More than just a dictionary

While *First Children's Dictionary* acts as a tool to look up spellings and meanings of words, there is more to it than that:

Opposites—words with opposite meanings that are formed by adding common prefixes, such as *unhappy* or *dishonest*, help children learn how to use these prefixes correctly.

Spelling notes—warning notes are included for words that sound the same but are spelled differently, e.g. *pale/pail*.

Word collections—fun-filled pages of words under one theme are valuable aids to creative writing.

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Alphabetical order

alphabetical order.





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All about words

d

To make a sentence we use different types of words. Each word in a sentence has its own name and its own job to do.

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Nouns

A **noun** is a word that names a thing, a person, or a place. **Cat**, **teacher**, **spoon**, and **city** are all nouns.

A common

A **common noun** names things, people, or places in general. **Carrot**, **bird**, **friend**, and **school** are all common nouns.

A **proper noun** names one particular person or place. Proper nouns begin with a capital letter. **Tom, New York,** and **France** are all proper nouns.

The days and months are also proper nouns, so they begin with capital letters, for example **Monday**, **Tuesday**, **January**, and **February**.

One or two?

We use a **singular** noun if there is only one of something. We use a **plural** noun if there is more than one. We usually add -s or -es to make plural nouns. For nouns that end in -y, we change the -y to -ies.



Singular sock dog box princess baby family Plural socks dogs boxes princesses babies families

Curious plurals

A few nouns stay the same in the singular and the plural.

For example:

One **sheep**; three **sheep**

Some nouns change completely in the plural. *For example:*

One mouse; two mice One man; three men

Adjectives

An adjective is a word that is used to describe a noun.

Big, yellow, sticky, and dark are all adjectives.

W An adjective can come before a noun. *Look at the big, yellow Sun.*

Or it can come after the verb be. The Sun is big and yellow.

This piglet is.

Comparing things

To compare people or things, some adjectives can change. For example, tall becomes taller or the tallest.

Some adjectives do not change. Instead, we use more and the most before the adjective to compare people or things.






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Verbs

A **verb** is sometimes called an **action word** because it is a word that describes what a person or thing is doing. **Sit**, **think**, **sleep**, **sing**, and **climb** are all verbs. A sentence must contain a verb to make sense. "**Be**" is also a verb. The parts of "be" are: I **am**, you **are**, he **is**, she **is**, we **are**, they **are**. For example: *I am very tall*.





Now and then

The **tense** of a verb shows when something happens. Notice how the verb changes according to which tense it is in.

If an action happens now, the verb is in the **present tense**. *The boy kicks the ball*.

If the action is happening now and continues to happen, the verb is in the **present progressive tense**.

The boy is kicking the ball.

If the action happened in the past, the verb is in the past tense.

The boy kicked the ball.

If the action will happen in the future, we can use **will** or "be" **going to**.

The boy will kick the ball.

The boy is going to kick the ball.



Some tricky past tenses

We usually make a past tense by adding -ed to the verb.

We worked hard yesterday.

Adverbs

An **adverb** is a word that gives more information about a verb. *She opened the present quickly*.

A lot of adverbs end with the letters -ly. **Quickly**, **slowly**, **sadly**, and **noisily** are all adverbs.

Adverbs can also tell us when something happens.

I always do my homework.
We'll get home soon.

Prepositions

A **preposition** usually comes before a noun. It often shows where something is. *The cat is* **on** *a branch* **in** *the tree*.



Pronouns

A **pronoun** is used instead of a noun. The girl picked up the apple and **she** ate **it**.


She replaces *the girl* and *it* replaces *the apple*. We often use pronouns so that we don't repeat the same word too many times.

Conjunctions

Conjunctions are used to join together different parts of a sentence. And, but, or, and because are conjunctions.

Getting directions

When you travel somewhere, there are usually signs to help point you in the right direction. It's the same when you are looking up words in this dictionary. Look at this double-page example.

This dictionary tells you lots of things about words and how to use them.

Part of speech

This tells you whether the headword is a **noun**, **verb**, **adjective**, or **adverb**. (See pages 6-9)

What does it mean?

The meaning of the word is given for each entry. If a word has more than one meaning or part of speech, it is listed below the headword.

Extra information

Extra information is given about spellings and opposites.





