# **Timeless** ride

Bring in the festive joy with our latest All Our Yesterdays design, evoking the nostalgia of a vintage Christmas



hile Christmas Day in modern times features many more gadgets than yesteryear, we'd like to think that there are still children who will be unwrapping and jumping straight onto a rocking horse this year! Artist Faye Whittaker painted this scene as a nod to last-century nostalgia and we've lovingly converted it into a chart for you to stitch this Christmas.

This is a fabulous design for beginners to try something a little more challenging, as it's less densely stitched. You'll be using whole and half stitches to shape the beautiful scene, adding detail with backstitch and feathering to the edges with more half stitch. There are even a

few beads to accent the saddle edge and berries on the reins. For a guicker finish or even a large greetings card, you could leave out the garland. If you know someone expecting a baby this winter, this would make a wonderful birth sampler by adding their name and birthday.



# Wintry elegance

Travel back to Victorian times when you stitch this beautiful frozen lake scene with added texture



o matter what era you're born in, when the first frost of the season appears, anticipation grows for what fun the winter will bring. Wrapped up warm in their plush fur-trimmed coats and wool scarves, our skaters are dressed to impress as they glide over the ice in this frosty winter wonderland. Maria Diaz's design is an ode to the wholesome wintry activity, this time set in the Victorian era as she adds another to her iconic period designs.

Worked on crisp blue evenweave for a chilly background, she's included silver metallic thread for the ice and snow, making the scene even more sparkly. Turkey work has been used for the furry cuffs and edging of the


# How to... do turkey work stitch

Turkey work stitch is used to add a textured 'furry' effect to some of the figure's overcoats in this design. Thread your needle with three strands of thread in the colour indicated by the key. Ensure the length is long enough to complete a whole row of turkey work stitches before you begin.


















- **1 Starting at the** left of the bottom turkey stitch line as indicated on the chart, take the needle through the second hole in from front to back (1), leaving a short tail of thread at the front. Bring the needle through the adjacent hole to the left (2), then down through the hole to the right of your original (3). The first locking stitch is complete.
- **2 Bring the needle** through the original hole (1) again to the front and, leaving a small loop of thread, take it back down two holes to the right (4). Make sure the loop doesn't pull all the way through.
- **3 Thread the needle** back up through the hole to the left (5) and down two holes to the right (6), creating another locking stitch across the top of the loop.
- **4 Continue this pattern** of stitches until you reach the end of the line. Then, bring the needle through to the

front in the hole of the last loop and snip off to the same length as all the other loops.

- **5 Repeat this process** for all the rows in the section, creating a new row of turkey work stitches for each line on the chart. You'll find it easier working from the bottom up. This allows you to see each line of stitches develop as they're being formed, preventing the loops hanging down from above and obstructing your view.
- **6 Snip through all** the loops one by one, being careful not to miss any. Comb through the threads with a needle to fluff them up slightly and separate the individual strands for the best finish.
- **7 Trim the threads** down to form a soft, raised fuzz do this slowly and carefully to shape it to the area around your cross stitches, using our photos as a guide.




Santa's House - chart H (roof left)





# How to...

## assemble the 3D Santa house





Pieces to stitch: A (front) x1, B (back) x1, C (right side) x1, D (left side) x1, E (inside front) x1, F (inside back) x1, G (roof right) x1, H (roof left) x1, I (chimney left) x1, J (chimney front) x1, K (chimney right) x1, L (chimney back x1, M (Santa) x1, N (reindeer) x as desired







**NOTE:** Once you've finished stitching, cut out all the completed pieces leaving a one square border. Be careful not to snip into any holes containing stitches, then follow the tutorial for the construction. All overstitching and whipstitching done using three strands of thread, unless specified.











1 Whipstitch the side edges of pieces B (back) between the C (left side) and D (right side) pieces using white thread.

**2 Join piece F** (inside back) to the inside of the side pieces, sewing down both vertical edges, leaving a gap of one square from the front so it sits slightly inside the model base. We used white thread for the left side and the ruby thread shade for the right to match adjoining stitches.

**3 Place pieces A** (front) and E (inside front) together with reverse sides facing, so they're positioned back-to-back. Overstitch them together around the bottom, across the slanted top edges and on one side using white thread. We chose to have it opening on the left, so left this edge unstitched.

4 Whipstitch the top short edge of both roof pieces together using white thread so it forms a triangular structure. Overstitch the remaining exposed edges of the roof using white thread.

**5 Place the roof** on top of the model and stitch (or carefully glue) the long edges to the top of the slanting edges of the back (B) and inside back (F) pieces. If you plan to stitch the chimney in position, rather than glue, leave the short edges open for now to make the chimney stack much easier to attach as this way you have access to both sides.

