Transitions: It allows changing property values smoothly, within a given duration. Here we have the following properties such as transition, transition-delay, transition-duration, transition-property, and transition-timing-function.

- - CSS Animations: An animation lets an element change from one style to another. It has properties such as @keyframes, animation-name, animation-duration, animation-delay, animation-iteration-count, animation-direction, animation-timing-function, animation-fillmode, animation.
 - CSS Flexbox: The Flexbox layout allows you to easily format HTML. Flexbox makes it easy to direct objects horizontally and horizontally using lines and columns. Flexbox is a layout for arranging objects in rows or columns. The flex container properties are flex-direction, flex-wrap, flex-flow, justify-content, align-items, and align-content.
 - CSS Grid: The Grid offers a grid-based layout system, with rows and columns, making it easier to design pages without having to use floats and positioning.