Some words do not follow the usual rules for their past tense or plural form. Follow the hand symbol • to take you to the main entry for this word.





abbreviation

NOUN abbreviations An abbreviation is a short way of writing a word. For example, "TV" is an abbreviation for "television."

able

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ADJECTIVE

If you are able to do something, you can do it. I am able to ice skate!

ability (NOUN)

If you have the ability to do something, you can do it. Chameleons have the ability to change color.

abroad

ADVERB

If you go abroad, you go to another country.

We sometimes go abroad for our summer vacation.

absent

ADIECTIVE

If you are absent, you are not in the place you would normally be in. My sister was absent from school yesterday because she was ill.

absolutely

ADVERB

Absolutely means the same as completely. The water's absolutely freezing!

absorb

VERB absorbs, absorbing, absorbed

If something absorbs water, it soaks it up. The tissue paper quickly absorbed all the water.

absorbent (ADJECTIVE) If something is absorbent, it absorbs water easily.

abuse

VERB abuses, abusing, abused

To abuse someone means to hurt a person or treat a person very badly.

accent

NOUN accents

Your accent is the way you say words when you speak. People from different places speak with different accents.

accept

VERB accepts, accepting, accepted

If you accept something, you take it when someone offers it to you. She went up onto the stage to accept her prize.

access

VERB accesses, accessing, accessed

When you access a program or document on a computer, you open it and use it. Anyone can access these files.

accident

NOUN accidents

1 If there is an accident, something bad happens and someone is hurt.

There was an accident on the highway.

2 If something was an accident, it happened by chance and no one did it deliberately. *I didn't* mean to drop your phone—it was an accident.

accidentally (ADVERB)

If you do something accidentally, it is an accident. I accidentally spilled my drink.

accurate

ADIECTIVE

Something that is accurate is exactly right. Can you make an accurate copy of the picture hanging on the wall?

Opposite: inaccurate accurately (ADVERB) If you do something accurately, you do it so

that it is exactly right. Make sure you measure the line accurately.

accuse

VERB accuses, accusing, accused

If you accuse someone of doing something, you say that the person did it. She accused him of stealing her money.

ache

VERB aches, aching, ached If a part of your body aches, it hurts. I was tired, and my head ached.

achieve

VERB achieves, achieving, achieved

If you achieve something, you manage to do it. I had finally achieved my dream of singing on stage!

achievement (NOUN)

An achievement is something good that you achieve. Winning the trophy was a great achievement for our team.

acid

NOUN acids An acid is a chemical. Lemon and vinegar both contain acids.

acorn

NOUN acorns An acorn is the seed of an oak tree.

acrobat

NOUN acrobats An acrobat is a person who performs difficult gymnastic tricks on stage or in a circus.

act

VERB acts, acting, acted

1 The way that you act is the way you behave. My friend was acting very strangely. 2 When you act, you pretend to be a character in a play or film. If you enjoy acting, you might want to join a drama group and act in a play.

action

NOUN actions

1 An action is something that you do. Do you know the actions to this song? 2 An action film is one with a lot of exciting events.

ADIECTIVE

If you are active, you are moving around rather than sitting still.

activity

NOUN activities

An activity is something that you can do for fun. There are lots of after-school activities.

actor

NOUN actors

An actor is someone who acts in plays, films, or television programs. A woman who is an actor is sometimes called an actress.

add

VERB adds, adding, added

When you do addition, you add numbers together.

adjective

NOUN adjectives

An adjective is a word such as "big" or "funny" that describes what someone or something is like. There are two adjectives

adventure

NOUN adventures
An adventure is something
new and exciting that you do.
adventurous (ADJECTIVE)
Someone who is adventurous

exciting things.

adverb

NOUN adverbs
An adverb is a word such as "quickly," "slowly," or "cheerfully" that describes how you do something.
Adverbs describe verbs.
There are two adverbs in the sentence: I opened the present slowly, then smiled happily.

advertise

VERB advertises, advertising, advertised

To advertise something means to tell people about it so they will want to buy it. A lot of companies advertise things on TV.

advertisement

NOUN

If you give someone advice, you suggest to them what they should do.

advise

VERB advises, advising, advised

If you advise someone to do something, you tell them that they should do it. I advise you to wear a cycle helmet when you ride your bike.

affectionate

ADJECTIVE

If you are affectionate, you show someone that you like or love them. My cat is very affectionate.



VERB affords, affording, afforded

If you can afford something, you have enough money to buy it.