6 Whipstitch the chimney (I, J, K and L) pieces together using the grey thread shade, with the slanted bottom pieces between the corresponding flat bottomed ones, so it forms a complete structure. Overstitch around the top edge using white thread.

7 Position the chimney on top of the shorter roof section, with the slanted edges flush against it. Line it up with the chimney stack on the inside front piece design, then stitch (or very carefully glue) in place around the bottom edges. If you left the roof unattached from step 5, finish sewing this in place along the short edges as before.

8 Whipstitch the unstitched short edge of the joined front pieces to the corresponding side wall edge, ensuring the front of the workshop is facing outwards. This creates the hinge for the model to open out.

9 Overstitch around the remaining exposed bottom edges of the model. We used white thread for a snowy look.

**10 To stand the** Santa (M) and reindeer (N) pieces up, cut out small pieces of plastic canvas from the off-cuts and glue them to the back of the stitching, so they protrude outwards at right angles from the base, as pictured. Hold in place for the glue to fully set before standing up.

# **Durene Jones**

Durene has been designing for 21 years and is loved by our readers. Here she tells us what she enjoys about Christmas and the cross stitch community







## What do you love about designing for Christmas?

It's a fun and magical time of year where anything is possible. A great excuse to be bright, colourful and fun, which fits me very well. While I love all the novelty aspects of Christmas, designing snowmen is what draws me in the most. I think it probably goes back to my love of building snowmen as soon as there was any snowfall in our back garden when I was younger!

# Do you have a festive childhood memory?

My childhood Christmases were in the 70s and 80s, so I daresay they were quite different to now. I loved the run-up to the big day, including things such as getting an advent calendar every year and opening a door everyday to see what picture was hidden behind, or decorating my grandma's Christmas cake with my mum. We would roll out marzipan and icing, get out the biscuit tin of decorations – it all seemed so special to me as a young child. Once done, it was a sign Christmas was nearly here.

#### What traditions do you follow?

Nowadays the cake is shop-bought, but I do love making the house look festive. I love getting the decorations out and remembering things I'd forgotten about – some decorations look quite worn as they have been passed down through generations, and a lot are homemade, but that's what makes them more special.

## What do you enjoy about the cross stitch community?

It's a great environment for advice or guidance. If you find a good group to join, it can be a very supportive space to share the things you are currently stitching and receive tips and tricks from more experienced stitchers, especially if you're a beginner. Cross stitchers are generally very friendly and welcoming people – we always love to encourage each other so it's a very good place to feel a sense of belonging and to build lasting friendships.






# stitch on dark fabric

It can be difficult to work with dark fabric compared to lighter coloured fabrics, so here are some tips on how to get started!

To help the holes show up while you're stitching, place a white sheet on your lap. It's much easier to work with dark fabrics in a hoop or frame, as this will stretch the weave a little when taut, but if you're still struggling, then we recommend investing in a magnifier lamp to help you see the holes more clearly. Remember to take breaks to avoid eye strain and to stitch in good light, preferably daylight. For some projects, you can use three strands to make the stitches fuller with less show-through from the fabric behind.


- **1 Cut around your** completed stitching leaving one square of canvas around the edges, trimming off any bumps along the edge of the plastic as you go.
- **2 Back your cut** out shapes onto white felt using acid-free double-sided tape.
- **3 Cut around your** felt following the shape of your canvas cut out, trimming the edges and corners for a smooth finish.
- **4 Attach a loop** of ribbon to the back of the felt using a few small stitches to secure it in place. To ensure it's positioned centrally, follow the centre arrows on the chart so it hangs nicely on your tree.

#### Cross stitch with the kids

What's the best age for kids to start cross stitching? My four-year-old daughter is keen to try but I feel this is too young to be handling needles and scissors. What do you think? **Alice Decker, Berkshire** 

Hannah: There are some safe stitching options for little ones to use – but they should still be carefully supervised at all times, of course. Look out for children's safety scissors and also needles made from colourful plastic, which are perfect for small fingers, and no sharp point! Get this pack of two for 85p from DMC\* (1763U/1), and let your daughter have a go using wool on tapestry canvas to begin with. This stiff material has large, square holes, which are perfect for helping younger crafters to see and hold. You could then progress onto chunky 6-count aida and work from there.

# Fabric conversions

I bought a *Cross Stitch Gold Festive Collection* magazine to complete some of the beautiful patterns, only to realise they were mostly done on 28-count fabric which is much too fine for me to use. I hope you can tell me if it's possible to convert it to using aida, and how I go about it please?

#### Sandra Bewick, via email

Fiona: Sure thing, Sandra – you don't actually need to do any calculations to switch between 28- and 14-count fabrics, as they both work out the same. Stitching over two threads of the fabric on the evenweave equates to the same size stitch as over one block on aida, so these can be substituted like-for-like. Just be aware of the stitch types in the patterns though. You'll find fractionals and French knots trickier to do on aida, as you'll need to split the middle of the blocks, so this may be why they were originally intended for evenweave in the magazine. To help, use a sharp pointed needle to make piercing the blocks easier. Or why not have a go on evenweave with a small motif – you may find it easier than you think.