I can't afford that computer game.

afraid

ADJECTIVE

If you are afraid, you are scared. I am afraid of spiders.

afternoon

NOUN afternoons
The afternoon is the time
between midday and

ADVERB

If you do something again, you do it one more time.

age

NOUN ages
Your age is how old you are. Write your name and age on the list.

aggressive

ADJECTIVE

Someone who is aggressive often argues and fights. An animal that is aggressive is likely to attack another animal.

ago

Ago means in the past. *I started* school two years **ago**.

agree

VERB agrees, agreeing, agreed If you agree with someone, you think the same as they do. I agree with you that it's a really good movie.

Opposite: disagree

NOUN

Aid is food and clothes that are given to people who need them. Charities often send emergency aid to people after a natural disaster.

aim

NOUN

Air is the mixture of gases around us that we breathe. Let's open the window to get some fresh air.

ADJECTIVE

Something that is amazing is very good or very surprising. She's an amazing dancer!

amazed (ADJECTIVE)

If you are amazed, you are very surprised. I was amazed when I saw all the presents!

ambulance

NOUN ambulances
An ambulance is a vehicle for taking sick or injured people to the hospital.

anchor

NOUN anchors

An anchor is a large, heavy metal hook that digs into the seabed to stop a boat from drifting away.

ancient

ADJECTIVE

Something that is ancient is very old. We found some ancient coins in the ground.

angel

NOUN angels
An angel is a messenger from a god.



amount

NOUN amounts
The amount of something is how much there is of it.

I'd never seen such a huge
amount of food before.

amphibian

NOUN amphibians
An amphibian is an animal that can live in water and on land.

amuse

VERB amuses, amusing, amused

If something amuses you, it makes you laugh. *His jokes really amused us*.

amusing (ADJECTIVE) Something that is amusing makes you laugh.

angle

NOUN angles

An angle is a corner where two lines meet. A square has four angles, and a triangle has three.

angry

If you are angry, you feel mad and upset about something. My mom was angry when I kicked the ball through the window.





antiseptic

NOUN antiseptics An antiseptic is a chemical that kills germs.

anxious

ADJECTIVE

If you feel anxious, you feel worried or nervous. Most people feel anxious before they go on stage.

It's time to announce the winner.

announce

VERB announces, announcing, announced

If you announce something, you say it aloud so that everyone can hear.

announcement (NOUN)

When you make an announcement, you announce something.

annoy

VERB annous, annouing, annoyed

If something annous you, it makes you feel angry.

Sometimes my little brother really annoys me!

> annoying (ADJECTIVE) Something that is annoying makes you feel angry. This

game is really annoying!

ant

NOUN ants

An ant is a type of small insect that lives in very large groups.

antelope

NOUN antelopes An antelope is an animal like a large deer that lives on the plains in Africa and Asia.

antenna

NOUN antennae

An antenna on an insect or snail is one of the two long, thin parts on its head that it uses for feeling and touching things.

antibiotic

NOUN antibiotics An antibiotic is a medicine that cures an infection.

any

ADJECTIVE

1 Any means some. Have you got any candy?

2 Any means whichever one you want. You can choose any toy in the store!

anybody

Anybody or anyone means any person at all. It's a secret, so don't tell anybody.

anything

If something appears, you can suddenly see it. *The Sun* appeared from behind the clouds.

Opposite: disappear

appearance

NOUN

Your appearance is what you look like. You shouldn't worry so much about your appearance.

appetite

NOUN appetites
Your appetite is the feeling you
have when you want to eat food.
He has a huge appetite!

applause

NOUN

Applause is clapping and cheering. The audience gave a round of **applause** when the play finished.

apple

NOUN apples
An apple is a round fruit with a smooth skin and crisp flesh.

appointment

NOUN appointments
If you have an appointment
with someone, you have
arranged to meet them
at a certain time.

appreciate

VERB appreciates, appreciating, appreciated If you appreciate something, you are glad to have it and feel grateful for it. *Thank you*. *I really appreciate your help.*

apprentice

NOUN apprentices
An apprentice is someone who learns to do a job by working with a person who does that job.

approach

VERB approaches, approaching, approached

ADVERE

Approximately means more or less, but not exactly. There are approximately 30 children in each class.

aquarium

NOUN aquariums
An aquarium is a glass

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aquatic

ADJECTIVE

Aquatic animals or plants live in water.

arch

NOUN arches

An arch is a curved part of a building or bridge that you can sometimes walk under.

architect

NOUN architects An architect is a person who designs buildings.

NOUN areas

An area is a piece of land or ground. There's a play area behind our school.

NOUN armies An army is a large group of soldiers who fight on land.

VERB arranges, arranging, arranged

cold

NOUN colds

1 A cold is an illness that makes you sneeze and cough. *I've had this horrible cold for five days now!* ADJECTIVE colder, coldest
2 Something that is cold is not warm or hot. *It's too cold to play outside*.

collage

NOUN collages

A collage is a picture that you make by sticking pieces of paper or cloth onto paper.

collar

NOUN collars

- **1** The collar of a shirt or jacket is the part that goes around your neck.
- **2** A collar is a thin strip of leather that you put around the neck of a dog or cat.

collect

VERB collects, collecting, collected

- 1 If you collect things, you get as many of them as you can and put them together.
- **2** If you collect something, you go and fetch it.

collection (NOUN)

A collection is a group of things you have collected together. The museum has got an amazing collection of fossils.

color

NOUN colors

Red, yellow, and blue are the names of some colors.

colorful (ADJECTIVE)
Something that is colorful is decorated with bright colors. I like wearing colorful clothes.

column

NOUN columns

comb

NOUN combs

A comb is a piece of plastic or metal with teeth, that you use to make your hair look neat.

combine

VERB combines, combining, combined

When you combine things, you mix or join them together. **combination** (NOUN)

A combination is a set of things that have been mixed or joined together.

come

VERB comes, coming, come, came

comparison (NOUN)

If you make a comparison between two things, you compare them.

compass

NOUN compasses

1 A compass is an instrument that shows the direction you are facing. The magnetic needle on a compass always points north.

2 A compass is a tool that you use for drawing circles.

compatible

ADJECTIVE

 If people are compatible, they get on well together.
 If machines are compatible, they can be used together.

competition

NOUN competitions
A competition is an event
where people race against
each other or play games
to see who is the best. Our
team came second in the
swimming competition.

complain

VERB complains, complaining, complained

If you complain, you say that you are not happy about something. Everyone complained because the bus was late.

complaint (NOUN)

If you make a complaint, you complain about something.

complete

VERB completes, completing, completed

1 If you complete something, you finish it.

ADJECTIVE

2 Something that is complete is finished and contains all the parts.



complicated

ADJECTIVE

Something that is complicated has a lot of different parts and is very difficult to do or understand. The story in the movie is very complicated.

compose

VERB composes, composing, composed

If you compose music, you write it.

composer (NOUN)

A composer is someone who writes music.

computer

NOUN computers A computer is an electronic machine that can receive and store information. Computers can do calculations, and you

can also play games on them.

concentrate

VERB concentrates, concentrating, concentrated When you concentrate, you think carefully about what you are doing.

concentration (NOUN) Concentration is when you concentrate. *You need a lot* of **concentration** to do math.

concert

NOUN concerts

A concert is an event where people sing or play music for an audience to listen to.

concrete

NOUN

Concrete is a mixture of cement, stones, and water. It is hard like rock and used for building.

condition

NOUN

The condition that something is in is the state it is in. My bike is old, but it's still in good condition.

conduct

VERB conducts, conducting, conducted

1 When you conduct music or singing, you stand in front of musicians or singers and control the way that they play or sing.
2 If something conducts heat or electricity, it allows heat or electricity to pass through it.

The metal copper conducts electricity well.

confess

considerate

Someone who is considerate thinks about other people and does not do things that will annoy or upset other people.

Opposite: inconsiderate

consonant

NOUN consonants
A consonant is any letter of
the alphabet that is not a vowel.
Examples of consonants are b,
f, m, s, and w.

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a constellation

NOUN constellations
A constellation is a group of stars.

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construct

VERB constructs, constructing, constructed If you construct something, you build it.

construction (NOUN)
A construction is something that someone has built.

consume

VERB consumes, consuming, consumed

If you consume something, you eat or drink it, or use it.

Big car engines consumes
a lot of fuel.

contain

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VERB contains, containing, contained
 If a box or bag contains things, it has those things
 inside it. The box contained some amazing-looking candy.

NOUN containers
A container is anything that
you can put or keep things in.

ADJECTIVE

If you are content, you feel happy and satisfied. You can also say that you are **contented**.

contents

continent

NOUN continents
A continent is one of seven very large areas of land that make up the world. Most continents include several different countries. *Africa* and Europe are continents.

continue

If you continue to do something, you keep on doing it. We continued to play even when it started raining.

control

VERB controls, controlling, controlled

1 When you control something, you make it go where you want it to go or do what you want it to do.

NOUN controls

conversation

NOUN conversations A conversation is a talk between two or more people.

convince







as a musical instrument.