# **TECHNIQUE FOCUS**

#### Stitch and shake

Do you have instructions on how to make a shaker card, placing a small cross stitch inside the shaker window?

#### Rhonda Fung, via email

Fiona: We'd recommend using a pre-made card kit, such as this Snow Globe 5x7 Card Kit (116200245GK) from Katy Sue Designs\*, costing £19.99. The set includes 10 white oval aperture cards, each with a clear plastic display globe and box to send it in, plus a 3g packet of Polar White Flower Soft. To display your cross stitch inside, first glue the display globe into place behind the oval aperture, sprinkle the

'snow' inside the dome. then stick an additional piece of clear acetate over the top, sealing it inside. This will prevent the tiny bits from getting caught in the stitches and fabric when it's shaken. Now, mount your stitching behind the acetate using acid-free doublesided tape around the outside edges, so your stitched design shows through the dome. Add another piece of white card or paper across the back to hide reverse side. Now it's ready to shake!





#### Learn about selvedge

Do you know what this orange line down the side of my aida is for? It didn't come with instructions as to what to do with it.

Ida Alamy, via email

Name: The orange-coloured line in the selvedge of a piece of fabric is usually an indicator it is Zweigart\* branded. This is their trademark and a recognised sign of quality fabrics that are colourfast, easy-care and precise in the weaving. It could be that previous fabrics you've purchased have been other brands or come from kits with the selvedge already cut off. It's a good idea to cut off the selvedge before stitching, as it can distort the fabric as you stitch where the weave isn't freely moving across the whole piece.

### Making your own patterns



What are the absolutely must-have tools for cross stitch? I'm just starting out. Abigail C., via Facebook

Fiona: The great thing is you don't need much to get started! You'll need fabric and threads, but the choice here is yours, or will be dictated by the pattern instructions - we'd recommend starting off with 11- or 14-count aida. You'll also need a tapestry needle, appropriately sized for the fabric (see page 78) and some embroidery scissors. Extras include a hoop or frame, thread sorter and storage options.

# Guide to stitching your Stitch-A-Long (SAL)

- **The key and** Shopping List includes the thread colours, extra skeins and materials you'll need to stitch the whole SAL.
- **To start stitching** the SAL border, first find the centre of the fabric by folding it in half and half again. The point where the folds cross is where the central stitch of the border design should go.
- Once the border is finished, it's easy to fill in each month's SAL design in the spaces provided. Work around the border in a clockwise direction using our photo as a guide, starting with January in the one o'clock position.
- **Stitch each corresponding** month name on plastic canvas and cut out with a one square border be careful not to snip into any holes containing stitches.
- **Cut self-adhesive** magnetic strips to size and stick on the reverse side of the plastic canvas month names.
- **At the end** of the SAL, back the completed piece with iron-on interfacing and mount in an 11in display frame or hoop.
- **Position the opposing** magnetic strips on the reverse of the fabric to attach the month names in the middle of your completed hoop display you can easily swap each month as the year goes by.

# How to...

Beginner? Follow Fiona's guide to instant stitching success!

### CHOOSE YOUR ESSENTIALS...

Start with these must-have items

### FABRICS

Most stitchers start off using **aida** – a block-weave fabric, which is divided into squares by a grid of holes, making it an ideal fabric for beginners. Each cross stitch is worked over one square.

Or you may prefer **evenweave**, which is also woven in a grid but in a finer count. Each cross stitch is usually worked over two threads of the fabric (shown below), making it the equivalent size to stitching on aida (eg. 28-count evenweave would produce the same size finish as

14-count aida). Fractional stitches are easier to work on evenweave, as there's a central hole spare so you don't need to split a block as you do for aida.



### **THREADS**

You'll need **stranded cotton** – this coloured thread comes in 8m skeins and is made up of six strands. There are three main brands – DMC, Anchor and Madeira – which are all smooth and easy to stitch with, and they're colourfast to 95°C. Cheaper brands are available, but could be less durable and may not be colourfast. Less than one full skein of each thread will be required for a design, unless indicated at the bottom of the key for that project.

### NEEDLES

Use a **tapestry needle** which has a blunt tip and large eye. It easily passes through the fibres of aida and evenweave. Different needle sizes are available, so choose the best for your fabric – see our guide on the right. It's a good idea to have a sharp (crewel) needle, to split aida blocks when stitching fractionals, and a thin beading needle is useful too.

### How to read our charts & keys

Clear symbols, colours & all the info you need!