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daffodil

NOUN daffodils A daffodil is a yellow, trumpet-shaped flower that you see in the spring.

dagger

NOUN daggers A dagger is a short knife that people use as a weapon.

daily

Something that happens daily happens every day.

dairy

NOUN dairies

A dairy is a place where milk is stored and butter, cheese, and yogurt are made.

Dairy products are foods containing milk, such as butter and yogurt.

dare

post

postage

NOUN

Postage is the amount you have to pay to mail a letter or package.

postcard

NOUN postcards

A postcard is a small piece of card with a picture on one side, sometimes a view of the place you are staying at. On the other side, you write a message and the address of the person you want to sent it to in the post.

NOUN posters

A poster is a large picture or notice that you put on a wall as an advertisement or for decoration.

2 Someone who is serious is not smiling or laughing. The teacher came in looking serious.

3 If something is serious, it is worrying and could be dangerous.

seriously (ADVERB) If someone is seriously hurt, they are badly hurt.

servant

NOUN servants A servant is a person who works for another person in their home.

serve

VERB serves, serving, served 1 When you serve someone, you help them by giving them something that they It is his turn to serve. want or need. The waiter will **serve** you at your table.

2 When you serve in a game like tennis, you start the game by hitting the ball to your opponent.

service

NOUN services 1 The service in a store or restaurant is how quick and helpful the staff are.

2 A service is something that is provided for people to use if they want to.

set

NOUN sets

1 A set of things is a group of things that belong together. Have you got a chess set? VERB sets, setting, set **2** When something sets, it goes hard. The glue took a long time to set.

3 When the Sun sets, it goes down in the evening. The Sun sets in the west.

4 When you set a timer or an alarm, you change the controls so that it will go off at a particular time.

I set my alarm for seven o'clock.

5 To place something in a location or a position.

> The teacher **set** the books on her desk.

sow You usually **sow** seeds in the spring.

NOUN sexes

Male and female are the two sexes that people and animals are divided into.

shade

NOUN shades

1 If you are in the shade, you are in a cool place where the sun's light and heat cannot reach.

She sat in the **shade** to read.

2 Different shades of a color are all the same color, but are different because some are darker or lighter than others.

I have three red T-shirts, but they're all different shades of the color.

3 Shades are sunglasses.

shadow

NOUN shadows

A shadow is a dark shape that is made when something blocks the light.

shake

VERB shakes, shaking, shook, shaken

1 When something shakes, it moves roughly up and down or from side to side. *The bus was shaking and rattling as it drove along.*

2 When you shake something, you move it roughly up and down. *Shake* the can before opening it.

3 If you are shaking, you cannot stop your body from moving because you are cold or frightened.

VERB

shallow

ADJECTIVE

Something that is shallow is not very deep. We paddled in the **shallow** water.

shame

NOUN

1 If something is a shame, it is sad. *It's a shame you can't come*.
2 Shame is the feeling you have when you know that you have done something wrong and feel bad about it.

shampoo

NOUN shampoos
Shampoo is a soapy liquid that
you use for washing your hair.

shape

NOUN shapes

You can say what shape something is by saying whether it is a circle, a square, or a triangle.

shaped (ADJECTIVE)

If something is shaped like an object, it has the shape of that object. *Her pencil case was* **shaped** like a banana.

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a share

VERB shares, sharing, shared

1 When people share something, they take it in turns to use it.

We haven't got enough cups so we'll have to share.

2 When people share something, they divide it up and give some to each person. *I hope you're going to share your chocolate*

shark

NOUN sharks

A shark is a large fish with rows of sharp teeth. Sharks live in both cold and warm seas and eat fish or small water animals.

sharp

ADJECTIVE sharper, sharpest
 Something that is sharp has
 a thin edge or pointed end that can cut things. Careful—that
 knife is sharp!

2 If you have sharp eyes or ears, you are good at seeing or hearing things.

sharpen (VERB)

If you sharpen a knife, you make it sharper.

shatter

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VERB shatters, shattering, shattered
 If something shatters, it breaks into very small pieces.
 The mirror fell to the floor and

shattered into tiny pieces.

shave

verb shaves, shaving, shaved

When you shave, you remove hair from your body with a razor.

shed

NOUN sheds

1 A shed is a small building that you keep things in.

VERB sheds, shedding, shed **2** To shed something means to lose it because it drops off. *Some trees shed all their leaves in the fall.*

sheep

NOUN

A sheep is an animal with a thick, woolly coat that is kept on farms to produce meat and wool.

sheer

ADJECTIVE

1 A sheer drop does not slope but goes straight down.

2 Sheer means complete. She smiled with **sheer** pleasure when she saw all the presents.



NOUN shells

A shell is a hard part that covers and protects something. Eggs, nuts, and animals such as snails, crabs, and tortoises have shells.

Sharks have very sharp teeth.

sheet

NOUN sheets

1 A sheet is a large piece of cloth that you put on a bed.
2 A sheet of something is a large, flat piece of it.

shelf

NOUN shelves
A shelf is a piece of wood attached to a wall that you can put things on.



NOUN

NOUN shots

2 A shot is a photo. *That's a lovely shot of you!*

3 In tennis, a shot is a hit of the ball. In soccer or basketball, a shot is an attempt to score a goal or point. *That was a brilliant shot!*

4 If you fire a shot at something, you shoot at it.

should

VERB

If you should do something, you ought to do it. We **should** do our homework before we play.

shoulder

NOUN shoulders
Your shoulder is the place below
your neck where your arms join
your body.

shout

NOUN shouts

1 A shout is a loud call. We heard a **shout** from the yard.

VERB shouts, shouting, shouted

2 When you shout, you speak or call out loudly. "Go away!" she **shouted**.

show

NOUN shows

1 A show is something that people perform for others to watch. VERB shows, showing,

VERB shows, showing showed, shown

2 If you show something to someone, you let them see it.

He **showed** me some of his photos.

3 If you show someone how to do something, you explain it to them and do it so that they can watch it and learn. Can you show me how to get to the next level in the game?

shower

NOUN showers

1 If you have a shower, you wash your body by standing under a fine spray of water.

2 If there is a shower, it rains for a short time.

shrank

shred

NOUN shreds
A shred of something is
a small, narrow strip of it.
My shirt was torn to shreds.





shuffle

shriek

VERB shrieks, shrieking, shrieked

If you shriek, you shout or cry out in a high-pitched voice because you are excited or afraid. She **shrieked** when she saw the mouse.

shrill

ADJECTIVE shriller, shrillest A shrill sound is sharp and high.

shrink

VERB shrinks, shrinking, shrank, shrunk
When something shrinks, it becomes smaller. *My shirt shrank* in the wash.

shrug

VERB shrugs, shrugging, shrugged

When you shrug, you raise your shoulders to show that you do not care or do not know.

shuffle

VERB shuffles, shuffling, shuffled

1 When you shuffle cards, you mix them around to change the order they are in.

2 If you shuffle along, you walk slowly, dragging your feet along the ground.

shut

VERB shuts, shutting, shut **1** If you shut something, you close it.

2 When you shut down your computer, you close the programs you have been using and switch it off.

shy

ADJECTIVE shyer, shyest Someone who is shy is nervous and frightened when they meet and talk to new people.

sick

ADJECTIVE sicker, sickest

1 If you are sick, food comes
up out of your stomach and
out of your mouth.

2 If you are sick, you do not feel well.

side

NOUN sides

1 The sides of something are the parts at the edges. *Triangles have three sides*.

2 The side of something is the part on the left or right of it.

3 A side is a team of people who are competing against another group. Which **side** are you on?

sideways

ADVERB

If you move sideways, you move to the side, not forward or backward. *Crabs walk sideways*.

sieve

NOUN sieves

A sieve is a container with a lot of tiny holes in it. You pour things into a sieve to separate solids from liquids, or fine grains from larger pieces.

sigh

VERB sighs, sighing, sighed

When you sigh, you let out a long, deep breath slowly because you are tired or sad.

sight

NOUN

1 Your sight is your ability to see things. *She lost her sight* in an accident.

2 A sight is something that you can see. *The old ship was an amazing sight as it sailed up the river.*

Be careful with spelling:sight Bats have no sight.site We stayed at a camp site.

sign

NOUN signs

1 A sign is a picture or symbol that represents something.

The **sign** for a dollar is \$.

2 If you give someone a sign, you move your body in order to tell them something. He nodded his head as a sign that he agreed.