CHARTS Made up of coloured squares containing symbols that represent squares to be stitched on the fabric. A tiny symbol denotes a fractional stitch in the corner of the square in which it's to be worked. The centres of our charts are marked with arrows on the edge of each side. To find the corresponding centre of your fabric, fold it in half horizontally and then vertically – the point where the creases cross marks the centre. Start stitching here to ensure the design is positioned in the middle of the fabric.

shopping LIST Contains type and size of fabric, recommended needle, and details of other products to frame or finish your project in the same way we have. Using another fabric with different HPI will alter the finished size of a design. Calculate your fabric size like this: stitch count divided by HPI of new fabric choice = new size in inches. Add at least 15cm (6in) to each dimension to allow for mounting in a frame, but less (between 5-10cm) for cards or home furnishings.

**FACTBOX** Includes an approx. stitching time, types of stitches found in the design and a difficulty level – this can help you decide if a project is suitable for your skills (beginner, intermediate or advanced).

**KEY** The key alongside a chart will tell you what colour thread each symbol corresponds to, along with the following information:

### Thread brands


Different manufacturer thread shades are listed in separate columns. For best results, stick to one manufacturer for the whole of a design. The first column is the brand we used to stitch the design.

### **Backstitch & French knot shades**

The shades used for these are listed under the cross stitch symbols. The number of strands needed for these can vary, so make sure you check the key so you know how many strands to use.

### Stitch count & design area

This indicates the finished size of your design — in stitches and on the particular fabric we've used. HPI stands for holes per inch.





### How to stitch Tackle the basic stitches in our charts...









### **Cross stitch**

Each coloured square on the chart represents a whole cross stitch. Bring the needle up at the bottom left corner of a square and down at the top right corner. Then, bring the needle up at the bottom right corner and down at the top left to complete a stitch (starting corner positions can be reversed if preferred).


### Half cross stitch


Half cross stitch is identified with a different symbol on the chart and key to the cross stitches, and consists of one arm of the stitch only. Work each half cross stitch in the same direction as you would the top arm of your full cross stitches for a neat and consistent look to your project.

### **Fractional stitches**


To make a quarter stitch, bring the needle up at the corner of a square and take it down through the centre. halfway across the diagonal, splitting the aida block (above left) or through the central hole if using evenweave. To turn this into a three-quarter stitch (above right, shown in pink thread), make a half cross stitch across the

diagonal of the square. To make two fractional stitches in the same square, you'll need to decide which is a quarter stitch (shown above, in blue) and which is a three-quarter stitch. Usually, the three-quarter stitch (shown above, in pink) is made in the foreground colour of the design look at the composition of the design carefully to decide which is which.









### **Backstitch**

Backstitch is shown by a coloured line and is added to stitching to create detail. Work the backstitch over individual blocks on aida, or pairs of threads on evenweave. Bring the needle up through the fabric at 1 and take it down at 2, up at 3 and so on (see above), so that you are always working back on yourself.

#### French knots

French knots appear as large dots on the chart. Bring the needle up through the fabric, then holding the thread with one hand, wind it around the needle two or three times. Holding the thread taut, take the needle down part of an aida block (or one thread on evenweave) away. Pull through until a neat knot is formed.

#### **Beads**

Beads appear as a circle with a dot on the chart. To attach seed beads. use a whole cross stitch with two thread strands to help keep the beads upright – attach the bead with the bottom arm of a cross stitch and then add the top arm of the stitch, making sure that one strand of thread falls neatly on either side of the bead.

### Starting your thread


The loop method is the neatest way to start but can only be done with an even number of strands. Cut a 40cm (16in) thread length, pull out one strand and fold it in half. Thread the needle with both ends, forming a loop at the end. Bring the needle up through the fabric and back down through the loop, then pull to secure.


### HOW TO ALTER THREAD SHADES IN A DESIGN

Swap colours to suit your preferences for skin tones, stashbusting & more...

Thread colours are arranged in shade 'families' - these are groups of colours that create a gradient of shading. It helps to look at a shade card for the full palette when making colour comparisons (available from DMC and Anchor) as these are arranged within the shade families already. You can swap threads likefor-like to equivalent shades of another family, ie. light, medium and dark. You may want to change the hue of an entire pattern, or use up threads already in your stash to save money. You can also alter skin tones to create different ethnicities. We've included some examples of skin shade families below,

but feel free to experiment with your own. You'll need to select alternatives for mid-tones, highlights and shadows, depending on how many shades are included in a design. For example, if only one shade is used select the mid-tone, then add highlight and shadow tones either side of this as required.





### Finishing your thread

Once you've finished stitching, finish off your threads to keep them secure by running the needle through the back of several stitches that you've already completed. Snip off the ends neatly with a sharp pair of embroidery scissors, as close to your fabric as possible.

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

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
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