3 A sign is a public notice that gives people information. There was a "No Entry" **sign** by the gate.

4 When you sign something, you write your name on it. *The author signed copies of her book.*

sign language (NOUN) Sign language is a way of talking to people by moving your hands in special ways. People who cannot hear often use sign language. a

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signal

NOUN signals

1 If you give someone a signal, you move a part of your body or use an object in order to tell the person something. When you are cycling, you put out one arm as a signal that you are going to turn left or right.

singer (NOUN)

A singer is someone who sings. When I grow up, I want to be a pop singer.

single

ADJECTIVE

Single means for only one person. They reserved two single rooms and one double at the hotel.

singular

The singular of a word is the form that you use for only one thing or person. "Child" is a singular form, and "children" is a plural form.

sink

NOUN sinks

1 A sink is a basin with taps that you can wash things in. VERB sinks, sinking, sank, sunk 2 When something sinks, it goes down below the surface of water. The stone sank to the bottom of the pond.



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sip

sir

NOUN

A word you use when you are speaking to a man politely. *I'm sorry, sir.*

siren

NOUN sirens

A siren is a small machine that makes a loud noise to warn people about something. We heard a police car's **siren**.

sister

NOUN sisters

Your sister is a girl who has the same mother and father as you.

sit

VERB sits, sitting, sat

1 When you sit, you rest your
body by supporting your weight
on your bottom, rather than
on your feet.

2 If something is sitting somewhere, it is there. *I left my book sitting on the kitchen table*.

site

NOUN sites

A site is an area of ground. You mustn't play on the building site.

■ Be careful with spelling: site We stayed at a camp site. sight Bats have no sight.

sitting room

NOUN sitting rooms
A sitting room is a room in
which you sit and chat or
watch television.

situation

NOUN situations

A situation is everything that is happening in a particular place at a particular time. You should call for help if you are in a dangerous situation.

skate

ski

VERB skis, skiing, skied When you ski, you move over snow on two long, thin sticks called skis.

skid

skip

VERB skips, skipping, skipped 1 When you skip along, you run along and hop lightly from one foot to another. She skipped down the road cheerfully. 2 When you skip, you jump over a turning rope.

skirt

NOUN skirts

A skirt is a piece of clothing that a woman or girl wears. It fastens around her waist and can be short or long.

skull

NOUN skulls

Your skull is the bony case that skydivin protects your brain.

sky

NOUN skies

The sky is the air above us.

skydiving

Skydiving is a sport in which people jump out of an airplane wearing a parachute that opens after they have been falling for a short while.

skyscraper

NOUN skyscrapers A skyscraper is a very tall building.

slack

ADIECTIVE

Something that is slack is not stretched tight. Keep the rope tight—don't let it go slack.

slam

VERB slams, slamming, slammed

slang

NOUN

Slang is words and phrases that people use when they are laughing and joking together, but not when they are writing or speaking politely.

slave

NOUN slaves

A slave is someone who is owned bu another person and has to work for them.

sled

NOUN sleds

A sled is a vehicle with a smooth bottom that you sit on to move across snow or ice.

sleep

VERB sleeps, sleeping, slept When you sleep, you rest with your eyes closed, and your body and mind are not active.

sleepų (ADJECTIVE)

If you are sleepy, you feel as if you want to sleep.

sleet

NOUN

Sleet is a mixture of snow and rain.



VERB slants, slanting, slanted If something slants, it slopes and is not flat or straight.

slap

VERB slaps, slapping, slapped If you slap someone, you hit them with the palm of your hand.

sleeve

Skydiving is a daring and exciting sport.

NOUN sleeves

The sleeves on a piece of clothing are the parts that cover your arms.

sleigh

NOUN sleighs

A sleigh is a large, open vehicle that is pulled by animals.

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slept

See sleep.

slice

NOUN slices

A slice of something is a thin piece of it. Would you like a **slice** of cake?

slide

NOUN slides

1 A slide is a large toy for children to play on. You climb up some steps and then slide down it.

VERB slides, sliding, slid

2 To slide means to move smoothly along.

She slid across

slight

the ice.

ADJECTIVE slighter, slightest

Slight means very small.

There's a **slight** chance that we might go to Mexico this year.

slightly (ADVERB)

Slightly means a little bit.

I was slightly annoyed with him.

slim

ADJECTIVE slimmer, slimmest Someone who is slim is thin.

slimy

ADJECTIVE

Something that is slimy feels wet and sticky.

sling

NOUN slings

A sling is a piece of material that you put around an injured arm to support it.

slip

VERB slips, slipping, slipped

1 If you slip, your foot slides on the floor and you nearly fall. I slipped on the ice.

2 If you slip something into a place, you put it there gently. He slipped some money into my hand.

slipper

NOUN slippers Slippers are soft, comfortable shoes that you wear indoors.

slippery

ADJECTIVE

Something that is slippery is smooth

or wet, and difficult to grip.

Two slippery newts

slit

NOUN slits

A slit is a long, narrow hole or cut in something.

slither

VERB slithers, slithering, slithered

When a snake slithers, it slides along the ground.

slogan

NOUN slogans

A slogan is a phrase that is used to advertise something.

slope

NOUN slopes

1 A slope is a piece of land that is not flat, but goes up or down. *They rolled the ball down the* **slope**.

VERB slopes, sloping, sloped **2** If something slopes, it is not flat but goes up or down at one end.

slot

NOUN slots

A slot is a small, narrow opening for putting something in. *She put a coin in the slot*.

slow

ADJECTIVE slower, slowest

Something that is slow takes a long time to do something or get somewhere. The school bus is always slow.

slowly (ADVERB)

If you do something slowly, you do it in a slow way and do not hurry. *I usually read quite slowly*.

slug

NOUN slugs

A slug is a small, soft, and slimy animal with no legs. *Slugs* have eaten all the lettuces I planted in my garden.

sly

ADJECTIVE slyer, slyest Someone who is sly does things in a secret, sneaky way. *I don't trust my cousin—he's very sly*.

smack

VERB smacks, smacking, smacked

To smack someone means to hit them.

ADJECTIVE smaller, smallest Something that is small is not veru bia.

smart

ADJECTIVE smarter, smartest

1 Someone who is smart is clever.

2 Someone who

looks smart is wearing clean, neat clothes.

3 A smart machine can

make some decisions for itself.

smartphone

NOUN smartphones A smartphone is a mobile phone that lets you get on the internet.

m smash

VERB smashes, smashing, smashed

To smash something means 0 to break it into lots of pieces.

smell

NOUN smells

1 Your sense of smell is your ability to smell things.

2 The smell that something has is what it is like when you sniff it. The flower had a lovely smell.

can notice it by sniffing with your nose. Your feet smell! VERB smells, smelling,

smelled or smelt

smelly (ADJECTIVE)

smile

smoke

NOUN

Smoke is the black or white gas that comes from a fire.

ADJECTIVE smoother, smoothest

is flat and even, with no sharp bumps or lumps. You need a nice smooth

smoothie

NOUN smoothies A smoothie is a thick drink that is made by crushing fruit or vegetables and adding milk, yogurt, or ice cream.

smuggle

VERB smuggles, smuggling, smuggled

If you smuggle something into a place or out of a place, you move it there secretly.

We smuggled cookies into my bedroom for a midnight feast.

smuggler (NOUN)

A smuggler is someone who brings things into a country in a way that is against the law.

snowflake

NOUN snowflakes
A snowflake is one piece of
snow that falls from the clouds.

snowman

NOUN snowmen
A snowman is a figure of a person that you make out of snow.

snug

ADJECTIVE

If you are snug, you are warm and comfortable. *The cat looked very snug curled up inside the basket*.

soak

VERB soaks, soaking, soaked To soak something means to make it very wet. My brother soaked me with his water pistol. soaking (ADJECTIVE)
Something that is soaking is very wet. My clothes are soaking!

soap

NOUN soaps

1 You use soap for cleaning your body.

2 A soap is a television series that tells the story of the everyday lives of a group of people. A soap is also called a **soap opera**.

soar

VERB soars, soaring, soared If something soars, it goes high up into the air. *An eagle* soared above us.



Sentences

A sentence is a group of words that make sense together. A sentence starts with a capital letter and ends with a period. All sentences contain a verb.

Some sentences are quite short.

This is an elephant. Elephants love water.

We can make sentences longer by joining on more clauses using **conjunctions**.

Elephants love water **and** they can swim quite well.



Punctuation

• You put a period at the end of a sentence.

The cat sat on the mat.

? You put a question mark at the end of a question.

Where do you live?

! You put an exclamation mark at the end of a command or an exclamation. *Come here!*

What beautiful flowers!

, You put a comma to separate parts of a sentence, or divide up a list of things. He's only five, but he can swim really well.

An apostrophe is used to shorten two words into one, or to show who something belongs to.



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
